

# GENERAL PERSHING IS GIVEN GILDED SWORD BY BRITISH

Washington, July 6.—By the presentation of a beautiful jeweled gold hilted sword to John J. Pershing Monday, in honor of the nation's birthday, the British empire, through the lips of its ambassador at Washington, paid tribute to all the men of the A. E. F. whom Pershing commanded abroad.

"It is not the custom of the British nation to forget those who prove themselves its friends in hours of need," said Sir Auckland Geddes, the ambassador, in making the presentation to the general.

**GALLANT MEN REMEMBERED**  
"We have not forgotten we shall not forget, that there came under your command to Europe a great company of gallant men, sons of this free land. So that you and they may realize our remembrance, there has been inscribed upon the blade of this sword a legend that is commemorated the services of all who trained and marched and fought under your command, as well as your own great achievements."

The stage setting for the presentation was picturesque in the extreme. Sir Auckland Geddes, for the first time since his arrival in the United States, was attired in ambassadorial full dress of dark blue and heavy gold braid, with the white plumed, three-cornered hat of diplomatic usage to match. A court sword at his side, and wearing the decorations he gained in the War and in the Great War, as well as the Order of the Bath, his order of knighthood. His secretarial staff, also in full dress, attended him, and about the walls of the great ballroom of the embassy, dominated by full length portraits in oil of the late King Edward VII and Queen Alexandra, were grouped the military attaches of France, Italy, Japan and Roumania, replete in full dress uniform.

**GRAYSON REPRESENTS WILSON**  
Rear Admiral Cary T. Grayson represented President Wilson at the ceremony, and among the distinguished audience were Secretary of War Baker, Admiral Kooten, acting secretary of the navy, and Brigadier General William G. Hahn, chief of the war plans division of the general staff, who commanded the Thirty-second division of Michigan and Wisconsin troops under Pershing in France.

Escorted by Colonel Thorne, assistant military attaché of the British embassy, who was attired in the bright red and gold-braided peacetime uniform of the Grenadier Guards, General Pershing, clad in his simple service olive drab uniform and wearing no decoration save the ribbon of the American distinguished service medal, advanced to meet the ambassador.

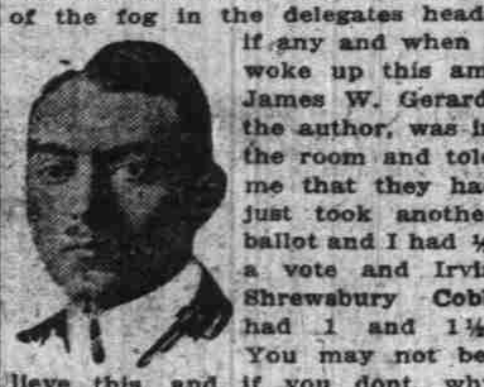

# BRITAIN PROMISES U. S. SUPPORT IF ATTACKED IN CHINA

Shanghai, China, July 4.—(Delayed)—(U. P.)—"If you are attacked, I shall come to your assistance with every man and every gun I have."  
This was the message from Great Britain to the United States at the time American sailors were landed at Yochow, it was disclosed today by Admiral Gleaves in an Independence day address.

The message, he said, was sent by Admiral G. H. Borrett, commanding the British fleet in the Yangtze river, to Captain Kearney, the American commander at Yangtze, following the murder of W. A. Belmont, American missionary. Belmont was killed when General Chang's northern forces attacked an American mission.

This message, Gleaves said, should go down in history with the epigram that "blood is thicker than water."

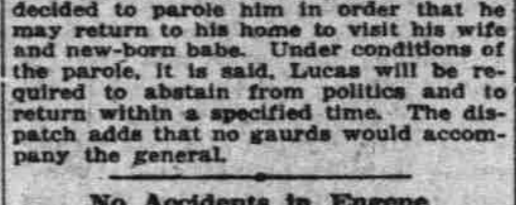
# Sinn Feiners Permit British General to Visit Wife and Babe

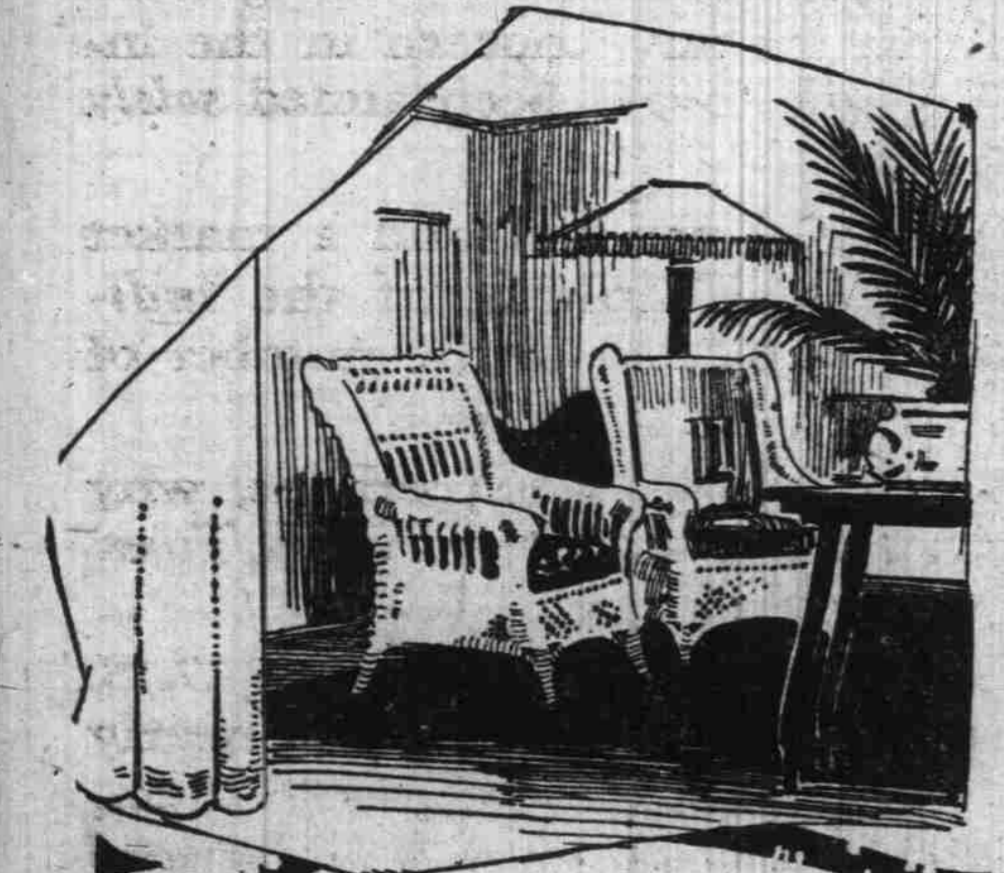
