

JOURNAL'S SEAPLANE EXPRESS SERVICE GETTING RESULTS

Daily Trips From Portland to Seaside Are Being Made; Readers Given News Right Off Press.

The hum and jollity of the last week's festivities almost overwhelmed all other sound, so far as Portland was concerned.

But through it all the Journal's seaplane express, carrying the last word in convention news, and the news review of the day throughout the world, speeded daily upon its way to Seaside.

Undaunted by storm or by the stress of the Portland funmaking, this unique newspaper delivery service, the first of its kind in the world, was exemplified every day. The Journal's interest in the most prompt possible service to its readers.

The affairs of the nation's temporary oasis notwithstanding, Seaside was reading the Journal within two hours after it was off the press every day during the Shrine convention and the Rose Festival.

TO MAINTAIN SERVICE
And throughout the summer months, when many hundreds of Oregon people will be enjoying themselves at Seaside and Astoria, dependent upon The Journal for the world's news and the news of the home town, wherever it may be, the same extraordinary service will be maintained. The Journal's first afternoon edition will arrive at Seaside daily except Sunday, within two hours after it is printed.

The Journal seaplane express has been received at Seaside as a permanent institution; while Portland has been engrossed the intensive activity of the week the demand upon the newspaper carrying capacities of the big seaplanes has constantly been increasing.

With carrying space packed with Journals, the air delivery planes have taken the time element out of newspaper delivery service and, since the establishment of the service a week ago last Wednesday, an average time of less than two hours has been maintained on Journal delivery between Portland and Seaside.

ASTORIA TO COAST
Now comes the announcement of the Astoria city council, whose members have agreed to do everything possible to accommodate the seaplanes that would alight there if a suitable airstrip were created. The council has approved plans for a skiway and will have the work completed by the end of the summer. After that the Journal will be delivered at Astoria as well as at Seaside throughout the summer season from the seaplane express.

The last week has seen some highly unpleasant weather from the aviator's point of view, but pilots from the Oregon, Washington & Idaho Airplane company have been undaunted and the daily trip has been made as regularly and as safely as is possible by any other method of transportation.

REAL BUSINESS SEEN
Seaside has been brought to realize that both The Journal's circulation service and the Oregon, Washington & Idaho pilots mean business in the unique delivery system that The Journal has established for the first time in newspaper history. The Journal has been delivered daily approximately ten hours earlier than had been possible by train and the innovation has been received with anxious awaiting the arrival of the plane each day.

Hopping off from the landing basin here, the big planes reach Seaside every day in not more than two hours, with the exception, of course, of such days as June 21, when the wind and rain ran in a heavy storm and required two hours and 10 minutes for the flight.

