

GERMANS FAIL TO CONVINCE ALLIES ON DISARMAMENT

Spa, Belgium, July 8.—(U. P.)—German and allied military officials who discussed German disarmament today reported to the conference that they had been unable to reach a basis of agreement.

Premier Lloyd George curtly ordered them to resume discussions.

It was rumored that Dr. Cessler, German minister of defense, had offered his resignation to Chancellor Fehrenbach, but that he had reconsidered upon receiving assurances that the Germans would be allowed six months in which to demobilize their military forces.

Germany must comply with the disarmament provisions of the peace treaty within three months, it was decided by the allies. The German request for 15 months' time in which to disarm was met by a flat refusal. The disturbed German internal situation was given as reason for the delay sought.

When Premier Lloyd George asked the German foreign minister why 1,000,000 armed men and 2,000,000 rifles in Germany were still unaccounted for, Herr Simons reminded the British premier that many men are armed in Ireland despite orders of the British government that they disarm.

Forest Fire Flares Up Near Bull Run

Within sight of Portland the "annual" forest fire of the Cameron Lumber company is burning over 25 or 30 acres near Ames and not far from Bull Run.

PAPERS FROM HYDROPLANE SMASH JAIL

LONG BEACH, Wash., July 8.—Great bundles of Journals, dropped by the pilot of The Journal hydroplane Monday afternoon, missed the open ground where they were supposed to fall, and nearly wrecked the jail.

The hydroplane was the first flying machine ever seen on North Beach. All business houses were closed between 4 and 5 o'clock in anticipation of its coming. The plane was delayed and the crowd had dispersed when someone shouted, "There it comes." The people hurriedly gathered again.

The hydroplane circled three times, then the papers were dropped, aimed at a spot where the bundles crashed down upon the jail.

POLISH COLLAPSE REPORTED; POLES CLAIM SUCCESSES

London, July 8.—(I. N. S.)—Rumors that Polish resistance has collapsed persisted today. The Central's correspondent at Koenigsberg reports an uprising in White Russia behind the Polish army. Bridges and roads destroyed, endangering the Poles' retreat.

The Russian Bolshevik army which captured the fortress of Rovno from the Poles has cut the strategic Kiev-Kovno railway, said a Central News dispatch from Copenhagen today, quoting advisers received in that city from Warsaw. The Russian offensive continues in full swing along the entire battlefield. The Polish council of defense has issued a proclamation calling upon all men of military age to rally to the flag. Students and peasants are reported to be responding in great numbers.

The Poles expect aid from the western powers within a short time.

The Polish war office communique says: "We repulsed the Russian offensive on the middle Dvina river. South of the Dvina we counter-attacked successfully."
