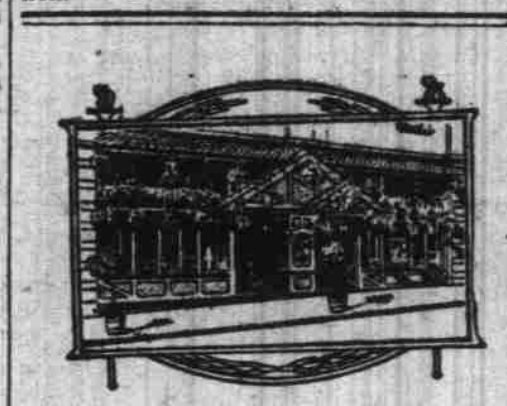

Both Sides to Deal Assert Agent Got \$1000 Wrongfully

Albany, Or., July 9.—Both sides to the sale of the Albany Fruit Juice company's plant last December are after the agent who negotiated the deal, alleging fraud. George T. Shipley, the purchaser, and the company each seek \$1000, each asserting that J. A. Howard, the defendant in the two suits, pocketed without authority, \$1000 of the purchase price.

Shipley says Howard represented the plant would cost \$1000 more than the company in reality asked for it and the company asserts that Howard represented he had received for the company \$1000 less than Shipley had actually paid. Shipley paid \$4000 for the plant.
