

WILL H. HAYS, AS HARDING-MANAGER, SOUNDS EULOGY

Washington, June 21.—Will H. Hays, chairman of the Republican national committee, has assumed direction of the presidential campaign of Senator Warren G. Harding. Hays is to be supreme chief of the party's forces. He discussed campaign methods and other political matters with the candidate today, in a conference attended by Harry M. Daugherty of Ohio, Harding's pre-convention political manager, and other leaders. It was determined that the active center of the campaign will be in Chicago, where Hays will spend most of his time between now and November.

IS COMMITTEE MEMBERS
The conference say Daugherty does not resent relinquishing the campaign management and that he will continue active in Harding's behalf. It is understood Hays expects to place him on several committees, one of which probably will be the campaign executive committee, which is to be organized immediately.

Hays expects to have all national committeemen actively at work. The personnel of the campaign executive committee is to be announced Tuesday. It will have 15 members, five of them women, among whom will be a vice-chairman and an assistant chairman.

New York will be important during the campaign, as heretofore, but the real center of things will be in Chicago, and Hays will spend most of his time there. Headquarters will also be maintained in Washington and San Francisco, with a sub-station at Denver.

NOT TO MAKE TOURS
Others at the conference were National Committeemen John W. Weeks of Massachusetts; A. T. Hert of Kentucky and J. L. Hamon of Oklahoma;

Fred W. Upham, national committeeman, and Clarence B. Miller, committee secretary. The conference was held to discuss the date and manner of formally notifying Harding of his selection as a candidate, to name the campaign executive committee, and to consider the general political outlook. It will continue through Tuesday.

The leaders determined today that Harding should "out-McKinley" in making his front porch campaign. He will do most of his speaking from Marion, his home, appearing occasionally in the larger cities on request. There will be no barnstorming or touring. This was decided to be the best political strategy, and an effort will be made to "restore dignity" to presidential campaigning. Governor Coolidge of Massachusetts, Harding's running mate will do like Harding.

MAKES RESERVATIONS
Former Senator Albert J. Beveridge of Indiana, erstwhile progressive, called on Harding Monday and assured him of support. He said, however, that progressives would reserve the right to go beyond the Republican platform on labor issues, and to put their own interpretation on what the platform said.

"Senator Harding is the nominee of the Republican party and we are going to support him," Beveridge said. "But I have my own views on the labor question and I will make my own platform when I get on the stump."
He said Harding would have two objectives in the campaign, rejuvenation of the party and a return to "constitutional" forms of government through party control.

HAYS SUDDENLY ELOQUENT
Chairman Hays, who has maintained silence since the Chicago convention, issued a statement artfully praising Harding. It follows:

"Senator Harding possesses just those vital qualities of mind and heart necessary today and in the time just ahead. His poise of mind, his soundness of judgment, his hold on fundamentals, his appreciation of the needs of today and of tomorrow, his love of the people from whom he came and of whom he is one and his faith in them; his magnificent grasp of large affairs, his great native ability and his training in statesmanship, his regard for the opinion of others, his experience and success in the handling of men, his proper appreciation of his country's position as a responsible factor in the world's future, but with the fullest realization of the absolute importance of our own supreme

BRAKE AND MOORE TO FACE JUSTICE

Russell Brake and George Moore, youths implicated in the murder of Harry Dubinsky, for-hire car driver, a week ago last Sunday, were arraigned before Justice Perry of Milwaukee Monday and were held to answer before the Clackamas county grand jury without bail on a charge of murder in the second degree.

District Attorney Hedges of Oregon City said that it would probably be four or six weeks before the two youths would be brought to trial for the crime revealed by Moore's confession.

Brake, who has maintained a sullen attitude ever since his apprehension, smiled when the charge of murder was read. In company with Moore he was taken from Portland to Milwaukee by Deputy Sheriff Schirmer of Multnomah county and Deputy Sheriff Wilson of Clackamas county. Both were brought back to Portland to Milwaukee where they will be held in safe keeping.

It was learned Monday that Dubinsky's purse, said to contain close to \$30, and a stick pin, were missing when his body was recovered from the Willamette river below the suspension bridge at Oregon City, Sunday morning. This corroborates Moore's previous statement of taking the purse and pin and turning them over to Brake. Several purses were found in Brake's effects, but none has been identified as belonging to Dubinsky.

Division of the \$1000 reward money offered by Dubinsky's parents and friends will not be made for a few days, according to the committee in charge of the funds.

PLAN WITH WILSON DENIED BY M'ADOO

New York, June 22.—William G. McAdoo gave out a new statement Monday. It was prompted by reports that he and President Wilson had been in working contact on the political situation, following the president's interview with the New York World and the McAdoo letter of withdrawal which followed on its heels.

McAdoo says emphatically that there is not a word of truth in the rumor, that he does not know what the president is doing, and that the president is equally in the dark as to the former secretary of the treasury's movements.

"In order to set at rest absurd rumors and speculations which have been published to the effect that my letter of withdrawal had some relation to the president's World interview, or carried a concealed purpose," he declares, "I wish to say, first, that I knew nothing whatever of the president's interview until I saw it in the papers, and second, that the president knew nothing whatever of my letter of withdrawal until he saw it in the public prints."

Some speculation was caused by the fact that the president's interview, which strongly demanded an unequivocal stand on the League of Nations issue, was

First Case Under Federal Motor Law Brings Conviction

First prosecution in the United States district court for violation of the federal motor vehicle law occurred Monday morning. Ray Roland, alias M. X. Dickenson, pleaded guilty to stealing a motor car in Portland and driving it to Seattle and was sentenced to serve 12 months at McNelis Island.
