MOORE TAKEN TO SCENE Moore late this morning was taken the scene of the crime by police and Clackamas county officials, that he might designate the exact spot of the tragedy and settle definitely the matter of whether he and Brake shall be prosecuted in Clackamas or Multnomah

county.

It was reported unofficially that Moore is prepail I to plead guilty to a charge of murder in the second degree. Police found the girl whose statement resulted in the arrest of the pair by working out a clew created when the obtained half of a telephone number which had been used by the young mer who killed Dubinsky.
