

SOLDIER CONVERTS CURIO HOBBY INTO USEFUL DIVERSION

Packages From Battlefields Form
Interesting Collection; Articles
Are Turned to Real Use.

W. C. Burghardt says that patience will accomplish almost anything. When he was one of Uncle Sam's soldiers in the world war he was deeply infected with the curio fever. He was allowed to send but one 7-pound package at a time from the bloody battlefields in France to his home in Parkplace overlooking the Clackamas river. But, persisting from day to day, he sent one package after another.

BIG COLLECTION GATHERED

Upon his return to home scenes he found he was the possessor of two captured German swords, a dozen German shells, a cruel, saw edged German bayonet, a tank shell, some of the shells from the famous French 75's and other relics of the great war that some day, of course, will be priceless.

The ex-soldier at once made for himself a job. With the same patience and persistence that he had exhibited in getting the curio home, he set to work upon them. His German and French shells became highly polished vases and upon their shining surface engraved are the Lorraine cross and the Portland rose. A little easel he created from German rifle cartridges surmounted by a French sp-franc piece.

USEFUL ARTICLES MADE

A German trench mortar shell, the valve from a French engine and the brass cup from a Belgian locomotive have become a really remarkable ash tray for home decoration. He made an exceedingly clever powder jar to please any lady's vanity from the portions of two French 75 shells. An attractively formed paper knife boasts of such antecedents as a portion of a German rifle for a handle and a section from a French 75 shell for a blade.

Burghardt aroused interest in his ingenious transformation of the weapons of war into decorative utilities of peace when he brought them to The Journal office and arrangements were made with Julius L. Meier of the Meier & Frank company to make a window display of them.

Former Dean of Old Dallas College Dies in New York

Dallas, Or., June 19.—Word was received here today of the death of New York of David M. Metzger, for many years dean of the old Dallas college. Since the college here closed, about six years ago, Mr. Metzger had been a member of the faculty of the Northwestern college at Lemars, Iowa. His health failing last winter, he went to the home of a brother in New York. Professor Metzger's widow resides in Minneapolis.

