

BALTIMORE TIED UP IN RAIL STRIKE

Baltimore, June 21.—(I. N. S.)—Baltimore today is in the grip of the new unauthorized strike of railroad workers which had its inception in Philadelphia last Saturday.

Freight movements on the Baltimore & Ohio and the Pennsylvania railroads were practically at a standstill today. As far as could be learned the Western Maryland railroad has not been affected.

A drastic embargo on freight shipments of every description has been declared on the B. & O. lines east of Cumberland. An embargo on all kinds of incoming and outgoing freight shipments except food for human consumption and coal for public utilities and hospitals has been declared on the Pennsylvania lines.

BROTHERHOODS MAY ASK WILSON TO SPEED DECISION
Washington, June 21.—(U. P.)—Railroad brotherhood heads may appeal to President Wilson to hasten decision of the railroad labor board on wage cases now before it. W. N. Doak, vice president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, said today that the delay in handing down its decision for the unauthorized walkout of railroad men in Philadelphia and Baltimore. Doak conferred last night with the representatives of the Baltimore strikers and declared that "he is hopeful" that the men there will return to work today.

Wilmington Men Out
Wilmington, Del., June 21.—(I. N. S.)—The strike of the railroad yardmen spread to Wilmington today. After an all-night meeting 100 yardmen, mostly employed by the Pennsylvania railroad, quit work.

RACE RIOTS BREAK ANEW IN CHICAGO

wounded in the riots were Joseph P. Owens, a negro policeman who was shot through the lung while attempting to aid Rose and Hoyt, and William Carter, a negro butler, shot through both legs while running from the scene of the riots.

CITY IS STIRRED
The entire city was stirred by news of the outrage and policemen were rushed to points throughout the negro district to prevent further disorders. The riot occurred at the conclusion of a parade said to have been led by "Elder" Grover C. Redding and Joseph Ferno, self-styled "princes of Abyssinia," and leaders of the "Star Order of Ethiopia and the Ethiopian Mission to Abyssinia," a radical movement which

is said to have been organized for the purpose of inducing American negroes to emigrate to Africa.

Clad in fantastic garb, the paraders, numbering several hundred negroes, marched and rode on horseback through the city's "black belt," carrying the red, green and yellow banners of Abyssinia, with the lion of King Menelik upon them.

FLAG CAST IN FIRE
The parade wound up at a street corner, where the marches started to build a bonfire. One of the paraders produced an American flag from beneath his flowing robe and tossed it on the fire. Policeman Owens, who was standing nearby, rushed forward and attempted to rescue the flag. Instantly several of the flag desecrators pulled short rifles from beneath their robes, and one of them fired on the policeman, dropping him to the sidewalk.

Seeing the policeman fall, Rose, who had been automobile riding with two other sailors from Great Lakes, leaped from the machine and started to his rescue. He was shot through the side, and ran into a nearby cigar store. Several of the negro fanatics followed him and fired a volley into the store. The bullets struck both Rose and Hoyt, who was in charge of the store. When the two sailor companions of Rose reached his side a moment later, after bucking their way through the mob of growling, threatening blacks, both men were dead.

BULLETS DISPERSE MOB
While the shooting was going on a second American flag was thrown on the bonfire by the frenzied mob. It was rescued by Policemen Buckley and Vaughn, who, rushing to the scene when the shooting started, drew their revolvers and began firing into the negro mob. The latter dispersed under the hail of bullets. The police also are investigating a report that the "back to Abyssinia" movement has the backing of the I. W. W.

Colby Confers With Wilson Before Going To San Francisco

Washington, June 21.—(I. N. S.)—Secretary of State Colby conferred with President Wilson for nearly an hour today on the eve of his departure for the San Francisco convention. It is understood that the administration program and possible turns of the convention were discussed. The secretary will be in New York tonight and will leave for San Francisco tomorrow morning.

Freewater Cherry Day Is Called Off; Gasoline Is Short

Freewater, June 21.—The Freewater Commercial club has decided to call off the Cherry day celebration, due to the shortage of gasoline.

James Dodd of East Freewater claims the honor of having the champion cherry tree of the valley, having sold \$70 worth of cherries from the tree.

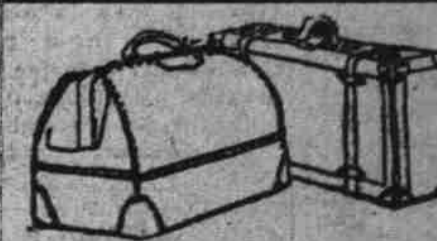
