

SEX EQUALITY IN POLITICS IS URGED BY BRITISH WOMEN

London, June 29.—There should be no "women's subjects" and no sex-blinkers in politics, and no relegation of women by men to certain limited areas of the political field.

I have always regarded "feminism" as a warped product, born of injustice and tending towards it.

Women have been driven by a sense of the injustice done to them into a sort of trades union based upon their wrongs as a sex, and until they have been brought up abreast of men in political development as well as in political rights a certain political sex consciousness and sex solidarity will remain. One of the best and healthiest results of the enfranchisement of women is, in my opinion, that we shall lose sight of sex as a mental or moral frontier, as a line of demarcation in principle or point of view. The sooner this is accomplished the better, I feel, it will be for men, for women and for the community.

DEPENDS ON WOMEN

I believe in the gradual disappearance of sex, as a deciding factor in political questions, but I should like to make one great exception to this general rule. I hope, and I believe, that on one question women will always stand together; that they will always throw all the weight of their political power into the balance against all forms of violence, against any arbitration of force, whether it takes the form of a war abroad or a general strike at home. Hatred, mistrust of force, is almost a physical instinct with woman. It has been implanted in her soul by centuries of weakness and by the fact that ever since the beginning of time she has been creating, sheltering, protecting, rearing the young life of the world, with nothing but her arms between it and the rude battery of circumstance.

SAFEGUARD IS SEEN

Women throughout the world will prove the surest safeguard of its peace, the strongest bulwark of the state against class conflicts here at home.

But the great, the torturing question which must confront each one of us on the threshold for a political career, the question which lies at the root of the whole problem of the enfranchisement of women, is: "How shall I strike the right balance between the claims of my public and my private life?"

The right time to go into politics is between 25 and 30—when life is at the flood tide, when our blood is running and not creeping in our veins, before the eyes of youth have lost their vision of perfect lines and true proportions.

But it is during these very years that we pass through our most vivid personal experiences, and that our human ties are at their strongest and most imperious.

PARIS IS STIRRED BY REPORTED CURE FOR TUBERCULOSIS

Paris, June 29.—Medical circles in Paris are profoundly stirred by the

announcement from Brussels of a positive cure for tuberculosis submitted to the congress of medicine at its session in the Belgian capital. Universal Service is able today to follow its exclusive cable dispatch of last week telling of the cure with a symposium by prominent French specialists.

Application by Doctors Gremet and Drouin of sulphates of samarium, lanthane and neodyme to pulmonary tuberculosis is the logical consequence of investigations carried on for more than a

year in cases of ganglionic or cutaneous tuberculosis, which in almost every instance have been cured within shorter or longer periods by this treatment.

It is possible to state that incipient tuberculosis can be positively cured by this method, while in the more advanced stage a longer period is required to make the cure certain, though improvement will be manifest and steady.

INJECTIONS ARE USED

The method consists of intra venous injections each day or second day, according to the constitution of the patient, after 20 injections the treatment is suspended for 15 or 20 days, whereafter a new series of injections is given, according to the strength of the patient and the virulence of the disease. All

cases subjected to this treatment have shown improvement while many may be classed as definitely cured.

The treatment in each case is incidental to the patient's working daily.

The discovery of Drs. Gremet and Drouin is exceedingly encouraging and deserves special recognition as opening new vistas of chemotherapy in the treatment of tuberculosis.

While it is perhaps too much to say that a general cure of tuberculosis has been found it is legitimate as result of the experiments made by Dr. Drouin and myself to state that a cure of incipient

and even advanced cases is perfectly possible.

In only a few cases have there been injurious effects in the way of fever. This, however, has been lessened by reducing the doses of the anti-toxin. Most of the patients suffer no ill effects, but rapidly improve, their appetite grows, they stop perspiring at night, sleep better and take on weight.

Sometimes improvement is registered immediately, in some other cases after the second or third series of injections. Coughing increases during the first few days, but afterwards diminishes rapidly and finally ceases.

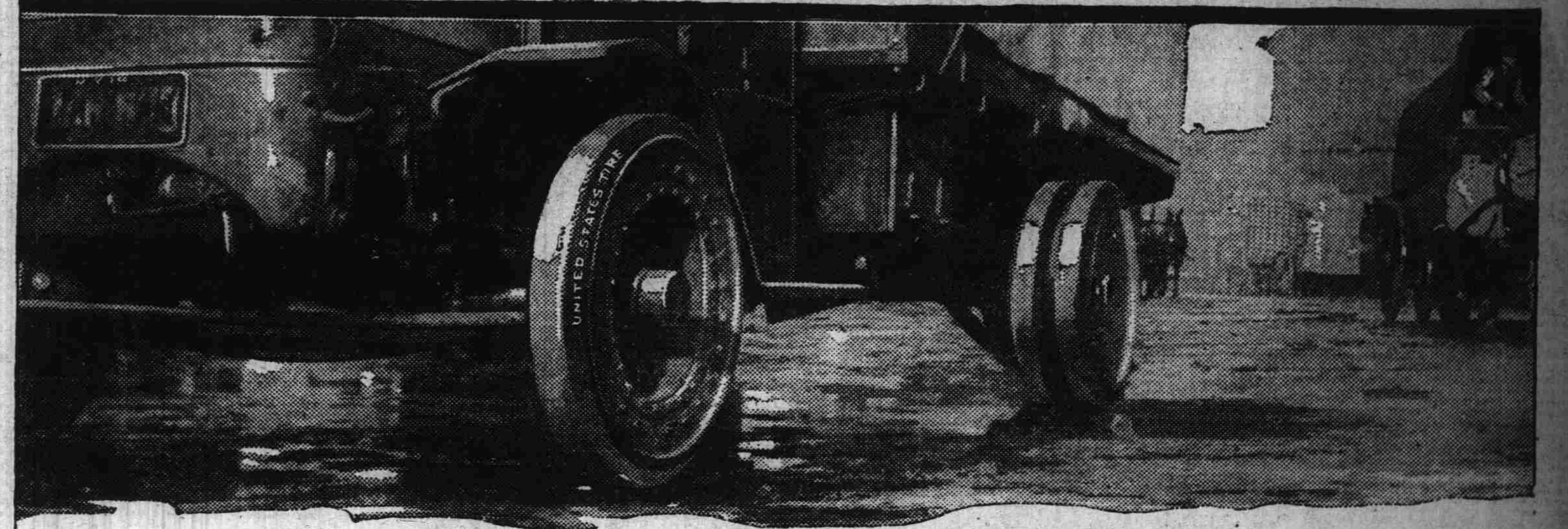
Examination by radiograph shows that the virulence of the koch bacillus decreases as the outward symptoms of consumption disappear.

2000 Turk Troops Killed by Greeks

London, June 29.—(U. N. S.)—Two thousand Turks have been killed in battle with Greek troops east of Smyrna, according to a communique issued by Greek army headquarters at Smyrna and telegraphed here today. The Turkish losses were particularly severe in the region of Alas-Behr. Greek cavalry inflicted severe casualties on Turkish nationalist rear guards.
