

W. J. KERR CHOSEN GRAND MASTER OF MASONIC ORDER

The Grand Lodge of Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons Thursday afternoon elected the following state officers:

W. J. Kerr of Corvallis, grand master; Frank S. Baillie of Baker, deputy grand master; George B. Brown of Salem, senior grand warden; George T. Cochran of La Grande, junior grand warden; James F. Robinson of Portland, grand secretary (twenty-seventh term); John B. Cleland, grand treasurer.

In place of Wallace McCannant, grand orator, J. H. Rakin of Sunnyside lodge delivered the oration Thursday afternoon.

The Rev. J. N. R. Bell of Corvallis, grand chaplain for 41 years, was voted an annual salary of \$150 per annum hereafter. The venerable Mason has a strong comeback and is active on his feet and in his mind.

The working tools and gravel used by Grand Master Earl C. Bronaugh at the laying of the cornerstone of the Masonic Eastern Star home Wednesday will be presented to him by the incoming grand master this morning.

The address of the grand master was of course, much of it, for special consideration. The net gain of nearly 10 per cent in membership during the past year is deplored by him as "feverish activity" and "the cessation of degree work leaving no time or opportunity for the greater things of Masonry." Recommendations are made for a broader interpretation to be placed upon physical disabilities of applicants. Rejection of applicants who do not profess a belief in God is commended as part of the ancient requirements and strict observance cautioned. A more legal form of organization for the building and conducting of the Masonic Eastern Star home by the two orders is recommended.

The grand lodge this morning authorized the issuance of a charter to Alberta lodge, operating under a dispensation, the following officers being present to receive it: William Parker, worshipful master; George N. Costum, senior warden; Dolan Short, junior warden. The lodge has been meeting for over a year at Baker hall, East Seventeenth north and Alberta streets, and is the "baby lodge" of Portland. The report that the charter had been refused was without foundation. Waverly lodge, operating in the southeast portion of the city, did not ask for a charter and is still operating under the dispensation of the grand master.

Gasoline Shortage Acute at Bend; Auto Fuel Is Doled Out

Bend, June 18.—Bend's gasoline supply is the lowest since the shortage began five weeks ago. So acute has the situation become that a citizens' committee will assist the gasoline distributors in doling out auto fuel only to the absolute essentials, including the lumber plants, doctors, mail trucks and milk wagons.

In order to cope with the shortage a meeting was held at which the Bend Automobile association was organized. Walter Combs was elected president, Byron Royce vice president, E. P. Jeck secretary-treasurer, with R. H. Loop and A. W. Bontrager on the executive committee.

The local dealers are in touch with Portland automotive dealers in an effort to purchase several carloads of gasoline from independent companies. Bend has already been promised one carload from this source and will try to purchase three carloads to tide over the shortage.

Lumber Interests Center in Hearing At Washington

Though the Shrin, the Rose Show and Festival features will absorb the attention of most Portlanders next Monday, lumber men will find it difficult to prevent their thoughts drifting toward Washington, D. C. Next Monday the lumber interests of the coast, represented by J. N. Teal of Portland, will submit evidence intended to protect their interests in the general application of the nation's carriers to the interstate commerce commission for vertical increase of rates. The hearing will probably continue until July 1.

PRINTING COURSE SUPPLY BIDS FOR SCHOOL ORDERED

Clerk R. H. Thomas was requested by the school directors Thursday to advertise for bids on supplies needed for the installation of a printing course at Benson Polytechnic school. Director George B. Thomas, who has just returned from Washington, D. C.,

on a mission of locating machinery in surplus army stocks, reported that no printing machinery was available from this source, that what little there had been had been already taken by the vocational board, and that the war department offered no encouragement as to future stocks.
