

HI JOHNSON MAY YET PROVE THORN IN HARDING'S SIDE

Washington, June 24.—(U. P.)—Hiram W. Johnson's sharp criticism of the Chicago convention was the only outstanding flaw today in the fabric of Republican harmony which Senator Warren G. Harding has been weaving since his choice as presidential nominee.

Progressive and conservative Republicans, except the Johnson and Borah factions, have promised support to Harding. Harding's advisers had also received indirect word that Johnson "would be all right" and were expecting his support.

Harding has refused to comment on Johnson's utterances that the day will come when the "people will prevail." Republicans here for the most part do not believe Johnson or Borah will try to lead a third party.

Harding has exerted himself since his nomination to solidify the Republican party. Senator Harding's belief is that Republican victory will be easy if the party is united.

Harding headquarters believes effective harmony can be achieved regardless of Johnson. They do not believe he can repeat his feat in 1916, although his trip on California is admitted.

JOHNSON EXPECTED TO JOLT G. O. P. STANDPATE

San Francisco, June 24.—(U. P.)—Senator Hiram Johnson is "holding his fire," but in due time will jolt stand-pate Republican leaders because of the action of the Chicago convention, Johnson's friends here predicted today, following the return home of the senator.

Johnson, whose progress through the state yesterday was marked by warm greetings, declined on his arrival in San Francisco to be interviewed about politics.

"I have put politics behind me for the time," he said. "I'm going to conduct a front porch campaign of rest."

Johnson's friends said today that he is "literally seething" with indignation against the "bosses" of the Republican party and will not take what he regards as their "team roller methods" at Chicago without a come back. What form this will take and when it will come even Johnson's closest friends have not been told.

Advocates of a third party who are here will see Johnson within a day or two and endeavor to persuade him to bolt and run on an independent ticket.

funds create an endowment that, to their lasting honor, will bear the name of the retiring imperial potentate and his wife.

THREE COMMITTEES APPOINTED

Immediately following the installing of the officers, Imperial Potentate Garrettson announced the appointment of three of his committees. The appointments follow: Philip D. Gordon, Karnak temple, chairman; Albert B. McGaffey, El Jebel temple; Charles E. Hoadley, Pyramid temple; John N. Sebrall Jr., Khedive temple; George C. Nolte, Afrit temple; for the committee on jurisprudence and laws, Lou B. Winsor, Saladin temple, chairman; Herman Hebborn, La Lu temple; James S. Blake, Aleppo temple; Arthur C. Farmer of Akdar temple and Harry E. Sharrer of Orak temple for the committee on finance and accounts; Ellis Lewis Garrettson, Afrit temple, chairman; Ernest A. Cuffa, Alee temple; James S. McCandless, Aloha temple; William S. Brown, Syria temple; Benjamin W. Rowell, Aleppo temple, committee on imperial council headquarters.

The other committee selections will not be made public until Imperial Potentate Garrettson returns to his home in Tacoma.

Noble Forrest Adair of Yasaab temple, Atlanta, Ga., paid a glowing tribute to the way Portland had showered hospitality on the visiting Shriners and their friends during the forty-sixth annual convocation. He made a resolution which was adopted with much wild acclaim in which he thanked everyone who had in any way been connected with the staging of the convention in the Rose City.

EVERYBODY IS THANKED

He mentioned Mayor George L. Baker's name and with it came loud cheering and applause followed by words of praise for Chief of Police Jenkins, Fire Chief Dowell, W. J. Hoff-

The designation of the 1921 convention city was the important matter of business disposed of at today's session of the imperial council at the Auditorium, where the council is bringing to an official close the 1920 convocation—greatest of all gatherings of Shriners.

Atlantic City has twice before been host to the Shrine—in 1904 and in 1918. No temple is maintained there, but Lu La temple at Philadelphia and Crescent temple of Trenton, N. J., are close enough to Atlantic City to make a convention there a matter for their personal interest and it is assumed that they will cooperate in the preparation of the 1921 program.

San Francisco this morning officially announced itself as a contender for the 1922 convention and El Paso, Texas, spoke for consideration in 1923.

The session opened this morning when Richard Jones, famous tenor and leader of the Shriner choir, sang a representative of Islam temple (San Francisco) chanters, appeared on the stage and, placing his arms over the shoulders of William S. Brown, imperial treasurer, and Benjamin W. Rowell, imperial recorder, patriarchs of 26 years' service in those offices, he sang his famous song "Silver Threads Among the Gold." Islam temple chanters sang two selections.

Matters of routine business, such as

the reports of committees, were transacted early in the session.

Esten A. Fletcher, Damascus temple, Rochester, N. Y., was elected imperial outer guard of the Shrine Wednesday afternoon, receiving a majority vote, the second ballot of the imperial council.

Fletcher's choice as outer guard puts him in direct line for imperial potentate in 1922. He was one of eight men nominated last for the position.

Great demonstrations were given for both officers after announcement of the council's action.

Afterwards the units were grouped in two great circles about the field and these lines were supposed to march in concentric formation. OLD FAVORITE IS PLAYED

The old favorite, "Star Spangled Banner," topped off the concert. The last two numbers were directed by Dr. A. Howard Thomas, leader of the famous Lu La temple band of Philadelphia. When they got around to this concert, which was about 12 o'clock, a slight mist had begun to fall and the musicians were compelled to withdraw.

But it was the stunning display of color when all the patrols were mobilized on the field that drew the eye of the onlookers. There were so many flashing uniforms worn by perfectly drilled legions of patrols that one lost all sense of distinction.

The display was to be used with the entrance on the field of each patrol and band. Encircling the field before the grandstand, the formations then took to the side lines until all had entered.

INTRICATE DRILLS AMONG

After the massed band concert exhibition drills were started by the patrols, many garbed in the uniforms that had not previously been worn in this city. The intricate drills, mostly executed on white signals, were carried out perfectly and kept the crowd on its toes all the time.

These drills were continued until late in the afternoon, as some 10 organizations participated. If applause counts for anything, Murat temple patrol of Indianapolis, Ind., carried off the honors of the day.

But after all, the thing that took most was the astonishing display of color. No rajas of the East ever had a more exotic appearing court. The lowering cloudiness of the skies only served to intensify the vivid display on the ground.

3000 BANDSMEN IN CONCERT

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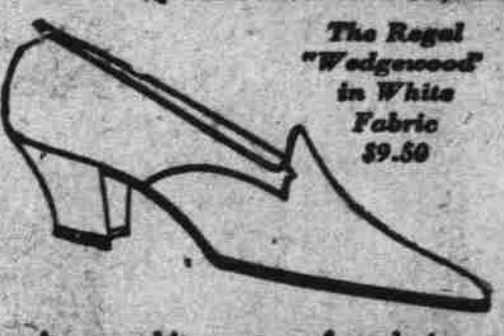
