

Portland Club Needs Stronger Pitching Crew to Put It In First Division of Coast Race

Pitching of Beavers Is a Handicap

GETTING a fifty-fifty split in the 14 games played on the road in the last two weeks, the Batting Beavers are not in a position to be consistently called such—are due home to-night to open a three week engagement on the vaughn street lot against Seattle, Oakland and Vernon. The series with Seattle and Vernon will be seven games and with Oakland nine.

On the account of the various parades during the week, Judge McCordie has switched the starting hour of the games somewhat. Thursday's game will start at 1 o'clock, Saturday's and Sunday's double bills will start at 1:30 o'clock. The other games Wednesday and Friday will start at 3 o'clock.

BEAVERS HIT WELL
On their trip abroad the Beavers won four out of seven games with Oakland and lost the odd contest of the clash with the Tigers, which brings them back home with practically the same percentage as they had when they left.

The so-called strong pitching staff did not have the Mackmen buffaloed. The Beavers hit for an average of .257, seven points higher than Vernon's mark for the week. One of the defeats registered against the Beavers can be charged against Umpire Holmes, one of the new ump's that Prexy McCarthy grabbed onto to replace "Red" Held and Ed Finney. Holmes is about the poorest excuse for an umpire in the league, say those who have seen him in action.

PITCHERS INCONSISTENT
This is not all right for the Beavers. Maybe they need it and maybe they need a little sympathy, but in baseball sympathy cannot find a good stopping place.

The Beavers need a stronger pitching staff. Outside of Ross and Sutherland, none of the hurlers on Mack's crew seem to be able to win consistently. Glasier is said to be a comer, and he may make a winner in the Coast league. Polson is a tough luck pitcher. He has lost a lot of games by the one run margin. Deason Jones seems to be unable to work regularly and June is a good reserve pitcher. Kallio seems to be through.

If the Beavers were getting some of the pitching that is accorded the Vernon club, they would be up higher in the race than they are at present, despite the fact that Paddy Siglin is away down in the seat column. Paddy ought to hit about 150 points better, which is not unlikely or has lost his batting eye is a question.

WILL HAVE TO HURRY
The Beavers seem to be an aggressive ball club, though not as speedy as they could be, yet they lose quite a few games by bad breaks. It is up to them to get started in the race, as the date of July is coming on pretty fast, and unless they get into the race with a little more vim and vigor, they are liable to find themselves straggling in the second division for the balance of the season.

The revamped Seattle club is going along at a good clip. Ware's pitchers seem to be hitting their stride, which means that with the breaks they will soon be out of the cellar.

Schuman Is Victor Over J. Sheppard

HEINIE SCHUMAN left-handed the European lightweight crown worn by Johnny Sheppard into a sorry looking mess in the 10 round main event at the Armory Monday night. If Sheppard's title had been a physical object instead of a tacit understanding among him and his friends, his diadem would be resting serenely on the brow of Schuman. Scarcely once during the 10 rounds did the Britisher have any advantage over Schuman. He seemed lucky when he got an even break in one or two of the rounds. In many rounds Schuman's superiority was so marked that a blind man could have detected it. Referee Grover Francis awarded Schuman the decision without protest from the crowd.

Schuman's victory stamped him as a boy of superb class. He worked with the calmness of a master, jabbing his left hand to the Briton's nose and crossing his right with unerring accuracy. He kept on top of Sheppard from bell to bell, made the Englishman miss time after time and otherwise exhibited wonderful ring craft.

Schuman forged to the front in the second round and maintained that lead throughout with the possible exception of rounds 4, 6 and 10. In these sessions Sheppard rallied and the crowd cheered him even, probably besting him occasionally. In the sixth, Schuman nearly went down from a right swing behind the ear. In the eighth and ninth rounds, Schuman hammered the stranger all over the ring. Sheppard came back strong in the final session, but not nearly enough to even up matters.

Sheppard displayed little championship class save in ability to take punishment and willingness to do his best. His left hand looked useless. His right carried a lot of steam, but is much slower than Louisian's molasses in a cold morning. He showed none of the form which we should expect in an American champion.

Young Brown fought himself farther into the hearts of the fans when he gave away weight to Muff Bronson and won handily in 10 rounds. The battle was nearly as vicious as the Brown-Bronson fights. More than once Bronson battled toe to toe with the Brown marvel and time after time he almost lifted Brown off the floor with terrific uppercuts. Brown seems to have a stomach for extraordinary punishment. Punishing him makes him fight like a hungry bear. It is to be regretted that he cannot hit harder. He landed on Muff at least 500 times solidly, but beyond shaking Muff up or momentarily staggering him, the blows had no lasting effect.

