

ROBERTSON SUES BANK OF KENTON FOR FALSE ARREST

John A. Robertson wants the Bank of Kenton to pay him \$25,000 for alleged general damages and \$1285 for specific damages which he claims as a result of negotiations with that bank and other business deals which led to his arrest and imprisonment. He filed his suit against the bank Wednesday morning.

Robertson says that in the early part of January, 1919, he opened an account with the bank, giving it his signed negotiable notes on which all his dealings with the institution were maintained; that between January and June of 1919 he negotiated through this bank approximately \$50,000 worth of business, making deposits and drawing checks, all of which time his notes were held by the bank. He says that on June 24, 1919, at McArthur, Cal., he bought from the McArthur Cattle company 108 cows, giving a check on the Bank of Kenton for \$8700 in payment therefor, but the bank refused payment, stating no reason.

Then followed Robertson's arrest at Winnemucca, Nev., he says, on the charge of issuing a check without sufficient funds and his being placed in the Nevada jail, where he was held a week, and then transferred to Shasta county, California, where he was again placed in jail and remained a week before he released the required bail.

He estimates his loss of time at \$250, expenses of telegraphing, attorney and court costs at \$1000 and total specific damages at \$1285, and he declares his reputation as a business man has been damaged to the extent of \$25,000.

SEEKS NEW NAME BECAUSE HIS NAME HAS GERMAN SOUND

George Edward Tohant wants to legally change his name to George Edward Johnson, by which name he is known in Portland and other places in Oregon. He filed his petition Tuesday in the probate department of the Multnomah county circuit court. He says he has resided in Portland since April 15, 1917, under the name of Johnson; that he is a native of the United States, having been born in Wisconsin, and that his father is a native American, but that the name of Tohant militates against him in holding positions, because of its German sound. In March of 1917, he says, he became estranged from his family and came West to make his home, and at once assumed the name of Johnson. He registered for the selective service under this name, thinking it would help him to get into service, he says, whereas the use of his real name would cause embarrassment and might prevent his acceptance. When he was given his physical examination, however, he says he was not permitted to enter the military service, because of a leakage of the heart.

WELL KNOWN CHARACTER OF STREETS FOUND INANE

Philip Kieback, 108 1/2 First street, who for nearly a dozen years has been a well known figure on the streets of Portland, was tried before a lunacy commission and Special Agent Cameron of Circuit Judge Tawell's court, Tuesday, and declared insane. He will be sent to the state hospital at Salem.

Kieback, who is a native of Bavaria, in 77 years of age, has been the father of three sons, all of whom are dead. For some time he has sold papers on the streets.

When his arrest was made it is said that he undertook to secure a revolver to prevent his being taken into custody.

THREE FINED FOR EXCEEDING SPEED LIMIT ACROSS BRIDGE

A fine of \$35 was imposed by District Judge Jones on K. Kaspar, Tuesday, when Kaspar pleaded guilty to driving an automobile at the rate of 42 miles across the interstate bridge. Three other men were also fined for exceeding the speed limit on this bridge. Henry Henschel pleaded guilty to driving his car at the rate of 37 miles an hour, and was fined \$15; a fine of \$12.50 was given G. H. Cook for driving at the rate of 36 miles an hour, and Joe Leet had to pay \$10 for running at 33 miles an hour rate of speed while crossing the bridge.

CHARGES WIFE HAS ANOTHER HUSBAND; SEEKS SEPARATION

Ivory L. Davison wants the court to annul his marriage with Mattie Davison, and filed a suit for this purpose Tuesday. He says they were married in Kings county, Washington, April 24, 1915, and five years thereafter, or on July 4, last, he discovered that she had been married on March 4, 1916, to J. W. Goran and that there had never been any divorce, they still being legally married. Goran, says Davison, is a resident of Alameda, Cal.
