

STORY IS TOLD OF HOW OREGONIANS FORSOOK JOHNSON

Five Oregon delegates to the Chicago convention, Wallace McCamant, D. J. Cooper, Charles H. Carey, W. H. Brook, and Dow V. Walker, not only violated the pledges they had given the people of the state, it would seem, but some of them also repudiated the mutual promises made each other in caucus on the night before the voting commenced, according to the inside story brought back by returning attendants at the convention.

The first vote of the convention was cast Friday, June 11. The night before the Oregon delegation had held a meeting to discuss what course it would pursue, and decide how long it should stick to Johnson.

COOPER VIOLATES WORD
All the delegates were present at the meeting, with the exception of McCamant, Carey and Cooper, and all pledged themselves and the delegation to vote for Johnson during all of the ballots cast the next day. They were to have a second meeting Friday night and then determine whether to still remain in the Johnson column, or whether to go to some other candidate.

On the first ballot of Friday all of the Oregon delegation, with the exception of McCamant, kept their pledges to the people, and to each other. On the second ballot D. J. Cooper repudiated both his pledge and his promise to the delegation and voted for Wood. He did this also in the face of a telegram sent from The Dalles, on May 26, in which he said: "I am pledged to support Oregon's choice, and if Johnson has carried the state he will receive my loyal support. To do otherwise would be treachery to Oregon Republicans, and any man elected as a delegate who fails to obey the mandate of Oregon Republicans will, in my opinion, be untrue to the people."

MORE BOLTS ON STRAIN
On the third ballot, Judge Carey, Brooke and Dow Walker deserted their delegation, the promise made with it and their campaign pledges and left the Johnson column, despite the fact that he was then on a rising and not a falling tide.

That night the delegation had its scheduled meeting, and a row not on the schedule. Delegates Rand, Olson, Toose, Adams and Johnson, the last of whom alone was a Johnson man by personal choice, went down to the last ditch, casting their five votes with the California delegation for Johnson.

More or less bitterness grew out of the circumstances because of the fact that the five who observed their pledges felt that the action of the bolters would bring the party into disrepute.

Portland's Beauties Can't Be Withstood, Says Meteorologist

Eighteen years in the weather bureau is quite enough to convince any man that the weather, like the eternal feminine, is changeable and uncertain, says T. Forecaster Drake expects to resume his old profession as an accountant. He will live at 696 East Forty-fourth north.
