

BANDIT ROBBS AND ESCAPES AFTER BEING WOUNDED

Sacramento, June 25.—(U. P.)—Sheriff Ellis Jones and his posse were unable, up to an early hour today, to find a trace of the bandit who last night robbed passengers in two sleepers of the eastbound Atlantic express on the Southern Pacific and fled, although believed to have been seriously wounded.

The bandit climbed to the platform of the observation car at Davis. As soon as the train started he began his work, forcing George Dickson, rear-end brakeman, to help him as the police of his revolver the bandit compelled Dickson to search passengers and place money and jewelry in his coat.

minutes and the wets then have an equal time. Bryan tried to present an amendment so that the dries would have 20 minutes, the wets 30 and the dries 10 more in which to reply. He was ruled out of order. He demanded a roll call. The wets won by two votes.

Richmond Hobson presented a plank, stating that the Democratic party was proud of the eighteenth amendment and pledging it to enforce and extend the Volstead law.

Charles J. Law, representing the bone dry federation; H. Clay Needham of the prohibition party, and Wayne B. Wheeler of the Anti-Saloon league presented brief arguments for an affirmative declaration in the platform for strict enforcement of the Volstead law. Bryan did not take part, stating that he would address the committee, of which he is a member, when he would not be so limited as to time.

BELL SPEAKS FOR WETS
Theodore N. Bell, former congressman from California, opened the case for the wets.

"I deny the claim of the dries that the American people will submit to the enforcement of the eighteenth amendment for all time," said Bell. Bell delved into Bryan's political record to show, he said, that Bryan had frequently run for office on platforms emphatically opposed to sumptuary laws like the Volstead act.

"If the Democratic party does not stand for personal liberty, it has lost its place as a great American institution," said Bell. "Don't you try to place millions of good people in this country in the position of violating a law. You wrote a lie into the law; take it out and you'll have public sentiment with you."

BELL CALLS IT LIE

This "lie," Bell said, "was the statement that one half of one per cent of alcohol constituted an intoxicating liquor."

Bryan precipitated another clash when he asked Bell to tell whom he represented and what he was paid. Bell said he represented California grape growers and demanded of Bryan whether Bryan got any money from the Anti-Saloon league.

"Not a nickel," shouted Bryan.

"For nine years I fought the damnable traffic that you represent here, at my own expense," he said.

Chairman Glass had considerable trouble restoring order. Bryan said Bell had not answered his question and insisted on a reply. Glass ruled all the disputes out of order.

Harry F. Ryan, representing the Trades Union Liberty league of Cal-

ifornia, brought a laugh when, after an impassioned "wet" speech, he cried: "Oh, I wish I had a drink."

Samuel Gompers, answering a question whether it was true, as reported, that the Montreal convention of the American Federation of Labor had voted down a resolution favoring modification of the Volstead act, declared the report untrue.

Bourke Cockran of New York closed the wet arguments.

"My chief objection to prohibition," said Cockran, "is that it assumes that the American people are incapable of self-improvement and that they must be driven to morality by laws."

IRISH QUESTION CREEPED

Wild cheers greeted Chairman Glass' announcement that the Irish question would next be taken up.

Frank P. Walsh, representing a joint committee from the Friends of Irish Freedom and other organizations seeking Irish independence, and Senator Phelan of California presented the Irish freedom plank as follows:

"We pledge our party to the policy of according to the elected government of the republic of Ireland full, formal and official recognition by the government of the United States, thus vindicating the principle for which our soldiers offered up their lives."

VALERA WOULD APPEAR

Walsh said Eamonn de Valera, "president of the Irish republic," was ready to appear before the committee if called on. He declared there was no force to the argument that recognition of the Irish republic by the United States would amount to a declaration of war against Great Britain.

"The Democratic party in 1916 adopted a plank favoring self-determination for the oppressed people, and was tri-umphantly elected on that position," said Walsh. "We ask you to reaffirm and strengthen the position then taken."

Walsh said the Republicans were too cowardly to put an Irish plank in the platform.

Phelan said President Wilson is sympathetic toward Irish aspirations and the party will be following his leadership if it recognizes Irish independence.

CONNOLLY OPPOSES IT

Congressman Connolly of Texas, opposing any reference to Irish freedom, said the recognition of a foreign government is the constitutional function of the president and it would be improper for the party to interfere. It would be considered by Great Britain as an affront and a challenge to her authority, he declared. Women in the audience interrupted him by crying "Tre-land is a nation."

Glass called the hecklers sharply to order, but they persisted when Connolly called them hyphenates, hissing him loudly.

Demarest Lloyd, president of the Loyal Coalition, was quizzed by Senator Walsh of Montana, as to what the meaning of the word "loyal" was.

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Lloyd said it meant amity between the United States and Great Britain.

