

CHILDREN'S ROSE SHOW EXHIBIT IS SIMPLE AND EASY

J. A. Currey of the Portland Rose society came into The Journal office with a question: "Do you know," he asked, "how many boys and girls are going to exhibit in the Children's Rose show next Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday?"

"No," came the answer. "I don't. How could a person know? But I'm willing to wager a box of Imperial Shiraz roses that there will be demand for all the exhibit space we have provided. I'm a poor guesser if among the 25,000 boys and girls in Portland schools and the additional thousands in adjoining towns who are equally interested there are not 1000 a day for three days who will bring each a rose with which to win a medal from the United States mint or a second prize of \$150 in cash or a third prize of \$1, especially when you think there are to be two second prizes every day and five third prizes."

"But do the boys and girls know where to come?" continued Currey. "We have printed it over and over again—South Parkway, between Columbia and Clay streets. The boys and girls know, too, that they are expected to bring the flowers as early each morning of the show as possible."

"That," concluded Currey, "seems perfectly clear to me. It is it, boys and girls, perfectly clear to you? If it isn't, write or telephone The Journal."

Auto Shipments May Halt if Cars Are Not Unloaded

Embargo against the movement of automobile shipments into this territory will be requested by the local car service committee if Portland automobile dealers are not quicker in unloading railroad cars already standing in the local yards, according to a statement Tuesday morning by G. B. Winters, representative of the interstate commerce commission for this district.

Winters said that F. C. Buchtel, for the public service commission; H. M. Huston, for the railroads, and J. N. Lathrop, for the shippers, had united with the I. C. C. local committee in an effort to rush unloading; but that automobile dealers had been particularly recalcitrant.

Word that 25,000 boxcars were being moved from congested districts in the New England and Southeastern sections direct to railroads in the Middle West and West in an effort to relieve a shortage conditions west of the Mississippi river was received by Winters this morning from C. E. Hitchison of the I. C. C.

Ezra Meeker Flies Over Pioneer Trail

Spokane, Wash., June 16.—Sixty-eight years ago, traveling by ox team at two miles an hour, Ezra Meeker, now 90 years old, came from a point near Lewiston, Idaho, to Spokane in six days when blazing the now famous Oregon trail. Monday, in an airplane piloted by Lieutenant N. B. Mamer, the pioneer made the same trip in 30 minutes and refused an offer of assistance in helping him out of the plane. Meeker is gathering material for a book on "Seventy Years of Progress."

S. P. PLANS EXTRA PASSENGER TRAIN SERVICE SUNDAY

Arrangements are being made by the Southern Pacific to place an extra passenger train in service to Tillamook on the steam line and Forest Grove and Beaverton on the Electric lines Sunday, according to announcement made Tuesday morning by John M. Scott, general passenger agent.

The new daily extra train to Tillamook will leave here at 1:05 p. m., arrive Portland at 11 p. m. The regular Tillamook train will leave Tillamook 8:35 a. m. instead of 10:10 a. m., arriving Portland 4:35 p. m. The motor car operating between Tillamook and Wheeler will make two round trips daily.

No changes will be made in main line operation except that train No. 22 will leave Portland for the south at 8 a. m. instead of 7:40 a. m. The east side electric train which is leaving Portland at 10:20 a. m. will depart at 10 a. m., going through to McMinnville. On the west side electric an extra train will be placed in service between Portland and Beaverton, leaving this city at 7:45 a. m. and returning at 9:10 a. m. The train leaving at 10 a. m. for McMinnville will leave at 9:55 a. m.

An extra train to Forest Grove will leave at 11 a. m. and returning arrive 1:45 p. m. The train now arriving at 2:40 p. m. will not arrive until 3:20 p. m. The train now leaving at 3:15 p. m. for McMinnville will not leave until 3:30 p. m. Minor changes are also to be made, particularly in the Oswego service.
