

Seattle Rainiers Break Their Losing Streak ∴ O'Dowd and Ortega Will Battle Again

Band Jazzes Rainiers Into Winning One

CLYDE WAHES' Rainiers waited, fox-dotted and stepped around the Beavers Friday to the musical strains rendered by the Eagles band, the final score being 5 to 1. The victory was the first scored by Seattle over Portland in nine games this season.

The contest was a snappy one, featured by five double plays, four of which were made by Seattle's "Go-socks" Kenworthy looked like a million dollars around the keyhole bag, handling 13 chances, six of which figured in the double plays. The Beavers played good ball, with the exception of in the fifth when Blue became over anxious trying to make a double play and fumbled Middleton's grounder.

SCORE ON FUMBLE

TWO GAMES TODAY
With Baldwin out of the way in the fifth, Gardner drew a walk. Middleton was safe on Blue's boot, and Bohne landed one, a waste ball, for a double to right field, scoring both runners and taking third on the throw to the plate. Bohne counted on Murphy's out.

Baldwin's walk, Gardner's double, Bohne's single and Murphy's sacrifice fly gave Seattle its last two runs. Stump's error and singles by Glazier and Wistler gave Portland its marker in the eighth.

There will be a double-header this afternoon, the first game starting at 1:30 o'clock. The Eagles band will take part in the matinee and, according to Bill Klepper, the Rainiers will jazz through the rest of the week without a defeat. Score:

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College and Club Stars In Tryouts

NEW YORK, June 26.—(U. N. S.)—The cream of the nation's athletes will match brawn and endurance in four great Olympic track and field tryouts today in widely scattered cities.

Philadelphia, Chicago, New Orleans and Pasadena will be the scenes of these contests to determine eligibles for the first tryouts for the American Olympic team, scheduled for Boston, Mass., July 18 and 17.

Never before in the history of Olympic competition in this country have there been so many aspirants for the honor of representing Uncle Sam in the classic Olympiad and never before has interest run so high.

The stadiums of three famous universities, Franklin field, at Philadelphia; Stagg field, Chicago, and Tulane stadium at New Orleans, will be the scenes of the Eastern Mid-Western and Southern tryouts, respectively. At Pasadena, Cal., Tournament park will be used.

Every college and athletic club star who aspires to compete for Uncle Sam at Antwerp will get into action in one of the four great meets. Some idea of the class of the entrants may be had through the mention of the names of the few outstanding stars who will compete.

Two Hundred in Central Meet
Chicago, June 26.—(U. N. S.)—Approximately 200 track and field athletes, all of them stars of the Western conference universities, Mid-Western athletic clubs and Missouri valley colleges, assembled at Stagg field here early today for the Mid-Western Olympic tryouts.

The full list of 19 track and field events was scheduled for the day and the men entered as contestants in them were declared by old-timers to represent the greatest galaxy of stellar athletes ever gathered together at the University of Chicago.
