Five Local Golfers in Title Play

VANCOUVER, B. C., July 8.—The card and pencil game today in favor of match play, and it is certain that a feeling of relief came over all.

There has been a considerable strain over the golf of the last few days, not only owing to the thickness of the greens, but also from the fact of the excessively warm weather that has been carried on in and in addition playing over a different course each round—not only different in location, but entirely different in makeup—greens different and facilities different. Coming off Burnaby and starting out over Shaughnessy, the narrow fairways with the various pitfalls at each side of them is rather inclined to cramp one's style thinking of what might befall one and how a good score could be spoiled. The Burnaby greens of the first nine are the keenest, but in spite of having found the Shaughnessy greens troublesome, there is no ground for complaint, as they are in first-class order. They require judicious play to be used—more so than at Burnaby—and cannot be condemned on account of the fact that the Burnaby greens found Shaughnessy greens more difficult was in running up to them. The fairway around the green was in most cases exceedingly good.

Play was late in starting. There was a strong sun and the heat was intensive. So far the course at Burnaby shows no sign of burning up and the greens are still in good shape.

The championship and the leading flights were played at Burnaby and the other flights at Shaughnessy. Great interest was evinced in the games, and a large number of spectators followed the well known players. In the championship field there are many unknown names and the games put up by these players were the best from a spectator's point of view. In the first round three past holders of the championships were eliminated, these being Neville, the California champion, Macan, who has also held the British Columbia championship, and Dixie Flaeger. In each case it was one of the younger players that accounted for them. At the end of the first round the most notable fact was that of the eight remaining players five of them hailed from Portland.

Gelletty by bad putting on the first green lost the hole 4 to 5; at the second he got in creek, but played out well and won hole 4 to 5. Egan overran the green. The third was halved. By good play, Gelletty won the fourth in 3 to 4. This put him 1 up. The fifth was halved and Egan won the long hole 6 to 7. He also won the seventh, eighth and ninth, putting him 3 up. A PINCH single by "Suds" Sutherland broke up an exciting 12-inning baseball game Wednesday on the Vaughn street grounds, the Beavers winning over the Vernon Tigers, 5 to 4. Aided by the breaks of the game and the decisions of Empire McGraw the Tigers fought hard to capture the game, but the Beaver inner works was too strong a combination for them.

The bases were full when Sutherland was sent to bat for young McNab, with Kingdon entered the line up, when McGraw chased McGraw and Sprague from the contest for disputing a decision at second base in the first half of the twelfth frame. "Suds" shot a single just out of "Babe" McGraw's reach and Glazier, who played the last two innings in right field in place of Dick Cox, clatted over the plate.

BONERS HURT BEAVERS

Spranger was out on a weak fly and Ross fled to Chadbourne. It was a hard catch, and if Cox had held his head he would have scored. Blue ended the inning with a forecourt.

Smallwood opened the twelfth with a double. Blue bunted safely down the third base line. Chadbourne hit to Siglin and Smallwood was nipped off at the plate and Tobin made a wonderful catch of a foul fly from Fisher's bat.

Glazier, who replaced Cox in the eleventh, reached first on Mitchell's boot of an easy grounder. Tobin after trying to sacrifice singled to left center, putting
