

INTEREST GAINING IN ELECTION RACE FOR SCHOOL BOARD

Saturday next, June 15, between the hours of 12 o'clock noon and 8 o'clock in the evening, the voters of the Portland public school district are to elect two members of the board of school directors and to approve or reject a special tax levy of three mills, totaling approximately \$950,000.

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More than usual interest is being shown in the campaign for the election of the two directors, seven candidates having made their appearance for the positions. Much uncertainty seems to exist as to who can vote, due to the fact that one qualification applies in the election of directors and another in the approval or rejection of the proposed tax levy.

Briefly stated, and without going into the technical verbiage of the law, any person qualified to vote at the recent primary election, or at the coming general election, can cast his vote for school director.

NO LEGAL BARRIERS

There is no difference or legal distinction between the qualifications required of a voter who desires to cast his ballot for a candidate for school director.

But, there is a different qualification fixed by the law when it comes to voting upon the tax levy. Here no person is qualified to cast his ballot either for or against the three mill levy unless he is a taxpayer whose name appears as such upon the last assessment roll of the county.

Consequently, any lawfully qualified voter may vote for director, but no one but a record taxpayer of the county may vote upon the special tax levy.

LOCATION OF POLLING PLACES

Generally speaking the polling places on Saturday next will be located in the public school buildings of the city. There are some exceptions to this rule and a full list of the voting locations will be published during the week for the information of the voters of the district. The polls will be open at 12 o'clock noon, and will close at 8 o'clock in the evening.

School people of the district, including all the candidates, are pleading with the voters whom they meet for a large attendance and a full vote at the election, not only because of the campaign for directors, but because of the necessity that funds be voted for the construction of additional permanent school buildings in the district.

The district is far behind in its building program, with the result that school rooms are congested and numerous portable buildings have been constructed to take care of the inevitable overflow caused by lack of room. The \$950,000 asked by the board is intended to relieve the existing shortage of rooms, in part.

It is made necessary by the fact that

none of the money flowing from the two-mill elementary school tax act approved by the voters at the recent special election can be used in the construction of school buildings, as the law is being construed.

There are two directors to be elected, the terms of E. A. Sommer and O. M. Plummer expiring. For these coming vacancies there are seven candidates now in the field. O. M. Plummer, one of the retiring directors, is a candidate to succeed himself. In addition there are six candidates—William F. Woodward, Frank L. Shull, Mrs. Francis A. Sherman, J. N. Pearcy, Sam Murhard and Arthur W. Jones. All of the contestants for election are conducting active and energetic campaigns.

J. H. RANKIN DIES FROM INJURIES

J. H. Rankin, 70-year-old victim of an automobile accident Wednesday, died at St. Vincent's hospital at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon as the result of a fractured skull. Rankin did not recover consciousness after the accident.

The accident was the result of racing for a crossing by William Libke, 265 East Forty-fifth street, and Roe Haroun, 132 East Forty-seventh street, at Fourteenth and Taylor. The two cars collided, and both ran over Rankin.

Libke and Haroun are charged with reckless driving. Their trial will probably not occur until after the coroner's inquest.
