

AUTHORESS FINDS DEMOCRATS HAVE HIGHER IDEALISM

"I consider that the Democratic convention at San Francisco marked the real entrance of the women of the nation into politics," said Anne Shannon Monroe, former Portland newspaper-woman, now a successful author, who divides her time between New York and Portland, and who arrived Thursday from San Francisco. She is the guest of her mother, Mrs. S. L. M. Farmer in the Woodstock district.

"For the first time in history women were treated as though they were a real part of it all. There was no condescension on the part of the men. The women were accepted on exactly the same ground as the men and they conducted themselves with a fine intelligence and dignity befitting such trust."

MEN UP ALL NIGHT

"Nothing was left undone that made for the comfort and convenience of the women. At the opening of the convention Chairman Robinson made a rule out of deference to the women that there should be no smoking and there was none. When a man wanted to smoke he went out into the lobby. The management of the Palace hotel set aside its rose room during the breakfast hour for the exclusive use of the women and beginning at 8 o'clock every morning between 300 and 400 women conducted an open forum, the speakers being the biggest men in attendance at the convention. They spoke on all the big questions, both national and international, and then gave the women an opportunity to ask questions and they took full advantage of the opportunity. It was a liberal education. The men held so many all night sessions that there was a good deal of fun over the fact that at 8 o'clock in the morning when the women were starting the day, most of the men were just going to bed. Many of the speakers came to the breakfasts without having been to bed at all."

DEMOCRATS KEEP IDEALS
"I have always been a Democrat, but I am frank to confess that the only reason I had was because my father was a Democrat, but that is all changed now; no one could attend the San Francisco convention without knowing why they were a Democrat. It was a first class education in being a Democrat. Before the Republican convention at Chicago I accepted what many people were saying to the effect that this was a Republican year and so I thought I would go and see how they made the next president, but before the convention was over I had decided to go to the Democratic convention too."

The Republican convention was absolutely controlled by the vitriolic spirit of hate; hate was the keynote of the convention, the people all seemed cross with each other. The Wood forces were mad at the Lowden forces and the Johnson people were mad at all of the rest. Love and fine feeling dominated the Democratic convention. Everybody seemed together; the opening sessions were marked by a sort of melting process and everyone was kind and

thoughtful and helpful to the others. There were present so many fine old senators and governors from the Southern states and we heard much of Madison, Jefferson and Monroe—it was all just teeming with idealism.

MRS. BROWN BEAUTIFUL

"I cannot help contrasting the interest and attitude of the women of the conventions. In Chicago the wives of the delegates spent most of their time shopping and sight seeing; they weren't interested in the affairs of the convention. But in San Francisco it was different. The women were just as interested as the men and were in just as constant attendance. Why, that breakfast was the only real meal we had. We wouldn't leave the convention hall long enough to eat. Sandwiches and bottles of milk were brought in and we all ate and drank and listened and shouted at the same time."

"I want to say for the benefit of the many Portland admirers of Mrs. William L. Brown, formerly Iselta Jewell of the Baker Stock company, that she seconded Mr. Davis' nomination in the finest speech made by any woman at the convention. So convincing, yet so womanly was Mrs. Brown's speech, and so beautiful did she look, that its impression will always remain in the memories of those who heard her."

NEW WRITING BOOK

"I came west on a train with a great many southerners of the old school—

dignified, delightful old southern gentlemen—and their interest and approval of the West was a joy to me. They piled me with questions all the way out and they were so delighted with San Francisco and with the way it handled its visitors that I decided the western cities should make strenuous efforts to get all of the big conventions they can, because the bringing of these people of prominence here is a bigger work in Americanization than the education of foreigners."

Miss Monroe will spend the summer in Oregon, finishing a book laid in Oregon, for which she has already sold the rights, as well as the serial, movie and play rights. She says the demand for western stories is tremendous and that she has put aside all other work for the present in an effort to meet this demand. She has contributed a number of short stories to the Red Cross magazine and they have proven so popular that she has contracted for a story for each issue indefinitely. These stories are given the position of honor, by being placed first in the magazine. Miss Monroe has sold the movie rights for her story of the Pendleton Round-Up, which appeared in the Red Cross magazine.