"The issue seems to be, not whether the United States shall interfere in the affairs of Great Britain, but whether the Sinn Fein has not already interfered unduly in American affairs," Lloyd said.

"It's a lie," the hecklers in the audience cried when Lloyd charged that the Sinn Fein movement was backed by foes of real freedom who deny self-determination to Ulster. Glass ordered hecklers ejected if any interrupted further.

SINN FEIN BILD MEERACH

Randolph Smith, vice president of the Loyal Coalition, said Sinn Feinism is a menace to the United States. He said Sinn Fein propagandists had collected \$10,000,000 in the United States, "out of the pockets of servant girls," which so aroused several Irish freedom advocates that they started for the platform, announcing their determination to "make him take that back."

The police were called to quell the riotous disturbance and ejected several noisy demonstrators. The Irish who remained then tried to silence Smith by concerted handclapping, yelling and whistling. "Insulting of women" and "Son of a Tory," they shouted at him. Order was restored, with difficulty.

MRS. HIDDEN TAKES PART IN ARGUMENT

San Francisco, June 25.—(U. P.)—A caucus of feminine delegates and alternates will be called late this afternoon following an attempted caucus held yesterday which was adjourned after a resolution indorsing the Cummings keynote speech was passed practically unanimously.

After the meeting some delegates charged "steam roller" methods had been used by Mrs. George Bass, chairman of the women's bureau of the Democratic national committee.

The League of Nations issue was the cause of the clash. Following presentation of a blanket indorsement of Chairman Cummings' keynote address, Miss Laura Clay of Kentucky urged the women not to place themselves on record "in favor of the League of Nations without safeguards."

"Opinion among the women is widely divided as to the League of Nations," Miss Clay said.

"Some of the Democratic women favor the league as it stands, others want it with reservations. We should not at this time give a blanket indorsement of Mr. Cummings' speech, which favored an out and out indorsement of the league without reservations."

Mrs. George Bass announced that the meeting had not been called for a debate on the League of Nations and called for a vote on the resolution of commendation. The resolution passed with a few dissenting votes.

Among the delegates who urged that a free discussion of the league should be allowed was Mrs. M. L. T. Hidden, delegate-at-large from Portland, Or.

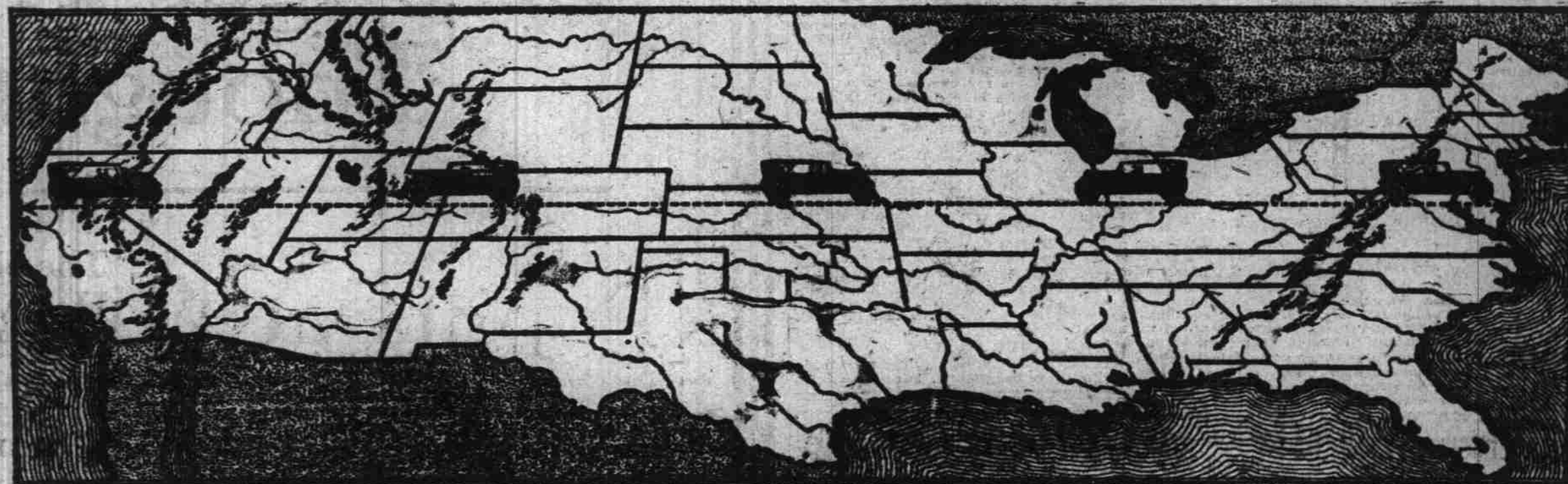
