

AMERICAN LEGION ELECTS DELEGATES FOR ASTORIA MEET

In the election of delegates to the state convention of the American Legion, held Monday night at the Central Library by Portland post, George A. White, adjutant general of Oregon, received the greatest number of votes of any of the candidates. The state convention will be held at Astoria, July 30, 31 and August 1.

During the election a hot contest arose as to the legality of allowing members of the post belonging to the national guard and on duty at Camp Lewis to vote while not present at the meeting. T. Henry Boyd pointed out the constitutional ruling that only members in good standing present at a regular meeting could vote for the delegates and it was decided that the vote at the meeting should be counted at once instead of awaiting the ballots to come by mail from the guardsmen.

Besides White, the 22 delegates elected were Thomas Sweeney, James O. Conwill, Jerrold Owen, Prescott W. Cookingham, Franklin F. Koyell, James R. Bain, Wilbur Handerson, Edward J. Elvers, T. Henry Boyd, Caselus R. Peck, G. L. Goodell, Merle Campbell, Ben Morrow, Arthur A. Murphy, Walter B. Gleason, Arthur M. Geary, Dow V. Walker, Creed C. Hammond, Jane V. Doyle, Frank M. Moore, James F. Alexander and J. Guy Strohm. Twenty-three alternates were also elected.

The post decided to send a band with the delegation to Astoria and Billy Foy

was named chairman of the committee. Foy returned from Astoria Monday where he assisted members of the post in that city in its preparations for the state meeting. Portland post will probably send a hundred members as visitors to the convention besides the delegation.

"Harmageddon," a weird local publication written by Hermann Schreiber, which attempts to prove that the United States and its allies should pay the Germans a huge indemnity, return all of the property taken from Germans and form an alliance with them as the chosen people, came up for consideration by the post. Portions of the publication were read, but no action was taken by the post.

The women's auxiliary of the post will give a dance on July 26. It was announced at the meeting. Earlier in the evening the committee of 12, appointed to reorganize the post, met at the Hazelwood and elected T. Henry Boyd chairman, Arthur A. Murphy was chosen secretary. The committee will write letters to posts in cities all over the United States to see how problems such as those confronting Portland post are being met. The committee will not report before September.

For-Hire Car Men Must Be Citizens

Drivers of for hire cars and taxicabs will have to be American citizens before they can secure chauffeurs' licenses in Portland, if an ordinance now being prepared for City Commissioner J. M. Mann by Deputy City Attorney Stanley Myers goes through. Mann declares that some of the drivers are foreigners with imperfect command of the English language and they are unable to understand the traffic laws.

