

FEET TOOK HAND IN THE NOMINATION OF WARREN G. HARDING

June 21.—(En Route to San Francisco.)—Poor Warren Harding! Aside from the usual campaign yarns to which a presidential nominee is compelled to listen, he must submit for the rest of his life to inside stories galore of how he was nominated at Chicago. Even to this distance, strange tales have been wafted, telling vividly the way the presidential nomination was bestowed on the Ohio senator. Everybody is given credit for having had the lucky thought between midnight and the sunrise hours of June 12.

For seven years Woodrow Wilson has been told how he was nominated at the famous Baltimore convention in 1912. And it is recorded to this day in the unwritten archives of the Democratic party that Roger Sullivan turned the trick that Bryan did it, that Colonel Harvey did it, that William McCombs did it, that Mitchell Palmer did it.

HARVEY WAS POWER
But the fact is no one man nominated Wilson and no one man nominated Harding. No single boss or leader controlled the Republican national convention at Chicago. A group of men influenced it. Somebody has to do that with an unwieldy body of delegates. It was the contest between two sets of men—Lowden and Wood managers—who tried to manipulate the delegations which brought the deadlock that yielded Harding the nomination.

But to take up seriatim the men who are being credited with having won the nomination for Harding, Colonel Harvey, editor extraordinary, is given publicity for his part. It is true the conference was held in his room but in the same suite was Thomas W. Lamont of J. Pierpont Morgan & Co., and it is a fact that neither Colonel Harvey nor Mr. Lamont controlled any delegates at Chicago, but were merely interested onlookers. Indeed, they were able now and then to make a suggestion to their numerous friends who did control delegates.

BIG STATES CONTROL
Lamont by the way, is a personal friend of President Wilson and came back on the steamer George Washington with him from the Paris peace conference. Lamont served on the financial section of the American peace mission and has been in China and Japan helping to rehabilitate the finances of the Far East, so his big statesmanship at the Chicago convention was merely incidental and he probably had no desire to influence the Republican convention even if he did find commodious quarters with Colonel Harvey at a sumptuous Chicago hotel.

Now Colonel Harvey has been a power in Republican councils, but to nominate him Republican boss is a little exaggerated. The Republican convention at Chicago was hoisted or unhoused, according as one regards the half dozen or more leaders who control the big delegations in any convention, be it Republican or Democratic. Such a group will always exist so long as Pennsylvania has 76 votes and New York 83 and so on. Numerically, the big delegations are leaders and they control nominations when the situation becomes deadlocked.

HOW WOOD WAS HELD
Credit for the nomination of Harding must repose on these men: Senator Penrose of Pennsylvania, and his representative at Chicago, John T. King of Connecticut; Charles E. Warren, national committee chairman from Michigan; Senator Wadsworth of New York; Nicholas Murray Butler and State Senator Tulley of New York; Senator Jim Watson of Indiana; Senator Lodge of Massachusetts and former Senator Murray Crane and Tobias Hert of Kentucky.

120,550 Japanese And Chinese Lived in California in 1919

Sacramento, Cal., June 22.—(U. P.)—The Japanese and Chinese population of California, December 31, 1919, was 120,550.

This estimate is made in an exhaustive report prepared under the direction of the state board of control.

Of that number, according to the report, 53,271 are Chinese and 67,279 Japanese.

These figures do not take into consideration possible increase in Oriental population by smuggling or illegal entry and were compiled from the 1910 census, reports of the commissioner general of immigration and the official records of the state board of health.

The increase in the Japanese population in California from April 15, 1916, to December 31, 1919, was 45,532, of which 35,532 were immigrants and 10,000 born here.

Salt Lake City, Utah, June 22.—(U. Kalama, Wash., June 22.—Fred Younger, residing in the Little Kalama river section, arrested by Sheriff Nougast Friday for having liquor in his possession, was fined \$150 and costs. Younger admitted that liquor was manufactured on his place but says he does not know where the still is located, as he had nothing to do with it personally.

Educate Negroes And They Will Not Riot, Black Claims

San Francisco, June 22.—(I. N. S.)—Declaring that the Chicago race riot on Sunday was "due to lack of education," Titus J. Alexander, colored, of Los Angeles, today appealed to Democratic leaders to insert a plank in the Democratic platform providing for federalization of all primary education, as a means of insuring education for the negroes of America.

"Lack of education and ignorance was responsible for the affair in Chicago on Sunday," Alexander told members of the Democratic national committee. "To prevent such incidents the negro must be educated just as all other ignorant peoples must be educated. We are urging that the Democratic national convention take steps in favor of federalization of primary education in order that the negro may be assured of education on an equal basis with all other races."

Oregon Is Eighth in Membership Drive Of American Legion

Indianapolis, Ind., June 22.—New Hampshire won the American Legion's nation-wide membership "push," May 17 to 22, it was announced at legion national headquarters here today, and will receive the stand of still colors offered as first prize to the state enrolling the largest percentage of eligible ex-service men.

South Dakota won second prize, a stand of woolen colors. The prizes will be presented by the national commander, Franklin D'Olier, at the national convention of the legion in Cleveland next September.

Other states finished in the order as follows: North Dakota, Nebraska, Vermont, California, Kansas, Oregon, Iowa, Washington, Wyoming, Indiana, Maine, Massachusetts and Rhode Island.