Brown literally rained blows on Muff's head, neck, face and stomach. In the last round, just before the bell, Muff was sent staggering backward and almost to his knees from a fusillade of gloves.

Perry Lewis was given a decision over Stanley Willis. The decision was booed and hissed by the crowd. Sympathy for Willis, who was outweighed 15 pounds, was not enough to save him. Lewis, who put up a splendid battle against the fearful odds, led the fans to believe that Willis had earned at least a draw. As it said to Willis' credit that he put up a grand fight against his bulkier opponent, outboxing and outwitting him in every round. Lewis is a cave man—and that lets him out.

Billy Mascott hooked and jabbed his way to victory over Baby Blue. Billy used a swinging left hook and a right uppercut that more than once almost brought Blue to his knees. Blue forced the fight into a corner and on the South Portland Frenchman often enough to bring home the bacon. Mascott looked to be as good as he ever was, if not better.

Frankie Crites and Frankie Landers put on one of the best preliminaries ever staged in Portland. Both boys showed class and provided enough excitement to keep a crowd of 1000 on their feet. Frankie called it a draw and the verdict did no injustice to either boy.

Boost Given New York Set of Ring Laws
Empire State Rules Best Ever Assembled—Poundage Is Increased; Decision on Points.

NEW YORK, June 22.—Stalling fighters and champions who keep their titles "on ice" are dealt body blows in the new rules to govern boxing in New York.

Termed by many experts as the most perfect set of regulations yet compiled to correct the abuses that brought the fight game into disrepute, the new rules are of national interest, because they are the ideals of the International Sporting club, which aspires to become the ruling body of boxing in America.

Stalling became the major cancer of boxing with the prevalence of no-decision laws, and the policy of champions in refusing to fight. Their titles grew with the increasing size of purses which made their championships more valuable, and it became an incurable ill through the absence of rules to curb their inactivity.

Under these new rules, stalling becomes a foul, for which the offender can be disqualified and champions are required to defend their titles in a required bout to a decision every six months as long as there is an eligible challenger.

NEW YORK, June 22.—(U. P.)—With Babe Ruth, Man O'War, Johnstone and Tildens, Gardner and Hagens and Dempseys and Carpenters fighting for top lines, the prospective American Olympic team has been lost in the uncommon rush of sport.

The aspirants for Uncle Sam's team, however, will come out of the dust this week, where they have been hidden, and take a place in the first file. The sectional trials for the team, scheduled Saturday in Philadelphia, Chicago, New Orleans and Pasadena, will put through the first sorting-out process, what perhaps will be the largest number of candidates in history.

From the results of the intercollegiate track meets it seems probable that the team will be constituted largely of college stars. Pennsylvania, winner of the intercollegiate championship, probably will have the largest representation with a good chance for leading six stars on the team.

Notre Dame looks good for a delegation of four, and California and Stanford may land three or four each. The New York Athletic club most likely will have the largest club representation on the team. The Multnomah club of Portland will be represented by two or three athletes.

With an army transport at its disposal, the American committee will not be restricted in the selection of the team. With facilities for taking a team of from 250 to 300 to Antwerp, the chances of "dark horses" are unusually good.

NATIONAL LEAGUE PENNANT RACE TO BE REAL CONTEST

NEW YORK, June 22.—(U. P.)—After a stormy period of insurrections, revolutions and assorted disorders, the major leagues are approaching normal conditions as the eight big time clubs pull up at the one third mark.

Last week was the most stable of the season.

The return of big Jim Vaughn to the Cubs caused the only change in the front lines. Helped by the big southpaw, the Cubs pushed the Cards out of third place.

The American league remained stationary with the Indians, the Yanks, the White Sox and the Red Sox among the select folks and the stevedore passengers of the National League stayed put.

The race seems to be a duel between Cleveland and the Yanks in the Americans, but any club in the National league has a chance to jump into a winning streak and climb to the top.

The leading Reds and the trailing Phils are separated by only 173 points, while in the American league the Indians have a lead of 373 points over the cellar dwelling Athletics.

Both leagues are using the stick with good effect, but the epidemic of slugging which marked the early season has been stopped.

New Location Sought
The English Lawn Tennis association has authorized the All-England club to secure a new location to replace the famous Wimbledon courts. It will be constructed in the same district of London and will provide ample accommodation for the crowds. The lease will cover 25 years. The laying out and equipping of the new grounds will, it is estimated, entail an expense of \$375,000.