Spotless Town Will Result From New Fuel, Says P. R., L. & P.

The city council Thursday afternoon inspected the new appliances installed by the Portland Railway, Light & Power company at station L, its steam auxiliary power plant at the foot of East Clay street, for the prevention of soot and ash passing from the stack and

soiling the clothes on housewives' clotheslines for a mile around.

Last spring a petition with hundreds of signatures was sent to Mayor Baker protesting against clouds of smoke from this plant. The council considered the petition and referred it to City Attorney La Roche, who notified the P. R., L. & P. that the nuisance would have to be abated. The company undertook a new system of drafts which has now been finished.

The company recently began using a combination fuel of sawdust, coal and crude oil which its engineers claim will do much to reduce the smoke nuisance.

For-Hire Cars and Taxis May Both Be Allowed at Station

If taxicabs and drivers of cars for hire can get together on rates for passengers from the Union station, they will be allowed to park their machines in block T, the plaza just south of the station from which the buildings were raised for the Shrine convention crowds.

Just now the for hire cars are the only ones maintaining stands at the station, and Acting Mayor Bigelow believes that privileges should be extended by the city

to the transportation companies offering the cheapest rates. But before any concessions are granted a conference of this week to adjust things so that machines of both classifications may be accommodated.

Complaints are constantly being made about the rates charged for hauls from the station.

\$290,000 Is Given For Fund to Build New Hospital Unit

More than \$290,000 has been subscribed to the Good Samaritan hospital building fund, according to the financial statement prepared by Bishop Walter Taylor Sumner and his aides, working in behalf of the proposed new hospital unit.

As chairman of the board of trustees of the hospital, overseeing the campaign for building funds, Bishop Sumner reports the subscription of more than two thirds of the total by five contributors. The largest subscription is that of the Wilcox estate, \$125,000. Mrs. J. K. Clarke of Los Angeles is credited with a

subscription of \$45,000, the hospital trustees added another \$25,000 and Max H. Houser of Portland gave \$10,000.

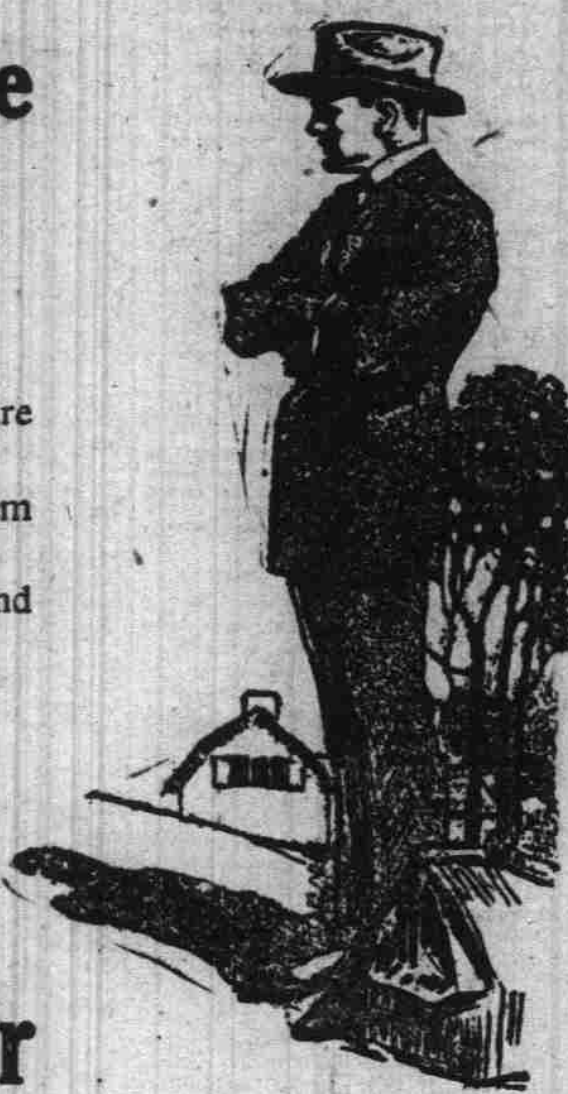
