

### EDUCATORS BAR LOCAL CONTROL OF THEIR ASSOCIATION

The big thing in the National Education association convention at Salt Lake this year was the change in organization," said W. C. Alderson, county school superintendent and president of the Oregon State Teachers' association, who was one of the delegates.

"Hereafter, the association will be controlled by delegates from each state proportioned according to the number of members. This has been done to prevent local control of the association as in the case of Milwaukee last year, when teachers were brought in from Chicago and Milwaukee, sufficient to control the association. There will be about 10 delegates from Oregon at the convention at Philadelphia next year."

About 40 members from Oregon were present at the association convention. Delegates from Portland were: Mrs. C. Newell of the school board, accompanied by Mrs. Newell; C. A. Rice, assistant county superintendent; H. M. Sherwood of the Principals' association, Miss Leona Larrabee of the High School Teachers' association, Mrs. Jennie Richardson of the Grade Teachers' association, and Alderson of the State Teachers' association, accompanied by Mrs. Alderson.

Among the Oregonians taking part in the program were: Miss Julia Spooner of Woodlawn school; C. A. Rice; John W. Todd, city superintendent of Salem; E. F. Carlton, newly elected superintendent of Eugene; G. W. Agert, county superintendent of Jackson county. Two Oregonians were elected to national offices, E. F. Carlton as vice president, and A. C. Hampton, superintendent of La Grande schools, as director, succeeding W. C. Alderson.

### Bandit Takes His Money and Then Coolly Shoots Him

Everett, Wash., July 13.—(L. N. S.)—Shot down with calm deliberation by a masked bandit who fired from the rear, Olaf Bergman, logger, is dying in a hospital at Sultan, a logging and mining town back in the hills from Everett. Bergman, Bert Nelson and a logger named Johnson were occupying the same bunkhouse at a logging camp four miles in the woods from Sultan. Late Saturday afternoon a bandit masked with a blue bandana suddenly appeared at the door.

He copped Nelson to the Bergman and Johnson, and himself tied Nelson. From Bergman he secured \$909 in cash and about \$10 additional from the other two. Just before leaving, it is said, the bandit coolly shot Bergman in the back. Posses are searching the hills.

### Bodies of Children Are Found in Creek

San Jose, Cal., July 13.—(L. N. S.)—The bodies of Bobby and Betty Hartick, aged 7 and 5, missing since Sunday, were recovered Monday from the waters of Zayante creek in the Santa Cruz mountains. With their mother they were spending their vacation on a ranch. Yesterday afternoon their mother missed them and all night searching parties scoured the hills. Today the waters of the creek were dragged and the bodies found. The Hartick family lived in Alameda.

### 10 Counties Still Have 296,402 Acres Of Land Not Taken

The Dalles, July 13.—There are 296,402 of unappropriated and unreserved land in this district, according to a report sent out by the land register here. The district embraces 10 counties: Hood River, Crook, Deschutes, Gilliam, Morrow, Grant, Jefferson, Sherman, Wasco and Wheeler. No land is available in Hood River county and only 2240 acres in this county. In Crook county, 144,922 acres of grazing and broken, hilly and mountainous land is available. Outside Hood River county, Morrow county has the least as yet un-taken, 500 acres.

Ten thousand gallons of distillate arrived at Dufur Saturday. The Farmers' union and E. R. Jackson, county agent, have succeeded in carrying for the fuel needs of nearly every farmer in the county.

The Dalles Chamber of Commerce has secured a large spraying outfit and operators and a systematic campaign was begun Monday to exterminate elm tree beetles, which are fast eating up beautiful trees in this city.

Aged and bedraggled, an unknown woman who had escaped from the state hospital for the insane at Pendleton, was found hiding in a boxcar. She said she escaped from the institution because "they were trying to drown her."

Permission to erect, maintain and operate an electric transmission line on Wasco County roads from Dufur into Sherman county was sought here Saturday by the Sherman Electric company, from the county court. The proposed line would connect with that of the Pacific Power & Light company and furnish light and power for Sherman county homes and business houses.

### Yeggs Fail to Open Safe and Console Selves With Shoes

Albany, Or., July 13.—After an unsuccessful attempt to blow open the safe in the Lamar & Lamar store at Florida, miles south of Albany on the Willamette river, robbers took three pairs of shoes, some small change, a hammer and a box of cigars. It is believed they were transients traveling in a large touring car.

A dog suspected of having been afflicted with hydrophobia was killed Saturday by the Albany police, after the animal, which was frothing at the mouth, snapped at women and children.

Albert Nyus, 19, Albany youth on parole from a sentence to the state industrial school on a charge of forgery, is again at the reform school as the result of having cashed two more bad checks. He is said to have passed in all not less than 12 worthless checks within the last year and is believed to be deficient mentally.

### Having Liquor in Plane Is Charged; 144 Bottles Found

New York, July 13.—(U. P.)—The trial by court-martial of Ensign Windsor H. Channing and Ensign Frank Lamb, who were charged with violation of Secretary Daniels' order No. 99 by storing intoxicants aboard their seaplane, opened here today. The alleged violation occurred when the officers made a flight from Blundin, Bahamas, to Miami, Fla. Lieutenant Hugh Cuttrel, chief witness for the prosecution, said he inspected the plane when it landed and found 144 brown bottles. He ordered the bottles thrown overboard, he said, but was not sure that there was any liquid in them—much less intoxicating liquor. Witnesses who have been summoned from the Pacific coast are expected to appear tomorrow.
