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IRISH ISSUE SIGNAL FOR NEAR RIOT

Resolutions Committee Forced to
Adjourn to Prevent Actual Fight
Between Two Factions;
Bryan and Glass in Clash.

San Francisco, June 29.—(U. P.)—The meeting of the resolutions committee of the Democratic national convention broke up in a near riot today over the Irish question. A motion to adjourn was made to prevent actual hostilities between the proponents of a plank for Irish independence and those opposing any platform reference to the subject.

Intense bitterness and ill-feeling was displayed by the sponsors of the Irish plank when opponents of the measure spoke. It was necessary at one juncture to have a red-haired young woman escorted from the meeting room.

San Francisco, June 29.—(U. P.)—Wets won the first skirmish today before the resolutions committee of the Democratic national convention. By a vote of 27 to 25 they adopted a motion which forced the dries to present their side of the question first.

The motion and vote followed a lively scrap, during the course of which W. J. Bryan charged Senator Glass, chairman of the resolutions committee, with joking and quibbling on a serious question.

Bryan said the wets ought to talk first, because they were demanding a change in the law.

Mrs. Yost of the W. C. T. U. spoke on the question, demanding "honest enforcement of the eighteenth amendment," and said that "the party which incorporates this in its platform will win."

900 MINISTERS PROTEST
Frank M. Silsby, representing the Presbyterian church, read a protest signed by 900 ministers, protesting against weakening the eighteenth amendment.

With both sides declaring they were not seeking to reopen the question of prohibition, Senator Glass finally tried to bring the bickering to a close by announcing that "no body seems to care to be heard on this matter we will proceed on something else."

Bryan, his eyes flashing, was on his feet immediately.

"This is no question for joking," he cried. "This is a serious question, and we are not here to be ruled out on a quibble."

NOT QUIBBLING, SAYS GLASS
"I resent that charge that I am quibbling," said Glass hotly. "You are quibbling and the other side has stated that you have nothing to present. Therefore, the chair said that the committee had better proceed to hear others who do want to be heard."

Amid great confusion a motion was made that the dries talk first for 20 minutes.

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UNIT RULE KNOCKED
OUT FOR NEW YORK

San Francisco, June 29.—(U. P.)—By a vote of 24 to 11 the rules committee today knocked out the unit rule as it applies to the New York delegation in the Democratic national convention.

The fight now will probably go to the floor, where the rules committee's recommendations must be accepted by all delegates.

Franklin Roosevelt, assistant secretary of the navy, opened the argument before the rules committee today in favor of a resolution to permit the New York delegates to vote as individuals, thus breaking the unit rule as far as that state is concerned.

This change was favored by New York delegates, who want to vote for McAdoo. Under the unit rule, they claim Tammany would control the delegation and cast its solid vote for whichever candidate Charles F. Murphy favored.

Britisher Killed in
Brush With Turks

Constantinople, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—One British marine was killed when a British squadron seized Mudania, the port of Brusa, today. Marines were landed because the Turks violated an armistice that had been effected with the British. Mudania is 60 miles southeast of Constantinople.

Athena, June 29.—(U. P.)—British troops repulsed a strong Turkish nationalist attack near Darica, forcing the Turks to make a hasty retreat, says a dispatch from London.

Bishop Shepard to
Pay Spokane Visit

Spokane, Wash., June 29.—Bishop W. O. Shepard of Portland, recently appointed bishop of the Columbia river conference of the Methodist church, is scheduled to speak at meetings in Spokane, July 13 and 14. He will visit all Methodist churches of Spokane and vicinity.

Schuylerman and Turner Are Both Given Seats as State Delegates

San Francisco, June 29.—(U. P.)—Before the credentials committee of the Democratic national convention early today both John L. Schuylerman of Portland and R. R. Turner of Roseburg were elected to fill the vacancy created by the death of one of the four Oregon delegates at large. Each will have half a vote in the balloting.

Frank S. Myers appeared before the committee on behalf of Schuylerman. The contest originated in the death of George T. Baldwin of Klamath Falls, who had been regularly elected a delegate. Schuylerman, who had run fifth in the primary vote, filed his claim to the right to fill the vacancy. The Oregon state central committee ignored Schuylerman and elected Turner instead. The national committee sustained this action. The action of the credentials committee is a reversal of the national committee.

There was no state or party precedent to govern the case and the committee voted unanimously to seat the two men.

ROBINSON APPEALS FOR BOLD STAND

Auditorium, San Francisco, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—The Democratic party must make the issue "boldly" in favor of President Wilson's stand for the League of Nations in order that future generations may not be "born to a heritage of wastefulness and bloodshed," Senator Joseph T. Robinson, permanent chairman of the Democratic national convention, declared today in an address accepting the office to which he had been elected.

