How to Can Without Sugar

The following article, the first of a series to be published from time to time, was prepared under the direction of Dean Ava B. Milan, of the school of home economics of the Oregon Agricultural college, at the request of The Journal.

The season of rhubarb is at hand and the product is plentiful. Why not can it? Sugar is scarce and high-priced, so why not can it without sugar?

Rhubarb canned without sugar keeps well. More sugar will be required to sweeten it when opened for use than would be needed if added when it is canned—this is true of fruits in general when canned without sugar.

CAN RHUBARB WITHOUT SUGAR
Use fresh rhubarb. Wash and remove all faulty portions. Ordinarily it is best to leave the skin on. Cut the stalks into pieces which are the size and shape that will pack best in the jar. Place in a colander or wire basket and blanch by putting into boiling water for from one to two minutes, then plunge in cold water.

Blanching removes some of the excess acid in the rhubarb and makes less sugar necessary when used. Rhubarb is a very acid fruit.

Pack the rhubarb tightly into glass jars. Never use plain tin containers for rhubarb. Add boiling water to fill the jar. Partially seal.

Sterilize in hot water bath outfit for 15 minutes, or for five minutes under five pounds of steam in a steam pressure outfit.

Remove the jars and tighten lids. Cool, label and store in a dark place. Gooseberries are beginning to ripen and soon the thrifty housewife will be considering what to do with the oversupply.

"Can while you can" is still a good slogan, and gooseberries are cannable. The sugar shortage need not prevent future use. Can them without sugar. Follow these directions:

CAN BERRIES WITHOUT SUGAR
Ripe gooseberries are preferable for canning, since they will require less sugar when opened for use than green ones.

Wash and pick over gooseberries.

Blanch them by putting into boiling water one minute. Blanching extracts some of the acid so that the fruit requires less sweetening when used. Plunge into cold water and then pack in jars. Fill the jars with hot water. Partially seal.

Cook in hot water bath (wash bottle) for 10 minutes. Remove the jars and tighten the lids. Cook, label and store. Gooseberries canned now without sugar may be used in jams, jellies and pies at some future time.

Preserve strawberries with honey and save sugar. A tried and proven method follows:

HONEY STRAWBERRY PRESERVES
Take equal weights of strawberries and honey; mix the two and dry in the sun, or preferably in a warm oven. Put into carefully sterilized glasses and cover with paraffin.

STRAWBERRIES CANNED
Strawberries are said to be the only fruit which is not particularly satisfactory when canned without sweetening. The berries fade quickly and become very soft. With this fruit it is almost necessary to use some form of sweetening. Strawberries canned by the cold pack method should not be boiled in the cans more than 15 minutes.

USE HONEY INSTEAD OF SUGAR
Strained honey may be used to replace sugar in many places in cookery. The resulting products have a pleasing flavor most characteristic of honey. If the following simple rules are observed most desirable results may be obtained:

Use one cup of honey to replace one cup of sugar, then decrease the quantity of milk used in the recipe. Use one-fifth cup less milk for each cup of honey replacing the sugar.

Spices give a most desirable flavor when used with honey in all flour mixtures.

Conserve sugar by using honey, syrup, dried prunes, raisins, figs, dates, pears, peaches.

POINTED SUGAR SAVERS
To sweeten your cereals serve them with syrup or with sweet fruits. The fruit sweetens and less sugar is required in serving. The following are good combinations: Rice or cream of wheat with raisins; dates with cream of wheat, or wheatine, farina or cream of wheat with figs.

A few raisins in the rhubarb sauce not only add flavor but help out in the sweetening.

Conserve sugar by using fruit for dessert instead of rich pies and puddings. Raw, stewed or baked fruits, dried or fresh, and dried sweet fruits like dates, figs and raisins.

Bake or stew fruit with corn syrup instead of sugar. For stewing use a half cup of syrup to one pound of fruit. When dried fruit is used, soak it first in water over night and cook for 10 minutes.
