days, with three leading candidates, one of the three was finally chosen and the many dark horses who have been waiting at the gate from the day the convention opened were left to seek other pastures green.

The Ohioans call him Jimmy Cox, their faithful, and their always apparent admiration for him was a factor in his nomination. Their loyalty was so patent that it became more or less epidemic in the convention. The 28 yet delegates from New Jersey wanted him and the Irish delegates from Massachusetts—and most of them seemed to be Irish—did not want anybody who had anything to do with the Wilson administration.

**NEW YORK AGAINST WADSWOOD**  
In the entire balloting, two votes in the most they ever gave McAdoo. The wet delegates in New York and in the group of states around New York and the Murphy delegates didn't want McAdoo, who was endorsed by the anti-saloon league. These and numerous southern delegates who were in the same boat circulated about the convention hall last night with a printed slip saying a Cox speech was used in Ohio as a campaign document in the fight against prohibition. It also contained a letter by liquor men approving Cox as a candidate for governor. The bone dry voter who insists that prohibition, though in full effect, is still a national issue, will have to hold his nose and vote his sentiments, for, if all accounts be true, Harding is even a wetter candidate than Cox. Another factor in the nomination was a lot of small caliber gentlemen who thought they were also presidential candidates. Some of them would have made good town mayors. They certainly were not presidential timber. But they sewed up state delegations and held them but of the fight until the convention got tired of the foolishness and determined to make a nomination. The result was that a convention sometimes gets away from its would be leaders and goes on a rampage, and that is exactly what happened to this one, and it is one of the reasons why Governor Cox is the nominee.

The Ohio delegates insist that Cox will carry both Ohio and Indiana against Harding, and that he will be elected. That he is a good man, an able man and a popular man must be true, because of the affectionate interest with which the men of his own state urged his candidacy and the zeal by which they finally brought about his nomination.

The Oregon delegation died in their trenches. They held their lines as ordered by their instructions in the Oregon primaries, and in the face of the obedience to the people's will that may well be followed by future delegations in Oregon. When the struggle was strong against them they brought many a cheer from the galleries as they heard Chairman Stevenson's regulation announcement, "10 votes for McAdoo."  
The Oregonians are all leaving for home on special cars tonight. As to a choice between a Shriners' convention and a national party convention, one of the former is worth a dozen of the latter. It's more fun and less work.