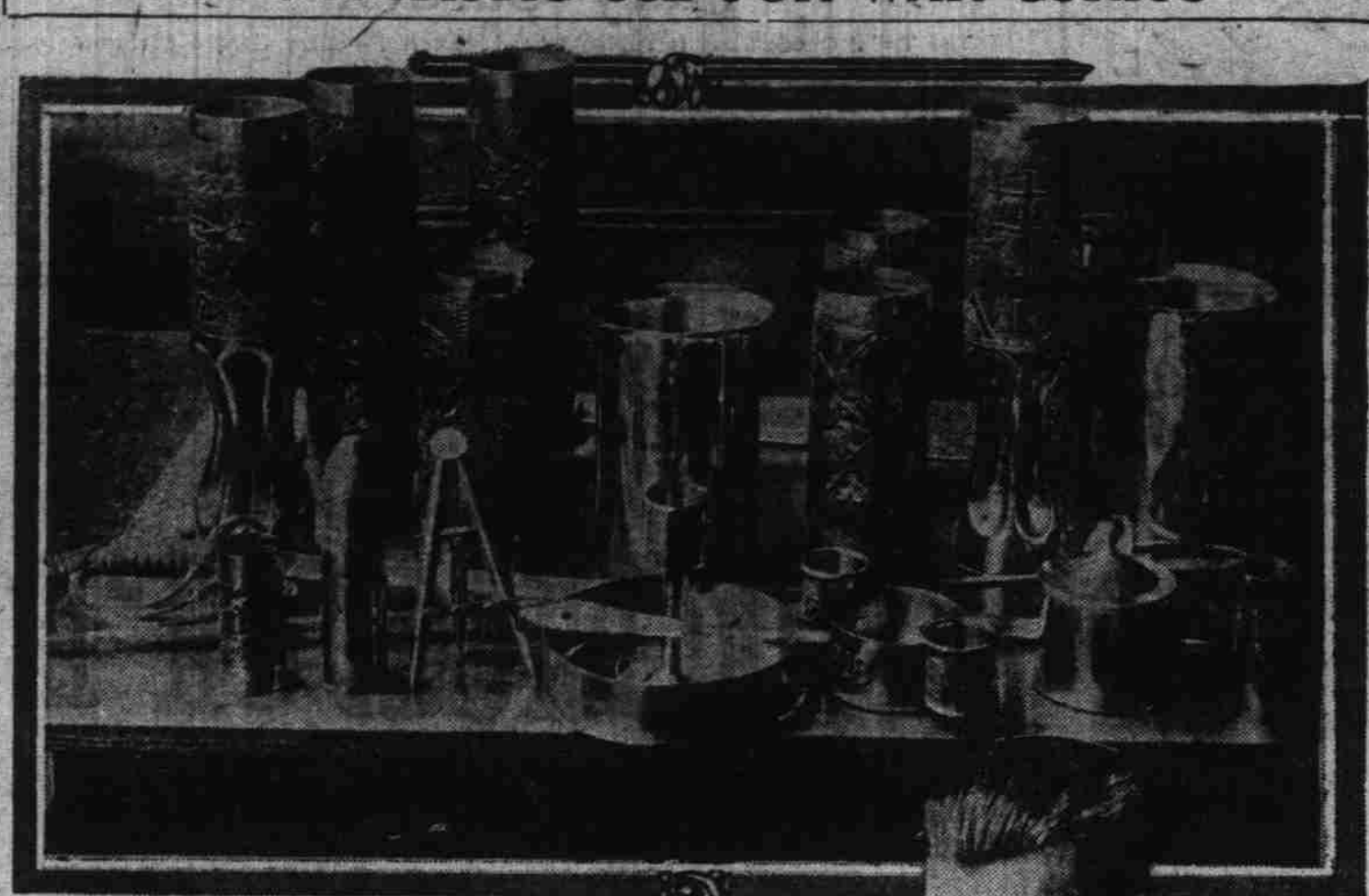

WATER FOR LANDS ASSURED BY VOTE

Grants Pass District Approves
\$400,000 Bond Issue for
Gravity System

Grants Pass, June 19.—Bonds to the amount of \$400,000 were voted upon today by the land owners of the Grants Pass irrigation district. Only three dissenting votes were cast while 90 were polled in favor of the bond issue.

This will assure the completion of the gravity system for the irrigation of 10,000 acres of Rogue River valley lands. The 1920 work on the project was completed this week and water is now flowing in the three canals constructed this year.

The plans as now laid out by the engineers include the building of a diversion dam across Rogue river at a point about five miles above this city. A 20 foot canal will be built to bring the water onto the lands lying below Grants Pass. The three canals already built are to be used as a part of the permanent system.

Temporary pumping plants were installed this year but these will be done away with when the gravity system is completed. Only one pump, electrically driven, will be used in the permanent project, this one being used to force the water to a higher level.

The estimated cost of the project has been placed by the engineers at \$725,000. Bonds amounting to \$250,000 were voted in 1917 and were purchased by Ralph Schneeloch of Portland. The Schneeloch company has assured the directors of the district that it will take the issue voted upon today.

Contracts will be let immediately for the construction of the canals and the work of the project. The dam will be built this summer at the low stage of the river. Work will be pushed in order that water from the gravity system will be available next year.

Many Spruce Trees In Siuslaw Forest Dying With Fungus

Tideland spruce trees from Waldport south a distance of 40 miles and extending back for one-fourth of a mile are turning brown and dying, asserts Forest Ranger Martin S. Durbin of the Siuslaw National Forest. He consulted with J. Jaenicke, the insect specialist, on the cause of the disease. Durbin says the cause of the disease is a fungus which with it the needles commencing to die up and fall off two years ago, but he suspects insects as being the more likely cause.

Durbin is the ranger who discovered the tree bearing the marks of 200 years ago. The tree had been down for 10 years, but was still sound when cut into, and showed clearly the marks of a woodman's ax, which were covered by a 200 years' growth. The tree was in the vicinity of Table mountain, not far from the place where Bruno Hecate is said to have landed.