"If the Republicans win, the small nations which obtain their independence through association in the war with the allies will be overcome by their recent enemies, and Europe will quickly collapse into its pre-war condition of oppression and threatened anarchy," Senator Robinson said. "If the delegates in this convention do their duty as our soldiers have done theirs the voters of the nation will not fall them. If we make this issue boldly we will win."

PLANKS G. O. P. PLATFORM
Senator Robinson roundly flayed the Republican platform, adopted at Chicago, as "an amazing jumble of anarchy, guilts, inconsistencies, evasions, misrepresentations, 'straddles' and 'slanders'."

Unfairness by the Republicans in charging the Democrats with unpardonable was complained of by Senator Robinson, who also declared that the Republican "boast of economy" is an absurdity, and that the Republican platform "frankly admitted that an early reduction of taxes is not to be expected."

"The big joker" in the Republican platform is the plank criticizing the Democratic administration for failure to enforce anti-protection law, Senator Robinson said, and he declared that the failure of the Republican congress to pass laws asked by President Wilson for the reduction of living costs.

"The November elections will demonstrate the fact that the presidency cannot be auctioned," Senator Robinson said after criticizing the Chicago convention for its failure to denounce the "national scandal" with regard to the excessive use of money in the primaries and conventions.

INVESTIGATIONS DENOUNCED
Congressional investigations, particularly the senate investigation of the navy and the Admiral Sims charges, were denounced by Senator Robinson who declared the American people will attest their contempt for all who would dishonor our flag in order to secure political advantage.

Senator Robinson declared the Republican attitude towards Mexico "ambiguous and indefinite" and indicated that he believed it would lead to war.

McAdoo's plea for a mandate for Armenia was supported by the permanent chairman who also appealed for a strong suffrage plank.

"Never before has a nationwide political battle been waged in the cause of international justice, humanity and peace," said Senator Robinson. "The opposition has taken low and untenable ground. Let the Democratic party occupy the heights."

Bolshevik Armies
Completely Destroy
Their Crimean Foes

London, June 29.—(U. P.)—The army of General Wrangel, anti-Bolshevik leader in the Crimea, has been completely destroyed, according to a dispatch from Sevastopol today. The Thirteenth Bolshevik army has captured the entire left bank of the Dnieper river, the dispatch said.

The new official wireless message said the new offensive launched by the Red troops against the Poles had put the Second Polish army entirely out of action and the Third army off from all communications.

'Mc'll Do' Badges
Shown Everywhere

San Francisco, June 29.—(U. P.)—Though McAdoo hasn't any "official" headquarters in San Francisco, many McAdoo supporters wearing the "Mc'll Do" signs on their hats are thronging the hotel lobbies and streets. Seventeen McAdoo delegates are said to be for McAdoo.

ALL EYES ARE ON BIG THREE

McAdoo Talk All-Pervading, but
He Lacks Two-Thirds; Collapse
of Palmer or Cox Awaited.

San Francisco, June 29.—William Gibbs McAdoo has taken the lead in the race for the Democratic presidential nomination, but the necessary two-thirds vote is not yet in sight.

Either the Palmer or Cox forces must break to McAdoo before he can be nominated. The McAdoo board of strategy is confident of drawing from both camps, but on the second day of the convention not one of the leading candidates can be positive even of a majority.

Those who are directing the fight for McAdoo plan to have their man receive not more than 250 votes on the first ballot. The Palmer men are driving for a maximum. They probably will never get more than 400 or 500 votes, and then the numerical building for Cox and McAdoo will begin. There seems to be some doubt as to whether the McAdoo people will throw in their reserve and force ahead as soon as Palmer is eliminated.

New York, June 29.—(U. P.)—Joseph B. Elwell, murdered racing man and what expert, needed money when he was murdered, according to information in the hands of District Attorney Edward Swann today.

Swann announced also the person who talked to Elwell at 2:30 a. m. the day of the murder was "Miss Wilson," the alias given the young woman whose nightclub, hipper and cap were found in Elwell's room.

Federal revenue agents today started an investigation into the reported liquor deal which Elwell was said to have entered into. The revenue officers called on District Attorney Swann and later summoned William Barnes, Elwell's secretary, for examination.

Buoyancy With Hearty Reverence
for President Is Keynote at
San Francisco Convention.

San Francisco, June 29.—This is a buoyant convention. It has no atmosphere of torpor, hope, the widely prevalent idea of some weeks ago that this is a Republican year and that if the platform and candidate turned out of this convention ring true there is an excellent chance for it to be a Democratic year.

Delegates from every part of the country are full of confidence. It is not an assumed, but a genuine confidence. They tell you that the action at Chicago is disappointing to Republicans in all states. There are delegates here who tell you that their republican neighbors had to make inquiry about him before they could locate the identity and career of the Chicago nominee. They tell you that there is much dissatisfaction with the platform, and it is current gossip here that even such states as Nebraska, Kansas, Minnesota and Wisconsin are today in doubt and that a fit nominee and fit platform put forth here will make all these Republican states debatable territory.

