

WOMAN DELEGATE HAS 'MOIST BUT MERCIFUL' SLOGAN

"Moist, but merciful," that's my slogan," said Miss Elizabeth Marbury, delegate at large from New York at the Democratic national convention, who arrived Wednesday morning from San Francisco and is spending a few days in Portland.

"I came up against many extremes in the way of prohibitionists at the convention and participated in many arguments, most of them of a factious character, however. A woman came to my room at the hotel and said she had refused to believe the things I had been quoted as saying, and would continue to until she heard them from my own lips. Then she said she had a good and pure husband and three good and pure sons and that she didn't propose for me to come out from New York and say that they could have alcoholic drinks. I told her that she shouldn't take out her spite on old maids like me, who have neither a pure or an impure husband, and she laughed and left in a far better mood.

WET FOR RICH, DRY FOR POOR
Now, seriously speaking, I am not in favor of saloons or of the liquor traffic; in fact, I think we owe Mr. Bryan a vote of thanks for closing the saloons and putting an end to the liquor traffic. But now the time has come for more liberalism and, as the prohibition law now stands, it is prohibition for the poor man and license for the rich. It is a practical impossibility to enforce prohibition. It would take a million men to enforce it, and just see what a tremendous expense that would be to the taxpayers.

"A law that cannot be enforced is unethical, it encourages law breaking, lying and hypocrisy. I am a staunch Democrat and I want to play the game fairly, so that the man with the slim purse may have the same privileges as the man with the fat purse, and so I say let us have beer and light wines. There is a shortage of labor in New York and it is a direct result of the fact that the foreigners are leaving at the rate of 1000 a week, and they are leaving because they cannot get the light wines to which they are accustomed.

"All of this talk about building a strong, healthy manhood through prohibition. I would like to see a finer body of young men mentally and physically than those 2,000,000 who went overseas from this country, yet they went to victory before we had this drastic prohibition law."

TWICE DECORATED
Miss Marbury for 20 years prior to the war represented dramatists, having translations made from English to foreign languages and from foreign languages. She maintained offices in New York, Paris, Berlin, London, Moscow and Milan. In recognition of her service she was twice decorated by the French government.

She spent five months abroad having been sent there by Secretary Lane, to talk to the men on the "back to the farm" movement. Her appearances were under the name of "Mother Casey." Miss Marbury was decorated by the Queen of Belgium, by the Italian government and was given gold medals by the Knights of Columbus and the Grand Army of the Republic.

"The convention was a great inspiration. I was a member of the national executive committee and the position threw me with women from all sections of the country," she said. I want to say that I was proud of the quality of their minds. Most of them were much younger than I, but I learned a lot and was mighty glad to know them."

Lines to Run From Naches Into Forest

Naches is organizing its communication system to connect with the Rainier national forest, says C. M. Allen, telephone engineer of the forest service, who has just returned to Portland. The community is arranging for a metallic telephone line from Naches into the forest and are starting the construction of several short lengths to connect with the forest service lines, through Rainier national park, directly with the lookout on Anvil rock, which overlooks much of the country.

Bryan, Fresh From S. F., Due at Bend

Bend, July 7.—If the plans of the Bend Commercial club work out, the members of the congressional appropriations committee, who arrive in Bend Saturday, will have an opportunity for a love feast with William Jennings Bryan, who comes to Central Oregon direct from the Democratic national convention. The former party will see Central Oregon's largest proposed irrigation project, the Benham falls project.

Sing's Trial Postponed
Trial of Jimmie Sing, indicted in June for alleged traffic in opium, was postponed Tuesday morning by Federal Judge Bean on request of Sing's attorney to the first Monday in October. At the time Sing was arrested the federal officers found a suit case of opium on his ranch near Donald, which constituted the largest haul made by the local officials in its history.

Stanley Case Postponed
L. F. Stanley, arrested by Deputy Sheriff Wilson on a charge of driving his automobile at 42 miles an hour on Linton road Sunday, did not appear in court at 9:30 Tuesday morning. Instead Stanley wired from Clatskanie that he would be delayed. The hearing was set over.

ZIONISTS ELECT JUSTICE BRANDEIS

London, July 7.—(L. N. S.)—Louis D. Brandeis, associate justice of the United States supreme court, was today elected president of the International Zionist conference.

Max Nordeau was elected honorary chairman. Dr. Weissmann in the "key-note speech" said:
GOOD WILL OF ARABS SOUGHT
"No external obstacle prevents us from settling down to build a Jewish homeland. The guiding principle must be to seek the good will of the Arabs. We should plan to settle 20,000 to 50,000 Jews in Palestine in the next two years."

