

## EUGENE MAN WINS RANGE HONORS

Camp Lewis, Wash., July 15.—First Lieutenant Edgar B. Rohne, Eugene, battalion adjutant, was high score man in the Oregon military shoot, which was concluded Tuesday. Lieutenant Rohne's score was 465 out of a possible 600, and was made in competition with 40 men and boys of the Oregon military units who are trying for membership on the Oregon team which will represent the state in the national shoot at Camp Perry, Ohio, August 1-26.

## Pocatello Council Passes Ordinance On Excess Profits

Pocatello, Idaho, July 15.—When the city council passed two ordinances known as the "cost price" ordinance and the "licensing" ordinance there was a storm of protest from the commercial interests. The two bills were passed with the avowed intention of curtailing alleged profiteering.

Definite action was taken last Friday by a local merchant to test the validity of the ordinances when Attorneys Budge and Merrill filed a complaint in district court. The complaint alleges in regard to the cost price ordinance that it is unreasonable, oppressive and unjust, and is an invasion of the common rights of all persons doing business as merchants in that the property of merchants is subjected to examination without any limitation upon such individuals.
