### JULY 1 WILL SEE NEW AIR SERVICE

Medford, June 24.—Details were completed at a conference between Captain Lowell H. Smith, who arrived Tuesday with Lieutenant H. C. Goldsborough. Sergeant Ambrose and an enlisted man from Mather Field, and local federal forestry and

Chamber of Commerce officials, for a forest aviation service patrol in Southern Oregon and Northern California. Captain Smith is in charge of the Northwest service of aviation patrol service and will make his headquarters at Eugene, while Lieutenant Goldsborough will be in charge of the Medford base. The service will begin July 1. Seven planes will be stationed at Medford base, which will be on the new county fair grounds, one mile south of this city, with first class landing field, seven hangars, a force of 20 army aviation men, including seven officers, enlisted air and signal corps men, one auto truck to haul supplies, and a passenger auto to transport the men back and forth to Med-

ford. A wireless station will also be constructed at the headquarters. Only two of the seven planes will be in use daily. One will make a round trip south to Red Bluff and Alturas, Cal., and the other to Klamath Falls and vicinity. There will be no patrol service north of Medford, instead one of the planes from the Eugene base will make a daily round trip to Medford to get its gasoline supply. Captain Smith flew to Eugene Wednesday to arrange details for the base.

### Farmers to Protest Against Screening Irrigation Ditches

Baker, June 24.—Word has been received that residents of Grant county are preparing to protest against enforcement of the state law requiring irrigation ditches to be screened with a specified patent screen to prevent fish from ascending the artificial water courses. Stockmen and ranchers say the cost of installation is more than \$100 for each ditch and that this screen is no better than others less expensive.

### Proctor, Roosevelt To Support Harding

Washington, June 24.—(U. P.)—Senator W. G. Harding today received assurances of support from W. C. Proctor and Colonel Theodore Roosevelt. Both were backers of General Wood, defeated by Harding for the Republican nomination. Harding also held a conference last week with Rud Hynicka, national committee-man from Ohio, who voted for Wood on several ballots at the Chicago convention.
