

LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS HEAD HERE, CONVENTION BOUQUET

We had such success in getting our planks into the Republican platform at Chicago, that we have high hopes for more good work at the Democratic convention toward which we are headed," said Mrs. Maud Wood Park of Boston, president of the National League of Women Voters, who is a Portland visitor today.

"Considering the inexperience of our organization, we feel that we have much to be grateful for in gaining the recognition that was accorded us by the plank for the youth of our land; our plank providing for the prohibition of child labor; our plank providing for instructions in the duties and ideals of citizenship for the youth of our land; our plank for increased federal support of vocational training and home economics; our plank for equal pay for equal work and our plank providing for independent citizenship for married women whereby American boys and women resident in the United States shall not forfeit their citizenship by marriage with aliens and that alien women shall not acquire citizenship by marrying with Americans."

WANT MORE OF DEMOCRATS

"We are hoping that the Democratic party will incorporate all of these and that we can also secure planks for the protection of infant life through a federal program for maternity and infancy care; for federal aid for the removal of illiteracy and increased salary for teachers and for training the foreign born and for increased appropriation for the children's bureau."

"You will notice that our program has to do with matters pertaining to women and children and to properly carry on this work we need every woman in this country as a member of the league. Our program is in no sense a duplication of the General Federation of Women's clubs, the National Congress of Mothers or any other national organization. It is far more inclusive than any of these. The voting body of a country is its most inclusive body and we want every woman voter to give us her moral support by belonging to the league, whether or not she attends our meetings."

WESTERN HELP NEEDED

"It is a little difficult for you western women who have had the vote so long to see the necessity of aligning yourselves with this organization, but the reason is based on altruism; it is not so much that you need the league, but that the league needs you, or rather that the eastern women who are keen for the league, need you. There is no other body of women organized for legislative work on the congressional district basis and that there is work for just such a body to do and that we can get recognition from the parties, which are as yet almost wholly controlled by men, is shown by our success at the Chicago convention. Ours was the only organization that sent representatives before the platform committee on these several matters."

NOT PARTISAN ORGANIZATION

"The National American Woman Suffrage association, out of which the league has grown, had a membership of 2,500,000 organized in state branches. We want to make the league bigger and more comprehensive than that, we want to represent all women, not just those allied with any political party, it includes women of all parties. It is in no sense a separate political party of women, nor does it intend ever to become such a party. On the contrary it encourages women to enroll in the political parties of their choice."

"The magnitude of the approaching extension of suffrage to women is as yet little understood. At the present time there are approximately 15,000,000 women of voting age in states where women are eligible to vote. About three-fourths of this number are in states which have granted suffrage to women since 1914. The total number of women of voting age in the United States is estimated at 27,000,000. There are 1,000,000 and 4,000,000 are in states where women voted in 1914, therefore 23,000,000 new voters will be possible when the thirty-sixth state ratifies the federal suffrage amendment."

"This is the greatest extension of suffrage that has ever been made at one time, and the responsibility so suddenly thrown upon these millions of women must be shared by their more fortunate sisters, who have exercised the right of franchise, hence our appeal for the membership of every woman voter in the country."

TAKEN OVER HIGHWAY

Mrs. Park, accompanied by Dr. Anna Rude of the Children's bureau, Washington, D. C., and Mrs. Emily Newell Blair, active in the Missouri suffrage fight, arrived in Portland this morning with Mrs. C. B. Simmons of Portland, regional director for the Pacific coast states, who went to Seattle to meet them. They were taken over the highway by Mrs. Dallas Bache, Mrs. W. L. Wood, Mrs. C. B. Simmons and Mrs. Elliott R. Corbett pouring. Mrs. Simmons introduced Mrs. Park, who spoke quite informally on the aims and purposes of the league, and urged the Oregon women to enter the ranks of the organization and work for a nationwide body that will be sufficiently strong to

UNIQUE PLOT TO LOOT VAULTS IS HUNG UP TO POLICE

Los Angeles, June 23.—(U. N. S.)—The most unique and daring criminal plot in the history of the police—one in which it was planned to loot storage vaults throughout the country of thousands of dollars worth of jewels, furs and gold by means of a "Houdini" trick trunk scheme—was frustrated here today by detectives. To the frustration of his "big idea," the originator undoubtedly owes his life.

"The trick trunk" robbery plot, which was to have mystified the police of all principal cities, was exposed when officers, springing a carefully set trap, invaded an exclusive storage company's safety deposit vault, opened a huge trunk which had been left there and took therefrom Charles Chandeau, 50, alias Reschneau, a Canadian actor.

Chandeau was nearly prostrated from suffocation. The "trick" trunk was fixed for air, but the vault was not. Chandeau had not counted on that and owes his life to his arrest.

Chandeau's method was this: Hidden in the massive trunk, he had himself placed in the storage vault by a boy confederate, Earl Wilson, 18, who is now in jail. Chandeau was delivered into the vault late yesterday afternoon. In the night he planned to release himself carefully, extract the most valuable jewels, furs and gold and return to his trunk to await the arrival of his sidekick for the trunk. The mystery would then have been solved.

Chandeau's plan was disclosed from a "tip" given by a man approached as an accomplice, but later on "dropped" by the master crook. He claims he came from Quebec.

