SPANISH YOUTH ENTERS COLLEGE

Guillermo Cifre de Colonia Asks for Triple English Course at Corvallis.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, July 17.—A young Spaniard, Guillermo Cifre de Colonia, has registered for three courses in English in the college summer session. He picked O. A. C. as being the best of all the institutions in the United States for his purposes. He hails from Mallorca island, one of the Balearic group, belonging to Spain. He comes here to study horticulture, especially fruit packing.

Mr. Cifre expects to spend three years at the college, and to put in one year of study in the University of California. He speaks French, German and Spanish, and despite the fact that he has been in this country but two or three weeks, has comparatively little trouble in handling the English language.

The young man was recommended by His Excellency, Juan Riano, Spanish ambassador, and was introduced to President Kerr by a letter from Federico de Onia, professor of Spanish literature at Columbia university.

Cifre went to school two years in Berlin, and studied agricultural engineering for two or three years in the University of Madrid, where it takes nine years to earn a degree. He considered that the work was not practical so decided to come to the United States.

Many Candidates Enter Office Race In Cowlitz County

Kelso, Wash., July 17.—County Auditor R. A. Davis was the first candidate to file for office Friday when the 30-day filing period began. Other incumbents filing for re-nomination on the Republican ticket were: Treasurer L. P. Brown, Sheriff John Hoggatt, Clerk Hite Innes and Assessor W. M. McCoy. C. C. Ruffison of Kelso filed for representative on the Republican ticket.

It is expected that County Attorney William Stuart and School Superintendent Joseph Gardner will also file for reelection. Senator Frank G. Barnes is expected to seek re-nomination, and John Bogart of Woodland has announced that he will seek the Republican nomination for senator.

H. E. McKenny of Kelso filed his candidacy as judge of the superior court for the district comprising Cowlitz, Skamania and Klickitat counties. McKenny served one term as judge and has been practicing law in Cowlitz county for 27 years. Judge Daroch has announced that he will not be a candidate again.

Cowlitz county has purchased a new automobile for the sheriff's office for use in searching out liquor law violators. The car was paid for with money derived from fines assessed on bootleggers and liquor law violators. More than \$2000 has been received from that source within a year.

We, the dairymen, 2051 in number, comprise the Oregon Dairymen's League, as a non-profit association organized under the laws of the State of Oregon for the purpose of promoting, fostering and encouraging the business of producing and marketing our own milk co-operatively, and for reducing speculation and collectively handling the problems of dairymen.

The other faction is the distributors, whose business is simply the handling and distributing after we, the dairymen, deliver it to them in Portland.

Our price to the distributor is slightly less than 7 cents, out of which we pay haulage and freight charges.

The distributors' price to you is 15 cents, giving him a gross profit of over 8 cents.

Recently the distributors raised the price of milk 1c per quart. Their reason was the increased cost of production. We, the dairymen who produce the milk, did not receive any of this advance, in spite of the fact that we are the ones who pay increased cost of production.
