

1 MADE HIM KISS FLAG, IS BOAST OF IRISH WOMAN

San Francisco, Cal., June 30.—One of the easiest things to get around this convention is a fight.

Ireland is some several thousand miles away, but mere discussion of the Irish question Tuesday brought on a blow-off that called out three policemen, caused Carter Glass to fairly wear himself out trying to restore order, and threatening gestures from men and women that for a time bade fair to result in a real fight.

The Irish furnished the big show. When Demarest Lloyd, president of the Loyal Coalition, an anti-Sinn Féin organization, charged that the Irish agitators were taking millions of dollars from American servant girls, three women rose up shouting "liar," and started right down the aisle to get Lloyd.

The Irish opposition speakers were heckled, booed and finally threatened to such an extent that Chairman Glass threatened to clear the room. The hearing was in an uproar. One woman, who declined to give her name, was the leader of the disturbance. Policemen were called, and it took three of them to halt carry and half push her out.

In the stairway the woman encountered Lloyd and proceeded to give him several resounding thwacks over the head and face with a small Irish flag. "I made him kiss the Irish flag," she declared with satisfaction as she disappeared outside the hall. Meantime it was impossible to restore order in the committee room and adjournment was taken.

Reward Claimants Are Requested to File Their Claims

George Moore and Russell Brake, charged with the murder, are being held in the Multnomah county jail. Monday Brake's attorney issued a statement asserting that Brake was not a participant in the murder and was not with Moore the night of the killing.

R. G. Dick and E. B. Thompson was appointed to draft by-laws. A committee composed of Colonel Slattery, J. W. Morris and J. B. Guthrie was appointed to study defense problems. The next meeting will be held July 5.

Some time ago Commissioner Barbur announced that the city was going to change Denver avenue to Derby street. Immediately the Denverites complained against the change. Then Barbur suggested Denver avenue for the street and the Derbys came across with full voiced protest.

3600 Invitations to Buyers' Week Going Out Via Airplane

Approximately 3600 Buyers' week invitations will be sent to merchants of the state by airplane Saturday, Sunday and Monday, according to arrangements being made by Buyers' week committee. Three planes will leave Saturday, one Sunday and two Monday to visit the county seats of 14 counties of the state. Invitations are being sent by mail and the letters bear the announcement that they have been sent to merchants by the aerial route. Incidentally sending of the invitations will be an experiment in behalf of aerial mail service to the cities visited.

Fir and Yellow Pine On Five Mile Creek Sold to Westfall

The forest service has just completed a sale of 750,000 board feet of Douglas fir and yellow pine on Five Mile creek in Wasco county in the Oregon national forest to L. G. Westfall. Prices paid were 50 cents for Douglas fir and 43 cents for yellow pine. Westfall has a sawmill in the vicinity.

Bids have been advertised for the sale of 200,000 feet of Douglas fir and yellow pine on Rock creek at minimum prices of \$3.50 for the pine and 60 cents for the fir.
