

SHULL UNPLEDGED TO ANY INTEREST, STATEMENT SAYS

Frank L. Shull, candidate for school director at the school election of next Saturday, June 19, in a statement, says he has not been asked to commit himself to any person or organization and that he agreed to become a candidate with the distinct understanding that, if elected, he was to be free to act on every question coming before the board according to the dictates of his best judgment. Shull says:

"May I have space to clear the air in one respect with regard to the school election? The various candidates for school director are all, so far as the writer knows, patriotic, law abiding Americans and are entitled to be judged on their records. No rumors regarding them should receive the least consideration until such rumors have been confirmed by evidence. I ask for myself only that to which I believe the others are entitled.

UNPLEDGED, HE SAYS

"As for myself, I say now what I have said from the beginning, that I have not been asked to commit myself to any person or organization nor would I do so. My agreement to stand for the office was with the distinct condition that if elected I am to be free to act on every question as my best judgment should dictate. All will receive fair and just treatment and nothing more. I am neither for nor against any person or organization, but will abide by my oath to faithfully, honestly and impartially discharge the duties of school director. Adopting the words of a strenuous American, 'It is certainly lots of fun to come right out, open and above board, and tell the truth. It is so seldom done that people gasp when you do it.' It is possible to be a candidate for office without selling oneself to get it."

Speeder Fined \$100 For Causing Wreck Which Hurts Woman

Jack Weist, 510 Lewis building, was fined \$100 Wednesday by Municipal Judge Rossmann for causing an automobile accident at Seventeenth and Marshall streets last Friday, which resulted in the injury of Mrs. B. B. Teeter, 648 Marshall.

Teeter, who drove the car in which his wife was injured, testified that Weist came into the intersection at a high rate of speed and skidded over 40 feet after applying his brakes. Weist filed complaint against Teeter for failure to give the right of way. Judge Rossmann asserted that Weist lost the right of way to the intersection owing to his excessive speed. Sergeant Keegan arrested Weist. Traffic bureau records show that Teeter has been arrested on two previous occasions for speeding. Other traffic violators fined by Judge Rossmann include: C. Negstead, glaring lights, \$5; Alex. Anderson, speeding, \$5; E. P. Radford, speeding, \$10; E. C. Smith, speeding, \$5.

Colored Boy Rider Hurt in Collision

Donald Phelps, 11-year-old colored boy, living at 229 Cherry street, was seriously injured at 10 o'clock this morning when his bicycle and a government mail truck, driven by Arthur Renick, 78 East Sixty-fifth street, collided at Broadway and Pine street. The lad was taken to St. Vincent's hospital, where it was believed one finger would require amputation. Possible internal injuries are suspected. Renick is being investigated by the police traffic bureau.

KEM TEMPLE, N. D., CUTS WIDE SWATH

Grand Forks, N. D., June 17.—Kem temple left Grand Forks this morning for a pilgrimage to Portland, O., expecting to arrive at 8 a. m. Monday, June 21, over the Great Northern railroad.

In the party will be 325 nobles of this northern temple, of whom 85 will be uniformed men, including the Kem patrol, Kem band and Kem Drum corps. En route the special train will stop at Devils Lake, N. D.; Minot, N. D.; Williston, N. D., and Wolf Point, Mont., for a couple of hours' stay at each place. At Glacier National park a 10 hour stop will be made, and at Spokane, Wash., the party will spend the entire afternoon and evening. At Seattle, Wash., a six hour "rest period" will be taken before leaving for Portland. The patrol drum corps and band will put on concerts and drills at each point, demonstrating that they are an entirely "wheat-fed" bunch that proposes to put North Dakota on the map in a favorable light. At Portland, the uniformed contingent will make their home in the "Parked Pullmans."

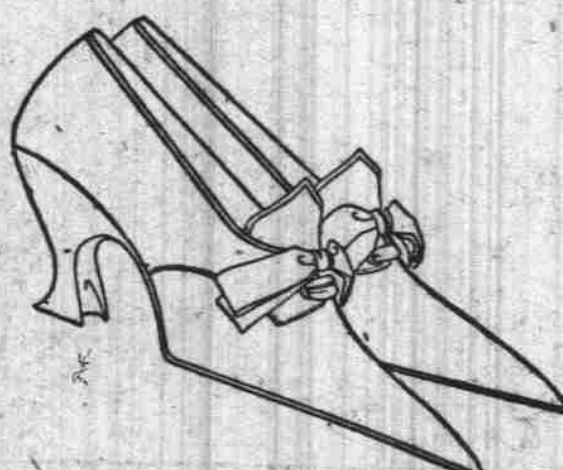

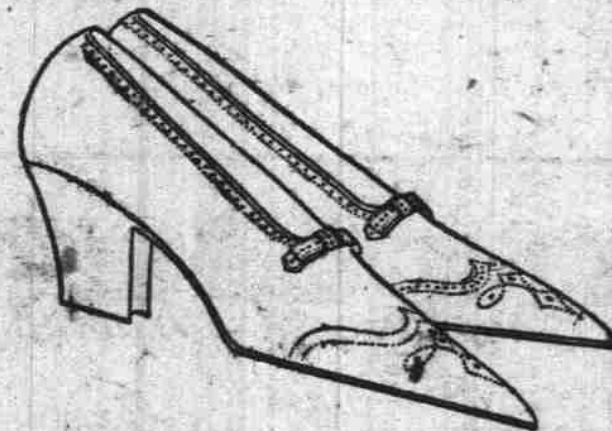
