

BERRY GROWERS PROTEST AGAINST NEW SCREEN LAW

Recently the city council adopted an ordinance requiring sellers of berries to enclose their goods with screens or glass, or that electric fans blow currents of air on the fruit, but Monday a delegation representing the strawberry growers who sell their products in Portland, appeared before the council to make protest over the rigid application of the ordinance.

They find it practically impossible, they claim, to conform to the requirements during rush market hours, and that they are placed at a disadvantage with the stall men who have electric fans playing over their berries and do not have to use screens. The health department was instructed to forbear making arrests for violations of the ordinance for the next few days and meanwhile the ordinance will be revamped by Commissioners Fier and Mann to meet the objections.

STATE TO ALLOW \$4898 FOR PATIENTS' CARE AT CEDARS

City Commissioners Bigelow and Mann conferred with the state board of health Monday forenoon and an agreement was reached regarding the payment of charges for keeping of patients at The Cedars. The state board agreed to make an allowance of \$4898 for such costs. It was decided that hereafter anyone who has been for two weeks or more in Portland before becoming an inmate at The Cedars shall be considered as a city patient.

Members of the city council stated Monday they will formulate and present to the next session of the state legislature a bill providing for the maintenance of The Cedars, as they believe the work carried on at this institution should be paid for entirely by state funds.

PROPERTY OWNERS PROTEST AGAINST WOOD ON WALKS

A number of property owners and residents in the vicinity of Francis avenue and East Twenty-seventh street Monday sent to the city council a protest against the wood piles on the streets in the neighborhood, they say, "for such a time and to such an extent as to become a nuisance, as well as being unsightly to visitors to our city." They ask for immediate action toward abatement.

Advertising Banners Barred

An ordinance was adopted by the city council Monday prohibiting the carrying of advertising banners for commercial products on the downtown streets during the visit of the Shriners.

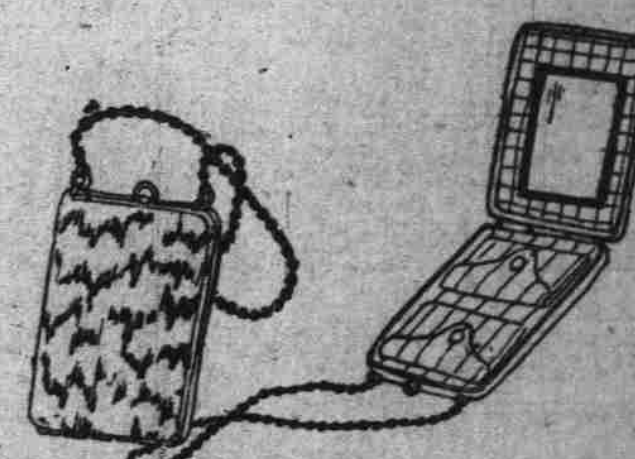
