Morgan Transfer Protested—Resolutions protesting against the transfer of Principal L. H. Morgan from Sellwood to Lehigh school were passed at a mass meeting held at the Sellwood community house recently. Morgan was transferred along with 10 or 12 other elementary school principals in accordance with a policy this year adopted by the school board on the recommendation of Superintendent D. A. Groat.

Loan Fund Offered—The Association of Collegiate Alumnae offers another scholarship loan fund of \$200 without interest, to girls who have been graduates from high school and who will attend some college eligible to the association. Trial Set for Kosevich—Henry Kosevich, indicted by the federal grand jury Friday on a charge of violating the national prohibition law, entered a plea of not guilty before Judge Wolverson Saturday. His trial was set for July 12.

A. L. McDonald, charged with a similar offense, was released on his own recognizance. His trial date will be set later.

Dry Law Violators Fined—Sam Kulich and Dick Roach entered pleas of guilty before Federal Judge Wolverson Saturday to a charge of violating the federal prohibition law and were fined \$250 each, upon recommendation of Assistant United States Attorney Reames. The two were arrested by internal revenue agents while transporting liquor through the main streets of the city.

White Slave Sent to Jail—C. E. Howard pleaded guilty to a grand jury indictment charging him with violation of the Mann act before Judge Wolverson Saturday and was sentenced to six months in the county jail. Howard is charged with bringing Mrs. Isabel Stetson into the state for immoral purposes.