WILSON IS ENIGMA
One of the most frequent remarks made here in discussion of the situation is that the Chicago platform fails to recognize that there has been a terrible war and that the old guard managers have planned to fight this campaign on the issue of anti-bellum days.

By adopting steam roller tactics, Tammany succeeded in instructing the New York members of the resolutions committee, W. Bourke Cochran, to vote for a wet plank.

Gompers Warm In His Eulogy Of Cummings' Keynote Speech

San Francisco, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—The Republican party's platform at Chicago was "so lacking in principles" that organized labor "must find expression of what it stands for elsewhere," Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, declared today when he appeared before the Democratic resolutions committee to urge the adoption of the "Montreal convention plank" in the Democratic platform.

"The enemies of organized labor are engaged in the manufacture of libel and resentment," Gompers said. "We come not to a spirit of defiance." Gompers added, "Those who are opposed to the labor movement are so from selfish motives of self-aggrandizement—you cannot placate them."

It can only be when a great political party recognizes the principles for which organized labor stands that we can hope for a real solution of the grave industrial situation confronting this country.

In my judgment the address of Chairman Cummings yesterday in the Democratic convention was the most masterly declaration of principles it has been my pleasure to listen to in years.

Gompers continued, "There was not an utterance made by the Democratic national chairman to which any real red-blooded American can dissent."

"Our wonderful president—Woodrow Wilson"—Gompers resumed—

He was interrupted by an outburst of applause. There was scattered hand-clapping when he referred to the late Colonel Roosevelt a moment later.

Gompers, like all speakers appearing before the committee, was limited to 10 minutes.

Gompers was followed by Matthew Wohl, a vice president of the A. F. of L., who read the "declaration of principles" adopted at the recent Montreal convention.

LABOR PLANK PROPOSED
The labor plank, as proposed by Gompers, embraced in its main features the following demands:

(1) Cooperative action by the government to curb profiteers.

(2) The monthly issuance by the department of labor of statements of prices of the manufacturing costs of staple articles.

(3) Thorough investigation by the government of manufacturing and retail prices of staples, so as to determine whether there is profiteering.

(4) New immigration laws, which bar immigrants from this country during any period of excessive unemployment.

(5) An eight-hour law for all workers, and the immediate extending of same to all employes in civil departments of the government.

(6) A more elaborate workmen's compensation law.

(7) Legislation calling for the exclusion from interstate commerce all convict manufactured articles.

(8) Election of federal judges for a six-year period by popular vote.

(9) Regulations which oppose Mexican intervention "because of unjust Americans who wish it, to enhance their financial holdings there."

Pre-administration forces dominate all the committees and are having practically their own way. The expected fight against Senator Glass as chairman of the resolutions committee and to evict him and his unanimous selection for that post indicates recognition by the insurgents of the inevitable. The committee presently proceeded to the selection of a subcommittee for the drafting of the platform which is almost entirely Wilsonian.

Bryan was excluded from membership in this drafting committee and has practically no voice in the matter.

2:36 P. M.—Permanent organization committee report adopted.

Auditorium, San Francisco, June 29.—(U. P.)—The second session of the Democratic national convention got under way at 1:55 o'clock this afternoon, nearly an hour late.

Temporary Chairman Cummings had to use the gavel several times before the delegates quieted down. Cummings presented "greetings to the untirred Democracy of America."

Bishop Leonard of the Methodist church offered prayer instead of Bishop Nicola, as at first planned.

At this juncture Mrs. Joseph T. Robinson, wife of Senator Robinson, the permanent chairman, was given a seat of honor on the platform. She wore a blue tailored gown, small black toque and a sable neckpiece and carried American Beauty roses.

Cummings called for the report of the credentials committee and recognized Chairman Jamieson of Iowa to make the report.

REPORT IS READ
Jamieson handed the report to the secretary of the committee, Hugh Asher of California, who read it.

The report of the committee recommended that the Palmer delegates elected from Georgia be placed on the permanent roll of the convention. This was loudly applauded by the Palmer delegates themselves.

In the Fifth district of Missouri, the report read, "Joseph B. Shannon is the only delegate elected," thus barring out Senator Reed. This was greeted by loud cheering, with hundreds of pre-administration delegates joining.

The report further recommended that in the state of Oregon both of the claimants to the seat be given places in the convention, each with one half a vote. The report further recommended that all this delegations be seated on the temporary roll.

Jamieson then recommended the adoption of the report. There were several seconds.

RINSES AND BOOSES
Shannon of Missouri then asked and received recognition. Shannon's voice was weak and he could not be heard.
