Baton Rouge, La., June 17.—(U. P.)—The state rights suffrage bill was defeated in the senate today, 23 to 16, five short of the two-thirds majority necessary to pass the measure.

Blaine of Boscow, who was a La Follette delegate to the Republican convention. Other members of the state ticket are La Follette men.

Chicago, June 17.—(U. P.)—Seventy-five wool growers met here today to consider ways and means to stimulate the wool buying. According to the growers there is no wool market and buying is in small quantities. The situation is serious, they said. Assistance is needed from banks in financing the handling of this year's crop.

P.)—Senator M'Nary in his first public expression on the nomination of Harding, said: "Under the varied conditions surrounding the Chicago convention a good ticket has been selected. I have known Senator Harding intimately for three years, during which time I have observed his work in the senate and on important committees and have formed a high opinion of his vision, ability and energy."

Not to Be One-Man Campaign, Declares Republican Nominee

Washington, June 17.—(I. N. S.)—Senator Warren G. Harding, Republican presidential nominee, made it clear today that his will not be a one-man campaign, but will be conducted with due regard for every shade of Republican opinion. In this respect the campaign will follow the principle laid down by the senator some time ago, when he declared that, if elected president, his administration would not be a one-man administration.