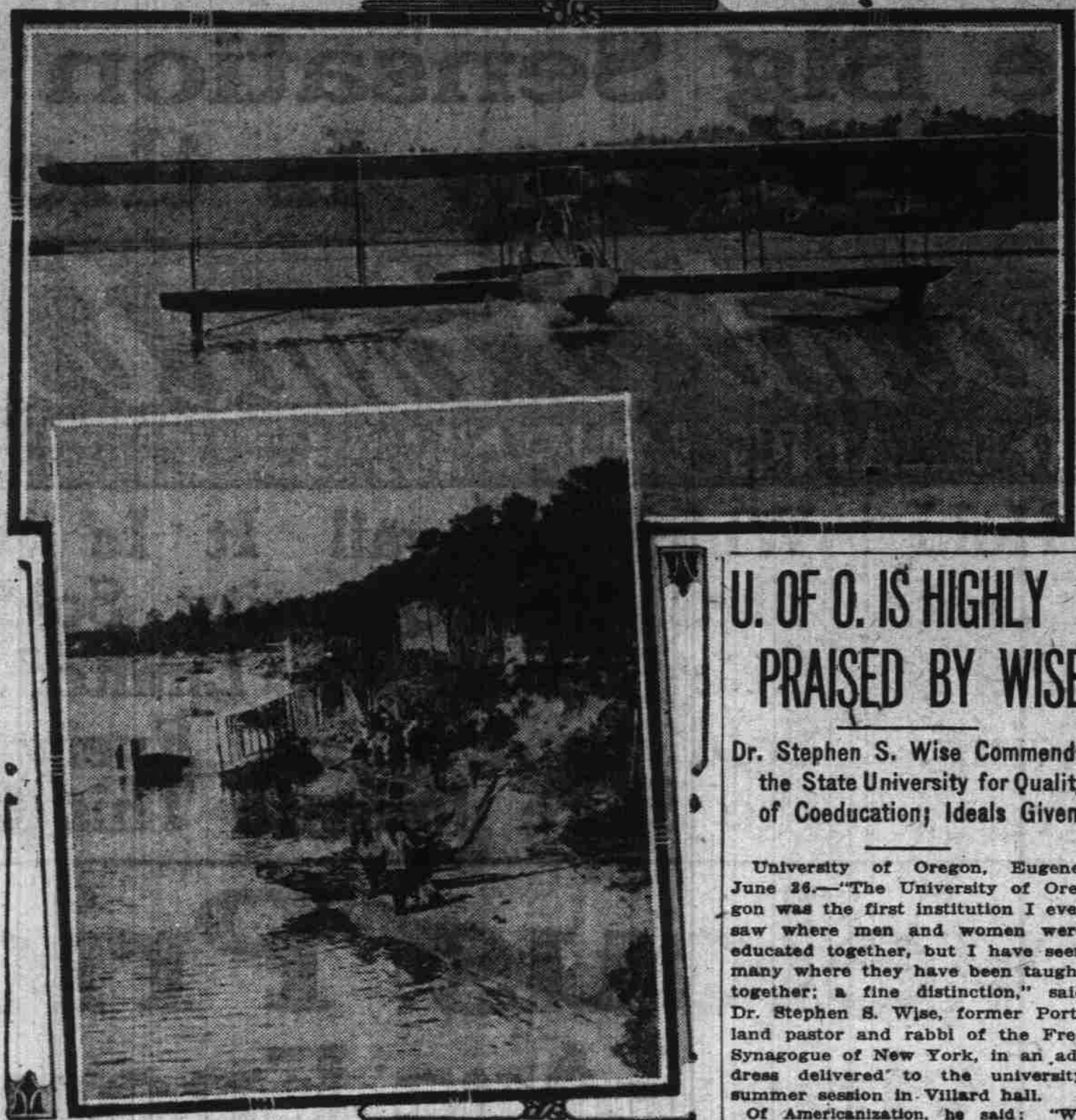

The convention also addressed Senator Harding and Governor Coolidge, the Republican presidential and vice-presidential nominees.

COMMONER COMING EARLY NEXT MONTH

William J. Bryan Is Scheduled to Speak Here Shortly After Democratic Convention.

William Jennings Bryan is scheduled to speak here early in July, prior to undertaking a lecture tour through Eastern Oregon. He will leave San Francisco for the north immediately following the Democratic national convention. According to Milton A. Miller he will probably make his first speech of the 1930 campaign at The Auditorium, between July 3 and 4.

Bryan has been secured for a lecture tour by the Ellison-White Locomotive bureau for the second week in July. He will speak at Goldendale, Wash., July 5, leaving there at 5 p. m. for Maryhill, Wash., where he will embark on the ferry at 6:15. He is scheduled to reach Biggs at 6:45, and will leave there by auto at 7 p. m., arriving at De Moss at 8:30 p. m.; leave De Moss at 9 a. m., July 7, arriving at Condon at 2 p. m.; leave by auto at 5 p. m., arriving at Fossil at 8 p. m.; leave Fossil at 8 a. m., July 8, arriving at Madras at 4 p. m.; leave Madras at 8 a. m., July 9, arriving at Prineville at noon; leave Prineville at 4:45 p. m. and arrive at Prineville Junction at 5:45 p. m.

From Prineville Junction Bryan will go to Redmond, arriving at 5:57; leave at 7:32 a. m., July 10, arriving at Sherman at 12:30 p. m.; leave Sherman at 12:35 p. m., arriving at Baker at 4:45 p. m. After speaking at Baker the distinguished political leader will leave for Weiser, Idaho, at 1:45 p. m.

SCOUTS CIRCULATE MALHEUR PETITION

Troop 92 Wins Picture for Securing Most Names in the Shortest Time.

Love and protection of birds and animals is one of the first things Boy Scouts learn and it was, perhaps, because they had learned that lesson that they secured thousands of names on the initiative petitions providing for the placing on the ballot of a measure setting aside the Malheur Lake Roosevelt Bird Sanctuary and placing it in the hands of the federal government, which would protect, police and preserve it for all time.

The petitions for the securing of 20 names each, were distributed on a Friday evening at the regular meeting of the 97 troops of Scouts, with instruction that they should be filled as soon as possible and turned in to headquarters opposite Central library. The boys of troop 92 were on the porch of the headquarters the following morning at 9 o'clock with their petitions filled. To them was awarded the beautiful study of a Western grobeak, painted by H. Bruce Horsfall, the eminent bird painter. This prize was given by the Roosevelt Bird Refuge association, of which John Gill is the president. The troop has turned the picture over to headquarters. It has been suitably framed and bears a little plate, giving the number of the winning troop.

Portland Seeking To Get Imperial Temple, K. P., Meet

An attempt to bring to Portland in 1932 the Imperial temple session of the Dramatic Order Knights of Khorassan, which is the sunshine degree of the Knights of Pythias, is being made by the local organization, Abi-uthi-Atef temple No. 17.

Harvey W. Nice, Imperial prince, will be here Monday as guest of the local temple.

While the convention would not reach the magnitude of the Shrine convention, the 150 drill teams and bands would doubtless make a creditable showing. There are approximately 10,000 Pythians in Oregon, according to M. F. Wright, a prominent member of the order, and about 30 per cent of these are members of D. O. K. K. There are more than 300 temples in the United States, and if the Portland order is successful in its endeavors, it will be the first time the Imperial temple has made a pilgrimage to the Pacific coast.