Democrats at Sea Over Candidates of Wet and Dry Forces

San Francisco, June 23.—(U. N. S.)—A chicken with its head cut off flopping around in the back yard knows exactly where it is going compared to the hosts of Democrats gathering here to select their candidate for the presidency and build their platform.

With a two-thirds vote necessary for a nomination, instead of only a majority as with the Republicans, the chaos of Chicago pre-convention days has descended upon San Francisco, and delegates leaving and arriving delegates confused and confounded.

William Jennings Bryan, it is claimed by some, with his "dry" backing, can prevent the nomination of anybody who does not suit him. It will take but 365 votes—a third, plus one, of the total of 1069 delegates—to do it.

But, warn the friends of Governor Edward I. Edwards of New Jersey, do not overlook the "wets." They will control at least 485 votes in the convention and it is asserted and in their turn, can prevent the nomination of any candidate unfavorable to them.

Borah Refuses to Comment on G. O. P.; Sees Wilson in Race

Boise, Ida., June 23.—(U. N. S.)—Senator Borah, home today after an absence of over two years, told his believed President Wilson would be renominated at San Francisco.

"I don't know why I feel this," he said. "Possibly it is intuition. But I believe Wilson will be renominated for a third term."

Borah declined to comment on the Republican convention.

He said that after a two weeks' rest, he will make a tour of the state "as a senator."

Milton-Freewater Vote Favors New Union High School

Milton, Or., June 23.—In the special election held here to decide on a new union high school, the Milton-Freewater vote stood 210 for to 12 against. Ten other districts voted at the same time.

MINNESOTA FIGHT IS LOST HEAVILY BY NON-PARTISANS

St. Paul, Minn., June 23.—(U. P.)—Jacob A. O. Preuss easily defeated Dr. Henrik Shipstead, national Non-partisan league candidate for the Republican nomination for governor, today in the primary election indicated today.

L. C. Hodgson, mayor of St. Paul, won the Democratic nomination for governor over a field of seven aspirants, these returns indicated.

Representative Anthony J. Volstead, author of the prohibition enforcement act, was defeated for the Republican nomination for congress by the Rev. O. J. Kvale, national Non-partisan league candidate, today's returns indicated.

Kvale was leading by 2000 votes early today.

Volstead's defeat was credited to alleged quotations from him that he had no objection to light wines and beer.

Preuss gained on returns reported early today.

With only 275 small precincts out of 218 in the state missing, the vote was: Preuss 121,573; Shipstead 105,074. Preuss' majority 16,499.

The contest closely followed by the Republican state convention for nomination won out, it was indicated today.

There was little change in the standing of candidates for the Democratic nomination for governor today, Hodgson leading the field with a safe majority.

The Non-partisan league apparently was successful in nominating George L. Siegel, St. Paul, for associate justice of the supreme court.

Gatling Gunners in Prison Stripes Give Guards Hot Chase

Two hundred men in convict stripes walking in lock-step, with three uniformed police guards, paraded through the lobby of the downtown hotel Tuesday night. One of the vicious looking crew tried to make his escape in a shiny automobile, but a dexterous guard shattered his hopes when he brought his long club into play.

Who were they? The Gatling Gun club of Indianapolis, made up entirely of those live Murat temple fess wearers. It is the only organization of the kind in the United States, they say, and they really have the guns, only they weren't allowed to bring them. Their nativity striped uniforms were made just for their Portland trip, and they aren't compelled to wear them at home.

Kansas City, June 23.—(U. N. S.)—Telegrams to Burris Jenkins urging him to place McAdoo's name in nomination at San Francisco continued to pour in here today.

One of the telegrams received was from Eugene C. Bonniwell of Philadelphia. It declared that the Pennsylvania delegation would support the former treasury head on the second and third ballots.

Third Term Plans Not Discussed by Wilson and Colby

Chicago, June 23.—(U. P.)—Secretary of State Colby has not discussed a third term with President Wilson, he declared on his arrival here today from Washington. Colby, delegate to the Democratic national convention from the District of Columbia, is credited with being President Wilson's personal representative at the San Francisco convention.

Colby said he had not discussed a third term with President Wilson or anyone. Colby said today.

He indicated he would strongly represent President Wilson's views on the League of Nations.

"The league should be adopted and the treaty accepted as made at Versailles without reservations—because it needs no reservations," Colby said.

"Americans say what they mean without the use of trapeze language which seeks to avoid the issue. The Democratic party is serious in its League of Nations stand and it is not under the same necessity as the Republican—a defeated party trying to get back into power."

"The Republican party is not in a position to indulge in luxurious and out-spoken phrases and it is trying to weld the conglomerated elements by declarations that alienate no one."

Colby declared he believed the Democratic party would lay a platform that would be "lucid, courageous and American."

Regarding the Republican presidential ticket, Colby said he viewed the candidates with "as much lack of enthusiasm as the Republican party itself seems to regard them."

Wood Alcohol, Bay Rum Cause of Death

Leavenworth, Kan., June 23.—(U. N. S.)—Edgar Wilson was discharged from a hospital here today after the coroner had been notified to investigate his death. Wilson was taken to the hospital when he was found lying in the street, apparently dead. Wilson's "death" was said to have been due to a combination of bayrum and wood alcohol.
