Mrs. Boalt Is Suffrage Leader

THROUGHOUT the country the woman suffrage organizations, having finished their fight for the right to vote, are now turning their attention to the problems of the proper use of the ballot and to that end are merging into organizations of various kinds. In the woman suffrage party of Greater Cleveland, which recently became the Cleveland League of Women Voters.

Local interest attaches to this particular organization, through the fact that one of the prominent members of the suffrage party who took a leading part in the transition ceremony was Mrs. Charlotte Woodruff Boalt, mother of Fred L. Boalt, editor of the Portland News.

Mrs. Boalt was one of the speakers at this gathering, reviewing the personalities of the "bloodless revolution" and giving personal reminiscences of Susan B. Anthony, Dr. Anna Howard Shaw, Julia Ward Howe, Frances Willard and others, all of whom she had known personally and with whom she had worked for suffrage in the days when to be identified with the suffrage movement was far from the popular thing that it is today.

One of the notable features of the celebration was a morality play, "Then and Now," which reviewed the fight of the women of Ohio for the ballot, which was won in 1850, ending in victory in 1920. A pageant of a significant character was also given.

Claims New Art for Movies Painted Scenes Replace Sets

Here is what Ferdinand Earle of the Los Angeles film colony claims to have achieved by an entirely new process of motion picture technique, which he has perfected after years of experimentation and research.

For every episode, so that a picture may have as many different "sets" as the story requires. Furthermore, he can, on 48 hours' notice, produce any kind of a setting, ancient, modern or Oriental or Occidental, interior or exterior, high noon or late night, sunny or foggy.

Moreover, Earle says he can give a poetry, a beauty and a romance to his scenes which heretofore have not so much as been attempted in motion pictures. He can lay his scenes in the interstellar spaces or at the bottom of the ocean—and all without moving from his little one-room studio.

By special photographic technique, Earle paints whatever scene he wishes on a small camera board; and when his picture is properly photographed and projected the size of the screen, the eye, so it is claimed, cannot tell that it is not an actual scene taken from nature.
