Mrs. C. B. Simmons, regional director for the Pacific Coast states for the National League of Women Voters, left Monday evening for Seattle to meet Mrs. Maud Wood Park of Boston, president of the league; Mrs. Solon Jacobs, secretary and director at large; and Dr. Anna E. Rude of Washington, D. C., one of the prominent national workers of the league. Together the women will come to Portland Wednesday, arriving early in the morning.

The visitors will be taken on a trip up the Columbia river highway, where breakfast will be served. Mrs. Dallas Bacha being in charge of this feature of the entertainment. In the afternoon between the hours of 3 and 5 o'clock the three Eastern women will be guests of honor at a tea to be given by the University club. Mrs. Lawrence R. Wheeler, vice president of the Oregon branch of the league, and Mrs. Charles P. McCollough are in charge of the arrangements for this affair. The visitors will speak informally. The tea tables will be presided over by Mrs. Elliott R. Corbett and Mrs. Harry Paul.

Mrs. Park, Mrs. Jacobs, Dr. Rude and Mrs. Simmons will leave Wednesday evening for San Francisco, where they will attend the Democratic national convention. A conference of the Pacific Coast states will also be held in San Francisco, with representatives from several states present.

The Republican convention in Chicago was attended by several representatives of the league, and the women feel that their influence was felt to some extent in the making of the platform, which contains several planks favorable to the league. An effort will be made to have the same influence brought to bear upon the platform committee in San Francisco.

Dr. Anna E. Rude of Washington, D. C., has been connected with the federal children's bureau since September, 1917. She was made director of the hygiene division of the bureau in 1918, and under her personal direction have been carried on investigations, health conferences and the important work connected with the division.

At a recent hearing on the Sheppard-Towner maternity bill now in congress, Dr. Rude presented a very strong and supporting measure. She is thoroughly familiar with the city and rural problems touching upon the hygiene of maternity and infancy. Before coming to the children's bureau, Dr. Rude was one of the leading pediatricians in San Francisco.