Ranger Durbin has been 14 years in the forest service.

Seattle Woman Is New President of Ladies of G. A. R.

Yakima, Wash., June 19.—Maude Gardner of Seattle was elected department president of the ladies of the G. A. R. at the annual convention held at the Hotel Grand Pacific. Katherine Mendenhall, Walla Walla, junior vice-president, and Jennie Hoss, retiring department president, will be department counselor. Lura Wagoner of Hoquiam was named department chaplain, with Laverna North, Everett; Mattie Gould, Bremerton; Susie Lounsbach, Port Angeles, as members of the department council.

The convention voted to donate a lot 85 by 100 feet from the three acre grounds about the home at Puyallup to the doctors of Sumner, Puyallup, who will build a \$40,000 hospital on it. In return free medical service will be given.

Japanese Is Given Fine Yakima Sheep

Yakima, Wash., June 19.—H. Stanley Coffin, rancher of purebred sheep, has presented to Dr. Iga Tsunamura, livestock commissioner of the Japanese department of agriculture and commerce, five Romney sheep, four ewes and a ram, which the Japanese official will take with him to his home country. Coffin is a member of the international advisory committee of the Japanese department of livestock.

WATER FROM 263 OREGON STREAMS WILL BE UTILIZED

Permits Issued Involve Outlay of
\$1,600,000 in Improvements;
For Power, Irrigation, Mining.

Salem, June 19.—A total of 263 permits for the appropriation of water from Oregon streams has been issued by State Engineer Cupper since January 1 last. These permits involve the development of approximately \$200 horsepower, the irrigation of 41,685 acres of land and the development of 10 mining prospects, and will require an outlay of approximately \$1,600,000 in improvements.

Among the more important projects involved are the following:

Talent irrigation district, 148 second feet of water from various tributaries of Rogue river for the irrigation of approximately 7000 acres of land near Talent in Willamette county at a cost of \$7500. E. H. Pratt et al and W. J. Welch et al, Haines, right to construct the Pratt, Elk Lake and New Summit Lake reservoirs and to appropriate the water for supplemental supply for approximately 4000 acres in Baker county.

Mallie J. Greeley and D. D. Joslyn, Jordan valley, right to construct the Jordan reservoir and appropriate the stored water for the irrigation of 1351 acres in Malheur county at an estimated cost of \$6000.

Permits have been issued to the cities of St. Helens and Heppner for municipal water supplies. The city of Solo secured the right to appropriate water from Thomas creek for the development of 263 horsepower for municipal purposes. The larger power developments are to be by the Bend Water, Light & Power company, Bend, for the development of 4223 horsepower on Tumaia creek, and the Enterprise Electric company, Enterprise, for the development of 1253 horsepower on the east branch of Wallawa river.

BUENA VISTA MAN WINS SCHOLARSHIP

A. W. Loy Awarded \$100 Prize for
Work at O. A. C. in Dairy
Husbandry Classes.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, June 19.—The J. M. Dickson scholarship of \$100 has been awarded to A. W. Loy of Buena Vista, a junior in dairy husbandry. Awards are restricted to five students majoring in this department having the highest average record of scholarship at the end of the junior year.

The student receiving the award must show initiative, pleasing personality, and such other qualities as would indicate capacity for leadership. The scholarship was established by the estate of J. M. Dickson, to commemorate his services to the dairy industry of the state and his faith in education as a factor in the development of agriculture. The scholarship was announced by C. C. Dickson of Shedd, the first graduate of O. A. C. to offer a scholarship. Dickson, who was graduated in 1910, is a prominent Jersey breeder.

Miss Aya B. Milam, dean of home economics, and Miss Zella Felke, secretary, have left for Colorado Springs where they will attend the thirteenth convention of the National Home Economics association. Dean Milam will be a leading figure on the program of the convention. Miss Felke, formerly a student in industrial journalism at O. A. C., will report the convention and gather material for a magazine article.

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