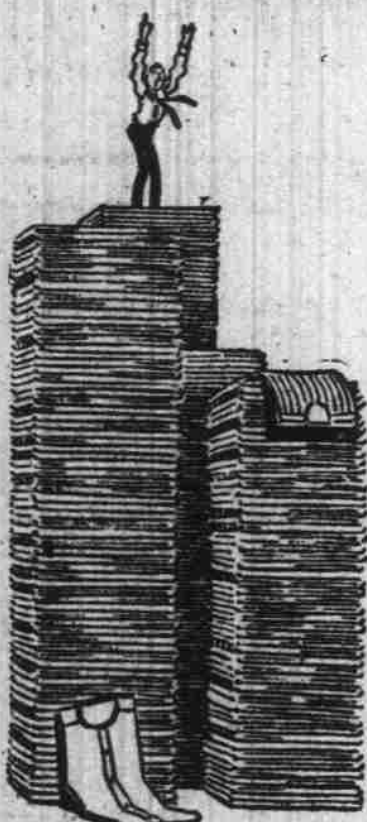
"After 2000 years of homelessness and insecurity and persecution we meet at last as a nation with a home secured in our historic land for a place among the nations of the world, dependent only upon our own wisdom and devotion."

With these words M. Sokolow, known as "the diplomat of the Jewish people," opened the world conference of the Zionists for the formulation of plans to reclaim Palestine for the Jews, here today.

150 DELEGATES PRESENT
Two hundred and fifty delegates are present from 30 countries, including Russia and the central powers. Every shade of opinion among Jews of the entire world is represented here. Among the delegates from the United States is Associate Justice Brandeis of the supreme court.

It is estimated that \$100,000,000 is necessary for the first year's work in restoring Zion. There are sharp differences of opinion as to how this money shall be raised.

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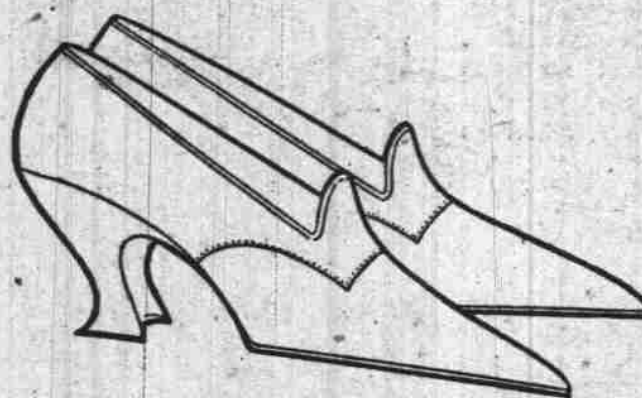

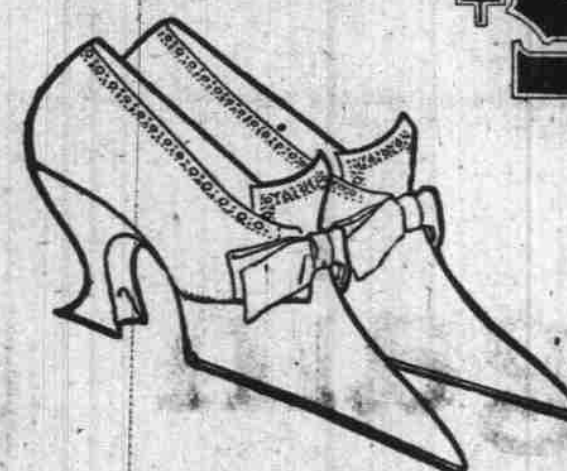

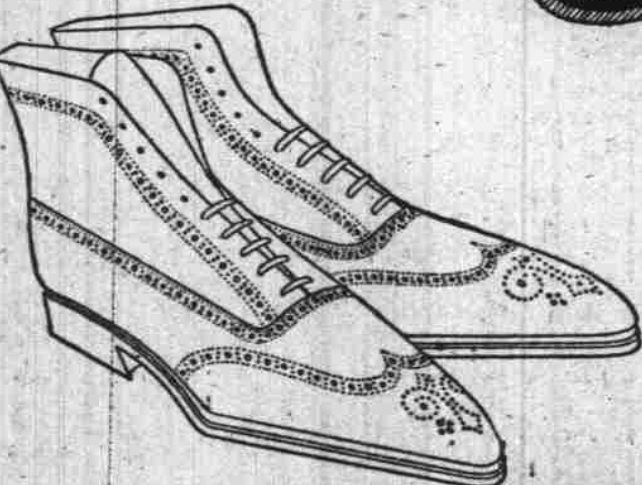
