

## SINNOTT LEAVING ON INSPECTION OF IRRIGATION WORKS

Washington, June 18.—(WASH-INGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—Representative Sinnott will leave today or Saturday to join the house appropriations committee on a trip visiting reclamation projects and national parks.

The party leaves Chicago Sunday, arriving at Klamath Falls from California on the evening of July 7. The Klamath project will be inspected the following day and Crater lake will be reached that evening. The party will leave Crater lake the morning of July 10 by auto, arriving at Bend at 8 o'clock that evening. Leaving Bend next morning by rail, the party will arrive at Bonneville lake in the afternoon, motoring from Bonneville into Portland over the Columbia river highway. The itinerary calls for four hours in Portland, the party leaving for Tacoma at 11 p. m. After an inspection of Mount Rainier national park and the Yakima project the party will retrace Oregon during the day of July 15 to visit the Umatilla project, leaving Pendleton for Boise the evening of July 16. Director Arthur P. Davis of the reclamation service and Director Stephen G. Mather of the national park service will accompany the committee.

## Wife Is Poisoned In Effort to Win Love of Fair Nurse

Bennington, Vt., June 18.—(I. N. S.)—Charged with poisoning his wife, Byron Madison Pettibone, 32, an undertaker's assistant, known as the "village Beau Brummel," was given a preliminary hearing in court today and held for the grand jury.

Love for pretty Miss Helen Irene Mellow, a young nurse, whom he is alleged to have courted often while riding on his employer's hearse, in which reposed a body, was the motive for the murder, according to the authorities.

State officers say Mrs. Eva Bond Pettibone, the wife, aged 49, longed for a home of her own, that she was too domesticated to suit her husband. They charged that Pettibone, having fallen in love with the nurse, decided to get rid of his wife. Pettibone, it is alleged, placed strychnine in a dose of medicine and then waited for his wife to go to bed with him. The attorney general alleges that while Pettibone lay beside her waiting for her to die he kissed her, then lay with eyes closed as she passed away. The investigation has completely exonerated Miss Mellow from any complicity in the case.

## Pope Joins Move to Boycott Goods and Force Slump

Rome, June 18.—(U. P.)—The "no buying" movement begun by the middle classes two weeks ago has developed into a concerted drive by consumers to reduce prices of food and clothing, resulting in many cases in decreases of 30 per cent, according to figures made public today by the ministry of the interior. The movement today received the official approval of Pope Benedict, when all employees of the Vatican announced they would participate in the effort to reduce prices. A number of civic and labor organizations and even many clubs have pledged their membership not to buy articles of luxury.

The movement has gained a strong hold at Milan, Turin and Genoa and is spreading rapidly throughout the country. One Rome newspaper, which promised to carry advertisements of any store making a 25 per cent reduction without charge, has given up the idea, as in one day the newspaper received enough advertisements to fill all available space for two months.

## Robbers Sentenced To Whipping Post By Canadian Judge

Vancouver, B. C., June 18.—(I. N. S.)—Revel of the whipping post is expected to put an end to an epidemic of robberies with violence here.

This morning Police Magistrate Shaw sentenced James Holmes and Joseph Ellis, two young men who had maltreated and robbed an elderly man in broad daylight last week, to five years in the penitentiary and 10 lashes each with a cat-o-nine-tails. The arrest of the men was brought about by a band of little boys who saw the crime committed, some of whom kept the men in sight while others telephoned the police.

## Portland Girl to Get Bond From Estate

Baker, June 18.—According to the estimate of appraisers, the estate of John Steiger, wealthy Baker county sheep raiser, who died suddenly Friday, is valued at \$50,000, of which more than \$30,000 in land and personal property is willed to his widow. The remainder is divided among grandchildren, nephews, nieces, brothers and sisters and half-brothers and sisters. Miss Myrtle Jane McDaniel of Portland, a granddaughter, is to receive a \$1000 Liberty bond.

## Italy's War Claims Over Twelve Billion

Rome, July 18.—(I. N. S.)—Italy's claims for war reparations total 66,000,000 lire (approximately \$12,738,000, 000 at present war money values) and a bill for this amount will be submitted at the Spa conference, the Giornale D'Italia stated today. This sum includes the cost of soldiers' pensions.

## Effort Promised to Halt Rise in Price of Clothes

Washington, June 18.—(I. N. S.)—Threatened high prices for fall clothing are to be nipped in the bud by the department of justice, Howard E. Figg, special assistant to Attorney General Palmer, today announced the beginning of a drive aimed at the high price of fall wearing apparel which will be along the same lines as those which brought spring prices tumbling.

The plan is to organize public sentiment against heavy buying at the opening of the season when the high prices will be at their peak if they are high at all. Wherever this plan fails the department's special agents will start legal proceedings in any case where prosecution seems justified.

## Goldsteins Given 2-Year Sentences

Circuit Judge Gilbert W. Phelps of Pendleton, sitting in Portland, Thursday sentenced Alexander and Harry Goldstein,

found guilty of having received stolen goods, to two and a half years each in the state penitentiary. Alex Goldstein had previously been found guilty on a similar charge and was given a six months' jail sentence. In sentencing the men, Judge Phelps stated that there were three courses open to him—either fine, county jail sentences or terms in the penitentiary. He declared that to simply impose a fine would be making a farce out of justice in the cases at bar.

## Umatilla Governed Largely by Women

Umatilla, June 18.—Women threaten to eliminate the male sex in the government of Umatilla. The women have a majority in the city council and the city is headed by a woman mayor and has a woman recorder, Mrs. Cherry, who has served four years. Two women are now candidates for the school board. The women organized a farm bureau.

## Round-Up Season to Open

Baker, June 18.—The opening round-up of the season is scheduled to be held at the Ebell ranch on Sutton creek, 10 miles from Baker, Sunday afternoon. Bucking and wild horse race contests are to be featured.

## Chief Forester Is Due in Baker on Tour of Inspection

Baker, June 18.—Colonel W. R. Greeley, chief forester of the United States; Chairman Good of the house appropriations committee and Captain F. E. Amos of Portland, chief of the office of forest management in this district, are due in Baker from the East on an inspection tour of Western national forests according to R. M. Evans, supervisor of the Minam and Whitman forests.

## Baker Is Deluged By Heavy Rainstorm

Baker, June 18.—One of the heaviest rainstorms ever known in Baker began at 1:15 Thursday afternoon and ended 45 minutes later, when a precipitation of .37 inches had been recorded. The storm was accompanied by lightning and was renewed in the evening. It is believed that the rain was general throughout the county. Coming after two weeks of showers, the storm has assured the dry farmers of a record crop, and has greatly freshened the ranges.


