

FOREST SERVICE PLANS RECREATION IN BROAD SENSE

Effort to Be Made to Bring the Public to Realization of Vast Benefits of Nation's Forests.

"Recreation in its broadest sense, including all sorts of welfare work, is going to be one of the big ideas which the U. S. forest service will put through within the next few years."

"The sinful thing about the West is that the forests are being opened up entirely for the recreation of the automobile class. You don't have people below the automobile class. What will come is that they will be eventually taken care of, but not until the Western cities wake up to the fact that 15 per cent of their children are tubercular and that they have a large class of persons who cannot have automobiles."

"The three things we must develop in our national forests recreationally, are conservation, accessibility and interpretation."

These were some of the statements made Saturday by Dr. Frank Waugh, landscape specialist of Washington, D. C., who is a collaborator with the forest service in the publication of books on recreation.

Dr. Waugh is in Portland for the purpose of ascertaining the needs of the Mount Hood region in the way of landscaping and to discuss the employment of a trained landscape architect by the forest service for district No. 6.

USE FOR WELFARE WORK

"I believe in the use of our national forests for all sorts of welfare work," said Dr. Waugh, for summer camps where undernourished children can go, for other camps where the shopgirls can spend their two weeks' vacation, for sanitariums where the tubercular children may be cured. Many of the fraternal orders have gone into the work of establishing sanitariums and homes of various sorts, and they are going into the forests to do it. The forest service is now leasing them all the space they want for sanitariums. This phase of the recreational uses of the national forests has not yet reached the West, however. But it is coming.

"Nature appreciation is much the same as that of music, and it can be developed along the same lines. I know of nothing so closely allied as scenery and music. Music lies around over the city. The records of Bach and of Wagner are in the library, but nobody pays any attention or cares until they hear some great musician interpret the musical message, or until they study music themselves and know what it means. Thus it is with the great symphonies of our mountains and forests."

SCOUT WORK PRAISED

"The work of the Boy Scouts along this line is excellent. The boy goes into the forest. He is aroused in the morning to see the sunrise. He does not rave about it, probably, but he sees it. He is made to bathe in the stream and have water fights, but he does not use exclamations of wonder. At night he hears the rustling of the fir boughs and all the mysterious conversations of the forests, but he does not gush about it. But in later years, when at his desk in the city he has troubles with his boss or other clouds pile up, then his thoughts turn back to the forest, and if he can get five days off he goes back and gains spiritual fortification."

Forest landscaping, in the sense not of artificial placing of shrubs and trees, but in the surveying of roads and camp sites so as to preserve the best scenic effects naturally, is receiving so much attention by the forest service that a specially trained man is to be employed in each district for this purpose. The principal difficulty at present lies in finding men with the proper qualifications, since most of the graduates of landscape architect schools have the wrong viewpoint for forest work, having been trained along the line of beautifying country estates.

California Canyon Fire Spreads Fast; Family Has to Flee

Los Angeles, July 17.—(U. N. S.)—Fleeing before a wall of flame sweeping through Los Flores canyon, in the Malibu district, north of Santa Monica beach, John Salomonovich, cafe proprietor, and his family and children narrowly escaped being burned to death today.

The fire, which almost trapped the Salomonovich family, has been burning in the canyon for 24 hours, but was reported this afternoon as under control.

Miss Allen Forms Health Association In Curry County

Miss Jane C. Allen, head of the bureau of nursing of the state board of health and field organizer for the Oregon Tuberculosis association, has returned from Curry county where, after a speaking tour, she organized a county public health association with the following officers: President: Mrs. A. W. Cope of Langlois; vice president, Mrs. J. A. Driscoll of Brookings; secretary-treasurer, Fred Cagwell of Gold Beach; community vice presidents, Langlois-Denmark, Mrs. Frank Kenworthy; Brookings, Mrs. H. C. Nutting; Gold Beach, Mrs. W. A. Wood.

"The county is very anxious for a public health nurse to begin work at once, but the demand for nurses so far exceeds the supply that the place cannot be filled at present; however, there is so much interest in matters pertaining to public health that it was decided to organize the association anyway," said Miss Allen. "Until such time as a nurse can be secured the organization will busy itself with the work of the modern health crusade and by assisting with the sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals."

Miss Allen was very materially assisted in the organization by Mrs. A. W. Cope, president of the Northern Curry Community Welfare club, who accompanied her on her speaking tour, which covered the following points: July 8, Langlois and Denmark; July 9, Bucher Creek and Gold Beach; July 10, Wedderburn and Jerrys flat; July 11, Pistol River; July 12, Brookings; July 13, Port Orford.

Charges of violation of the Mann white slave act were filed Saturday against Carl J. Alf, 52, an alleged German citizen, by Assistant United States Attorney Austin Flegel. Alf and Mrs. Katherine C. Balz were arrested at 228 East Twentieth street Friday night by Tom Word, investigator for the department of justice. According to information in the hands of Flegel, Alf is said to have paid Mrs. Balz's fare to Portland from Columbus, Ohio. Alf and three grown children reside in Columbus, as does Mrs. Balz, according to Flegel. Alf is held in the county jail in default of \$2000 bail, and the woman is being detained as a material witness. Flegel charges that Alf sent Mrs. Balz \$50 with which to follow him west, after he had obtained work at the Mt. Hood soap factory.

MAYOR EXPLAINS WHY CEDARS IS RUN BY LAYMAN

Institution Comes Under Commissioner Mann, but Is Directly Supervised by Dr. G. Parrish.

The letter of Dr. David N. Roberg, secretary of the state board of health, criticizing the city because a "layman" was in charge of the Cedars hospital for the treatment of women afflicted with social diseases, met quick reply from Mayor Baker Saturday.

While commending the conduct of the institution, Dr. Roberg said the state board of health believed the institution should be in charge of a physician, ignoring the fact that it is under the direct jurisdiction of the city health officer, Dr. George Parrish, although the health bureau is one of several coming under Commissioner J. M. Mann.

In his letter to Dr. Roberg, the mayor said:

"I am at a loss to know what you are driving at in your letter of July 15, 1932, regarding the Cedars Detention hospital. The letter seems to be an un-

qualified endorsement of the institution and yet you seem to have a serious misgiving as to why it is conducted as it is. You demand to be advised why the Cedars is not under the control of the city board of health."

"To answer this question I must go back to the time Portland adopted the commission form of government which among other things abolished all boards, including what was known as the board of health. The only board of health that remained was the city health bureau which functions through the city health officer and a city commissioner. The Cedars is in charge of the city health bureau under Dr. George Parrish, city health officer and John M. Mann, city commissioner, having been assigned to those officials by this office in accordance with the city charter. If the city board of health has been abolished by the people and the city health bureau given the work and the authority of the city board of health, how can the detention home be under the city board of health and what difference does it make whether the organization is called the city board of health or the city health bureau."

"Under this arrangement the medical and of the work is taken care of by medical men and the business end by business men. That combination would appear to me to be about right whether it operated under the name of the city board of health or the city health bureau. I sincerely appreciate your statement that the institution is maintained on a high standard, and I concur heartily with that opinion because I know that it is, but I still cannot understand what point you are trying to make in your other question."
