That we'll see you at the parade tonight.

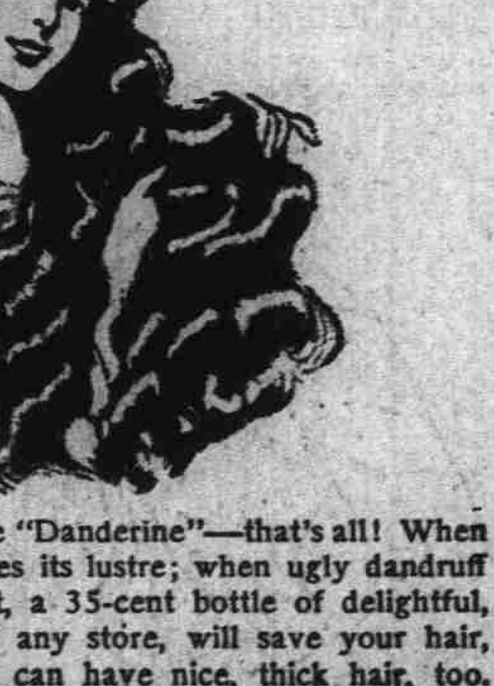


Bellfountain Kiddies