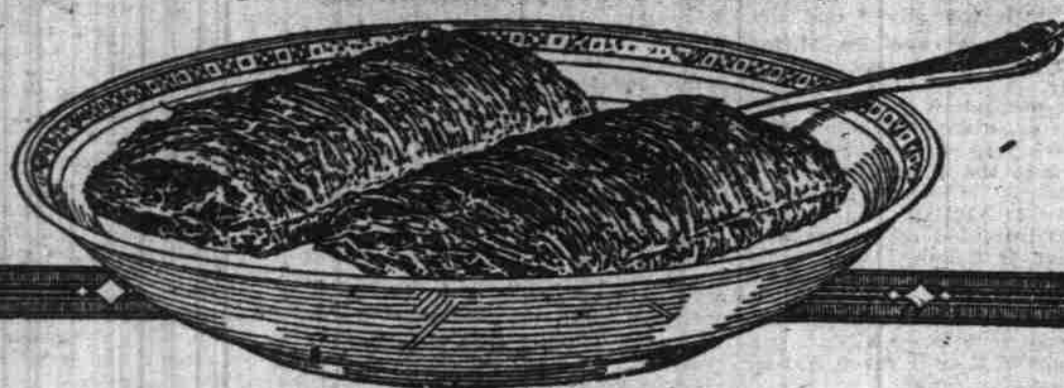
Marshfield People Pay Honor to Dead

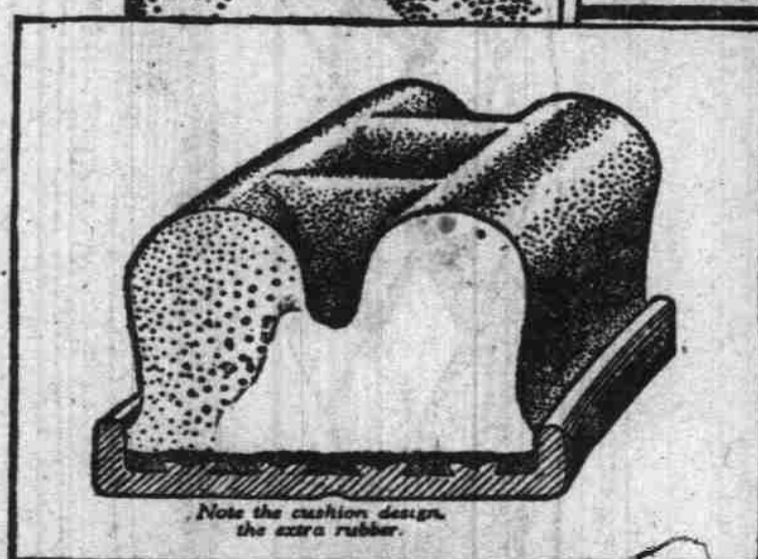
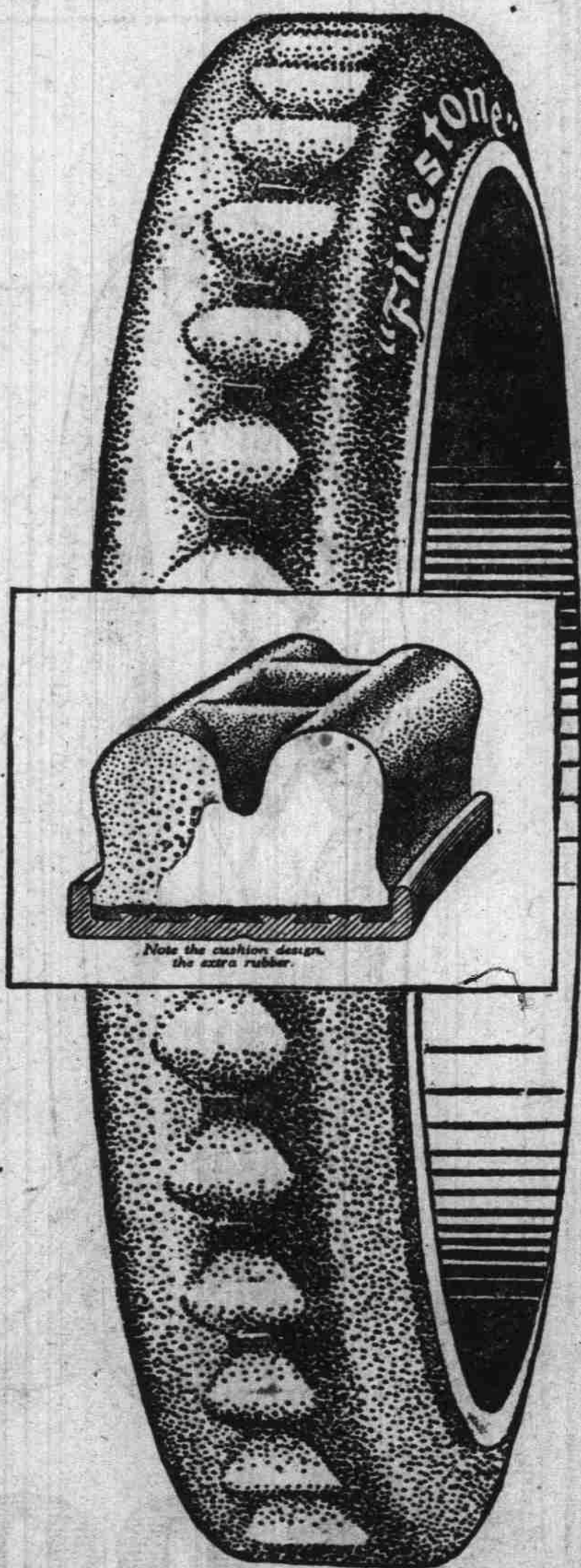