U. OF O. IS HIGHLY PRAISED BY WISE

Dr. Stephen S. Wise Commends the State University for Quality of Coeducation, Ideals Given.

University of Oregon, Eugene, June 26.—The University of Oregon was the first institution I ever saw where men and women were educated together, but I have seen many where they have been taught together; a fine distinction," said Dr. Stephen S. Wise, former Portland pastor and rabbi of the Free Synagogue of New York, in an address delivered to the university summer session in Villard hall.

Of Americanization, he said: "We cannot accomplish this highest purpose save by recognition of certain cardinal principles and by employing the great agencies of our institutions." The three principles he distinguished are that immigration and Americanization are not synonymous terms; that "foreigner" and "inferior" cannot be used interchangeably, and that foreign birth does not imply disloyalty.

The school, the press, the church, the theatre and the civic government he believes to be the standard agencies of Americanization within our hands. Dr. Wise would sooner suppress newspapers false-crying war and fomenting international hatred than the foreign language press in America, and he believes that the theatre of the present day is the most dangerous and dangerous influence in the life of the United States.

He decried the small wage of school teachers, and the tendency to standardize in Americanizing. "Have standards, but never standardize," he advised, in advocating increased and encouraged individuality.

He told those who would engage in Americanization "the passion of a consecrated life," he called it, that they were treading holy ground in bringing to others "that priceless spiritual heritage which is our own America."

Ex-Indian Fighter Democratic Seeker For Vice President
Knoxville, Tenn., June 26.—(U. P.)—Lawrence D. Tynan, who as a fighting Indian in the eighties went west to fight Indians, today was in the West to fight for the Democratic vice presidential nomination.

The gray-haired commander of the Fifty-ninth brigade of the "Old Hickory" division goes to the San Francisco convention with unanimous support of his state delegation, though the delegates went uninstructed for a presidential candidate.

Aside from heading perhaps as many big enterprises in Tennessee as any other man, Tynan has served as speaker of the Tennessee house of representatives; was delegate at large to the Baltimore Democratic convention, 1912; came within four votes of being United States senator from Tennessee, and received the vice presidential endorsement without a single dissenting vote of the 160 delegates at the state convention, June 8.

Shrine convention broadens on the available supply of gasoline, greatly increased for the convention rush, had its effect today and general sales restrictions have been applied by the Standard and Union Oil companies, while the Associated companies continue sales on the convention week basis of 75 per cent of tank capacity.

According to statements from officials of the oil companies, after the afternoon, the company's many service stations about town are selling 50 per cent of capacity to pleasure cars and 75 per cent to commercial vehicles. The Union company officials report sales restricted to 20 per cent for pleasure cars and 75 per cent to commercial cars.

"Decided restrictions were necessary," following the convention demands, the Union company reports. All companies sold 75 per cent of tank capacity generally throughout the convention period.

Ultimatum Demands That I. W. W. Quit Carpenters' Council
Spokane, Wash., June 26.—An ultimatum demanding that the I. W. W. quit the ranks of the Washington State Council of Carpenters was issued by Charles Evans, president of the council, at the second annual convention of the organization here.

A resolution urging the United Brotherhood of Carpenters to request the carpenters of the Eastern states to refuse to work on lumber from non-union mills of Washington and Idaho was passed.

The council voted to conduct examinations for proficiency among carpenters in Americanizing, to issue certificates or diplomas to those passing these tests, recommending that all union members seek such diplomas.

Strawberries Almost of Size To Furnish Meal

Columbia Beach, Or., June 26.—Mrs. Frank Dalley is producing regular strawberries on her farm at Skipanon. She is gathering berries averaging 1½ ounces and picked one weighing 1½ ounces. The berries are of the New Oregon variety, for which she is receiving \$5 a crate.

Suit Sought to Bar Los Angeles Taking In More Territory

Los Angeles, Cal., June 26.—(U. P.)—Two requests have been made to the attorney-general of California that he bring suits to prevent the city of Los Angeles annexing outlying suburbs. One is filed by Mrs. L. E. McBride on behalf of the people of Westgate and the other by R. P. Davidson on behalf of Palms. Both of these suburbs already have been annexed but it is claimed, the residents are displeased. Mrs. McBride's complaint alleges that not only has Los Angeles annexed Westgate, but three square miles of the Pacific ocean, which she declares on "information and belief" is "uninhabitable."

The new census report makes Los Angeles the biggest Pacific coast city.

Count d'Aleria Is Flunked to Colored Cook at County Jail

San Diego, Cal., June 26.—(U. P.)—Count Armand d'Aleria is flunked to the cook at the county jail here.

D'Aleria, the 31-year-old spouse of the 60-year-old widow of Senator Nixon of Nevada, is doing 100 days for violation of the city morals ordinance.

His boss is a negro doing six months for vagrancy.

D'Aleria, after sweeping out the jail kitchen this morning, evinced great enjoyment in reading a badly decorated copy of "Life."

Both the count and the cook are rated as trustees in the jail.
