

1920 WOOL CLIP TO BE FINANCED

Washington, June 22.—(I. N. S.)—Satisfactory arrangements for financing and marketing the present crop of wool have been made at a conference of woolgrowers, western bankers and the Federal Reserve board in session here, it was announced today.

Under the plan devised, woolgrowers may ship wool to the usual points of distribution, obtaining from the railroad a bill of lading for the shipment. The growers may then draw a draft against his bank in such an amount as may be agreed upon by the grower and the bank, secured by the bill of lading. The federal reserve act authorizes any other bank to accept the draft secured in this manner, providing the draft matures in not more than six months from the time of acceptance.
