First Woman Forest Employee on Duty

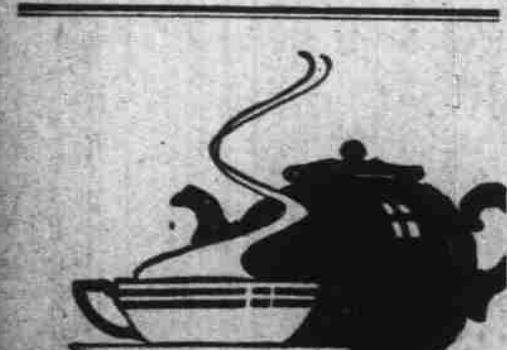
