Crematorium Buys Additional Tract; To Build New Vault

The Portland Crematorium association closed negotiations Wednesday for the purchase of a two-acre tract adjoining its site at East Fourteenth and Bybee streets. The tract fronts on East Fourteenth and runs to the edge of the bluff overlooking the Willamette river north of Bybee street. The ground is covered with trees and will be laid out as a park similar to that which surrounds the crematorium.

Plans call for a large reinforced concrete burial vault similar to the structure which now occupies the southern end of the grounds. The purchase was handled by Ernest Welch, president, and George Baldwin, vice president of the association. Consideration is said to have amounted to about \$20,000.

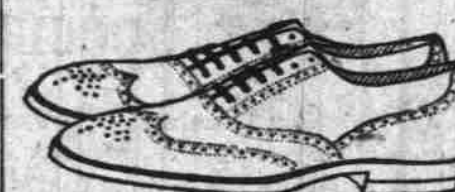
