

REPUBLICAN TARIFF PLATFORM AT SEA; FREE TRADE TREND

Pressure Coming to Get Congress to Reduce Tariff; Present Conditions Are Unsettled.

(By United News)
Washington, June 19.—The Republican platform statement that it is impossible to outline a tariff program at the present time, because of unsettled trade conditions, was declared today to be in line with the findings of federal tariff commission experts that the United States may be tending in the direction of free trade.

While the platform declaration favors the time honored principle of protection, the prediction is made that strong pressure will be placed on congress in favor of lowering the tariff.

BUSINESS PRESSURE SEER

The pressure will come, it was predicted, from business interests which always have insisted on protection.

The reasons for the change are described by William S. Culbertson, member of the tariff commission.

FREE EXCHANGE FAVORED

"It does not seem surprising to us to find men interested in foreign securities, shipping and the export trade in favor of the freer exchange of goods with foreign nations.

"To the person taught in the American school of high protection it is disconcerting at first to have manufacturers indifferent to the tariff, or even advocating a lowering of it on their goods.

INDUSTRIES WORLD WIDE

"In other words, some of our industries have become world-wide in their operations, and under such conditions freer trade relations are in their interests.

Culbertson draws the conclusion that "the age of exclusive and prohibitive general tariffs has passed, but that is a very different thing from concluding that we are about to adopt the policy of free trade.

CONDITIONS ARE CHANGING

"As long as we were a great exporter of foodstuffs, the tariff on such products was largely nominal, since prices were fixed in the international market. But conditions are changing. The growth of manufacturing and of city population is rapidly absorbing the products of our farms and ranches.

"We may expect soon to become dependent upon foreign countries for a part of our supply. Under such conditions a tariff on food products will become a real value to producers. It is likely, therefore, that the demands of manufacturers for free foodstuffs and raw materials will meet with opposition."

Hood River District Roused Over Election of School Trustees

Hood River, June 19.—For the first time in many years interest in a school election is being evinced here. Four candidates are seeking two posts. For the one-year term, the incumbent by the resignation of Mrs. Alma Howe, Dr. Jenkins and Mrs. Charles H. Castner are candidates, and for the three-year term Charles E. Clark, incumbent, and Dr. V. R. Abraham are to offer themselves.

Mescham, formerly the Star professional singer, was the entertainer on a program arranged by the women's club. The building was filled to capacity.

M. M. Graybeal to Be Head of Gravel Works at Umatilla

Umatilla, June 19.—M. M. Graybeal has been appointed superintendent of the Jones Scott Gravel works here and will take charge of the plant July 1. He succeeds D. C. Chapman, who has been transferred to Spokane. Graybeal has been in the employ of the Jones Scott company since October, before coming to Umatilla in the U. S. reclamation service at Irrigon and also served several years in the U. S. marine corps. The gravel works are running to full capacity to keep up with the demand for building material.

U. of O. to Keep in Touch With Alumni

University of Oregon, Eugene, June 19.—Adopting a plan which had its origin at Princeton university, the University of Oregon hopes in the future to keep in closer touch with its alumni and former students. The eastern scheme calls for the publishing of a bi-monthly alumni periodical, but of lectures prepared and delivered by the faculty and touching matters of general cultural and scientific interest which would prove of interest to the graduates. It is hoped by this plan to hold the alumni in a state of active interest in the university as it exists at the present and not to have them interested solely for the sake of the past when they were students. Publication of the lectures will probably begin next fall.

To Celebrate Half Century in Pulpit

The Rev. A. J. Joslyn of Canby will complete and commemorate his half century in the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal church at an all-day celebration July 4. The celebration will be in the Rock Creek Methodist church near Needy, Or. The Rev. Mr. Joslyn preached his first sermon July 4, 1870, on the old camp ground near Needy. Superintendent E. E. Gilbert of the Salem Methodist district will also be present.

School for Officers Held at Vancouver

The officers' school for commissioned officers of the Fifth infantry was held in Vancouver last week for four days beginning Monday morning. Colonel C. E. Dentler was special instructor. Colonel Koester, commander of the post, and Major William S. Gilbert, chaplain of the regiment, made addresses. There were 23 commissioned officers and 52 enlisted men recommended for instruction in the school. The officers and enlisted men will prepare the camp at Camp Lewis for occupancy by the Fifth infantry, National Guard of Oregon, from July 6 to July 19, when the annual training and outing will be given.

State C. E. Convention

Spokane, Wash., June 15.—About 1000 delegates from all parts of Washington will be here for the twenty-second annual state convention of the Christian Endeavor society, which will be held here June 24 to 27. This will be the first Christian Endeavor convention held here for 13 years and also the first state convention of the organization since 1917.

\$15,000 PREMIUMS WILL BE OFFERED AT COUNTY FAIR

Farmers and Stock Raisers of Northwest to Benefit; Many Counties Have Asked for Space

The 1920 Multnomah county fair program is rapidly being brought into shape by Manager C. D. Min-ton, who has made announcement that space in many of the pavilions has already been entirely reserved. About \$15,000 in premiums will be offered to the farmers and stock raisers of the Northwest this year.

The manufacturers and land products shows have again been combined with the county fair. With only one exception every grange in the county has prepared an exhibit and taken space in the big pavilion. Several other counties in the state have also reserved space. Spaces for agricultural exhibits have all been reserved, even though the fair will not be held until October 4 to 9.

SCHOOLS TAKE SPACE

The county schools have spoken for all the space in the children's pavilion and the public schools of Portland have reserved the extra space in the balcony. The children of the county have already promised enough livestock to make a fine showing for the county, but in addition large herds of cattle, as well as horses, hogs, sheep, poultry and pet stock are coming. The entire machinery pavilion has been taken over by the automobile men, so that it will be necessary to provide a big tent to handle the heavy farm machinery exhibit. Much of the outside space for manufacturers and merchants is also gone.

AUTO AND HORSE RACES

Among the features will be included automobile and horse racing. Monday and Tuesday will be given over entirely to automobile races by two of America's professional drivers. The horse race program starts Wednesday with the 2:24 trot and pace, five furlong run and run for 2-year-olds. The latter race is scheduled to encourage the training of the young horses. Thursday the Meier & Frank purse of \$1000 will be competed for in the 2:08 pace. Julius Meier is an enthusiastic booster of this sport and has made the race possible by his offering. There will also be a 2:15 trot of \$500 and a 2:15 pace accompanied by six-furlong run, and one mile run.
