

FEET, HAIR AND EYES NOTED BY PARADE VIEWER

Didja have any time during the parade Tuesday morning to make a survey of "racial aptitude" with the marching patrols and bands as the subject?

If you did, how many Roman noses, big feet or blue eyes did you count?

As for ourselves, we were too busy keeping from going color blind with all the gray riot of blues, reds, greens, yellows and all the other colors.

But somewhere on Alder street was one man more interested in human nature than combinations of color. He was Ed Crawford, who is campaigning here for a public university. Crawford has studied all about human nature under some of the most brilliant professors of England. After completing a survey of the parade he compiled the following "facts" for the newspapers:

"Ninety per cent of the marchers had big feet," says Crawford. "Yes, boy, and there was good reason for that. Didja see the size of the visitors?"

And almost 90 per cent had blue eyes and wavy hair, except the few that came from families which have long been civilized and they had bald heads, according to Crawford.

Over 10 per cent of the marchers had long faces and about 50 per cent had Roman noses. A few of them were tipped up like the nose of a policeman or a politician.

And 90 per cent were big men—over 6 feet 10 inches in height.

Crawford says the reason for this is that masonry appeals to the big, independent fellow, who has his own initiative, his own ideas and likes to direct affairs. He says that big men almost always answer the same characteristics of big feet, Roman noses, light, wavy hair and blue eyes.

COLOADO

Denver—Colorado's delegation to the Democratic national convention left Tuesday. They will swing their 12 votes to Governor Cox for president after casting complimentary early ballots divided between Cummings, Palmer, Cox and possibly Bryan.

Incendiarism is blamed for the fire which destroyed the Broadway baseball park early Monday morning, less \$20,000.

Rock Mountain consistory No. 2, Scottish Rite Masons, announced that a \$500,000 temple would be constructed at Sixteenth avenue and Grant street here.

Brighton—Nine men are under arrest here and in Denver in connection with Sunday night's attempted robbery of the American bank at Brighton during which Town Marshal Harry Falkner was shot and seriously wounded.

Colorado Springs—Miss Mabel Gillings of Denver died of injuries received in an automobile accident near here late Saturday.

MINNESOTA

Minneapolis—Minneapolis and St. Paul city officials conferred Tuesday in an effort to find means of avoiding the street-car strike. Car men have agreed to postpone the strike until August 1, providing Mayor Hodgson guarantees to probe the company's finances before that date and urge council action to increase fares or expose the company's earnings.

St. Paul—Automatic and manual telephone systems in the Twin Cities will be thrown together Sunday. Subscribers on either system may call numbers on the other system.

Frank O'Malley, wanted for alleged peculations from the county treasurer's office, was arrested in Cheyenne, Wyo.

MICHIGAN

Lansing—Lieutenant-Governor Dickson announced his entrance into the race for the Republican gubernatorial nomination. Auditor-General Fuller announced he is a candidate for re-nomination.

The Michigan securities commission suspended licenses of two real estate firms and reprimanded two others for alleged wildcatting and misrepresentation in connection with the sale of real estate at Marysville.

Detroit—William Solomon, superintendent for Ernst Brothers, plumbing contractors, testified regarding alleged violence by union plumbers in a suit for permanent injunction restraining the unions from interfering with non-union men.

INDIANA

Indianapolis—A jury in the federal court today received the case of Julius A. and Louis E. Haag, charged with unlawfully selling liquor in their seven local drug stores.

Muncie—Twenty freight cars piled up and a thousand feet of track was torn up when the leading car of a freight train split a switch here last night. Loss \$500,000.

La Porte—Carroll B. Hunsree, former secretary of La Porte Chamber of Commerce, appointed executive secretary to Senator Harding. Will open office in Marion, Ohio.

Evansville—Cavins Baughman is being boomed by first district members of the American Legion as state adjutant of the legion at election of officers next week at state convention.

Bluffton—Dr. John C. Fulton, 75, practicing physician in Wells county for over 30 years, died at his home here early today after three months' illness.

MISSOURI

Kansas City—Residents near Swops park began a fight to prevent establishment of a big amusement park on the site of the old Evanson golf course.

Kansas City—The city council took up an ordinance to tax drug stores and soft-drink parlors to make up the deficit in the city treasury as a result of the supreme court's adverse decision on the 3 mills police levy.

TEXAS

San Antonio—Gus Mourmanna, former chief of police, was killed and G. C. Wurzbach severely injured when their automobile was hit by a Katy flyer.

San Antonio won the last three ball games after losing 13 straight.

Dallas—Petitions of protest against 6 cent streetcar fare were filed with the city commission, which will meet tomorrow to consider the petition of the company and to hear demands for a referendum.

Two of officers of the Little Motor Car company, charged with violating the postal laws, probably will begin tomorrow.

The name of George Bailey, anti-administration candidate for governor, was first on the Dallas county Democratic ticket.

MASSACHUSETTS

Boston—Only 120 complaints of rent increase of 115 cases reported to Mayor Peters' housing committee were found to be "not reasonable," it was announced today.

Clarence Verd, aged 35, of Somerville, was seriously injured when an automobile in which he was riding crashed into a tree at Ferry corner.

Two young women were injured when an elevator in a building at 155 Boylston street, Beach Bay, dropped from the first floor to the basement.

Malden—Dr. Charles D. McCarthy, aged 60, former mayor of Malden, died here today from apoplexy.

Lowell—Dr. James E. Keown, Lynn, inmate of the Danvers insane asylum, who escaped Sunday, was captured here today.

Injuries to his feet and legs are reported. The truck driver's case will be brought to the attention of the county officials. Those who were in the party, beside Potts and the driver, were: W. J. Miller, Arthur O'Leary, Frank B. Young and J. N. Goughier, all of East St. Louis.

Two accidents occurred almost simultaneously at 5 o'clock Tuesday night. Elmer Krause suffered a crushed foot by being run down at Thirteenth and Yamhill, by a car driven by a woman, who escaped after the accident. Krause, who lives at 6830 Fifty-seventh street southeast, was taken to St. Vincent's hospital.

The other accident was the breaking in of a large window in Woolworth's 5 and 10 cent store by the convention crowds.
