

LOSS OF RECORDS DOES NOT DESTROY ONE'S CITIZENSHIP

Salem, July 21.—The act of the elements in destroying the records of a court does not destroy one's citizenship in the United States of America, according to Attorney General Brown, who has written an opinion to that effect for the guidance of Carl D. Shoemaker, executive secretary of the state fish and game commission.

Shoemaker had called the attention of the attorney general to an application for a fishing license filed by a man who had been naturalized but whose papers had been destroyed by fire. The records of his citizenship had also been destroyed in the San Francisco earthquake. If the man is able to prove his citizenship otherwise his papers, which are the best evidence of his citizenship, are not necessary, Brown holds.

The state legislature has directly authorized the people of the state in every county of the state to put into effect the jackrabbit law, according to an opinion by Attorney General Brown in reply to an inquiry from T. S. McKinney, district attorney for Lake county, as to the constitutionality of the act of the 1919 legislature authorizing the state to issue county laws creating jackrabbit bounties. A similar law, enacted by a previous legislature, was held unconstitutional, the attorney general explained, because the enabling act provided. Under the present enabling act the people of every county are authorized to issue or repeal local laws for their county by the initiative and referendum process.

Application for increases in intra-state freight rates similar to those pending before the interstate commerce commission has been filed with the Oregon public service commission. The application is signed by all railroads operating in Oregon.

For the first time since the law creating the state board of barber examiners became effective 21 years ago there has been a surplus in the fund over and above the \$1000 maximum maintenance fund allowed the board by law. This surplus, amounting to \$255.43, has been turned over to the general fund of the state, as required by law. A total of 156 barbers have been examined for certificates in the six month period, of whom 132 were passed, the semi-annual report shows.

New Regulations To End Slaughter Of Salmon Urged

Astoria, July 21.—That thousands of small fish are being slaughtered at the mouth of the river by the purse seines is the contention of Deputy Fish Warden Larson. He suggests that the practice be stopped by stringent regulations, which should be enforced. From the 100 or more purse seines operating, he said, the shores at North Beach is lined with the bodies of vast numbers of young salmon ruthlessly killed. "Last year the packers made an agreement to take no fish under 20 inches in length," he said, "and the legislature at its recent session enacted a law fixing the limit of 20 inches in length on fish which can be accepted at the packing plant. This limit is far too low and several packers, realizing that fact, have agreed to accept no salmon weighing less than 20 pounds each, which should be the minimum. Others, however, are receiving fish of almost any size. One packer told me recently that he would receive any fish that he wished. I cannot arrest a man unless he accepts fish under 20 inches in length. A fish that size will weigh four or five pounds."

The evening session is to be purely social, labeled a "get-together meeting" on the official program, and will be given over chiefly to music and talks. The first speaker, Chamberlayne, has stated for an address and Harry G. Allen of Portland, president of the state association, will respond to the governor.

"Hello Bill," is the by-word as well as the pass word on the streets. A few of the salaried, mostly automobile parties, have been driving since Sunday, but the bulk of the guests are slated to reach here late Wednesday and early Thursday.

The Portland lodge, which will be represented at the sessions by more than 1000 members to arrive on a special train Thursday morning, will not have a candidate in the field to succeed Allen as president.

There will be a program of athletic sports and contests, a picnic lunch and music. Columbia park is on the peninsula on Lombard street and Chautauqua avenue.

The charge is brought under the 5th article of war, alleging that his conduct was contrary to military discipline in failure to have Bergdoll properly guarded.

CURE FOR WREST GIVEN BY SPEAKER

Oregon City, July 21.—Twelve months of good, old-fashioned wrestling of the full eight-hour-a-day kind, cessation of extravagant spending, increased production, the laying aside of savings each month and the proper spirit of Americanism were advanced by E. E. Fish, Tuesday night, at Chautauqua, as cures for industrial unrest.

Fish made a talk full of sledghammer blows at tendencies of the time and denounced the radical in scathing phrases. He grants the right for men to organize, to lay down their work if they so desire, and to use powers of persuasion in urging others; but beyond that point he emphatically states no man can go if he understands the American spirit, which does not allow for intimidation or browbeating.

PORTLAND FOREIGN TRADE OUTLOOK IS CONSIDERED GOOD

E. L. Fairbanks of Seattle, representing several of the largest shipping firms of Japan, arrived in Portland Wednesday morning and entered into conference with representatives of the foreign export trade. Captain Haskins and Captain Stubbe discussed matters of foreign trade with Fairbanks, who said trade prospects look good.

"Prospects for trade relations between Portland and foreign ports look good," said Fairbanks. "The general depression in lumber and general commodities does not seem to effect Portland as it does the ports to the north. Wheat (and flour) with lumber are the principal commodities of the Northwest. For the distribution of these Portland seems to be the fulcrum and all cereal exports will divert from here."

"Answering your question," said Fairbanks, "Portland is the logical shipping port for the bulk of the grain and lumber exports, foreign." The down hill haul of the lumber trade has been said of the Port of Portland is true. Option on several other Japanese steamships for Portland loading will be made and announcement made Thursday.

Operating in connection with the Japanese liners and Fairbanks is the Oregon and Coast Corporation, having under charter at the present time the steamship Hakushiku Maru, loading at the Eastern and Western Mills. She will probably be the largest vessel of this port, cargo amounting to 2000 tons of steel and 5,500,000 feet of lumber.

NEW STEAMSHIP SERVICE WILL INCLUDE PORTLAND

Inaugurating a new steamship service to Portland, announcement was received by the Chamber of Commerce from the New Orleans commercial organization, that the 3500 ton steel steamer El Dorado would leave the gulf port early in August for Portland and other Pacific ports. The line would be operated immediately by three other vessels in regular service.

The new service will be known as the Pacific, Caribbean & Gulf line and will operate vessels from New Orleans to ports of the West coast of Central America and the United States and return. A survey of the cargo offering of this port was made by officials of the New Orleans Chamber of Commerce recently.

Salem, July 21.—The resignation of W. K. Newell of Portland as a member of the board of regents of the University of Oregon and the appointment of the Rev. William S. Gilbert of Astoria as his successor on the board, was announced Wednesday morning by Governor Olcott.

Newell was elected director of properties and grounds for the university at the last meeting of the board. Philomath college from 1889 to 1892, pastor of the Presbyterian church, Eugene, from 1892 to 1899 and of the Calvary Presbyterian church, Portland, from 1899 to 1905. For 15 years he has been pastor of the Presbyterian church in Astoria.

He has been a resident of Oregon for 30 years and for 25 years has been chaplain of the Oregon National Guard, serving for 18 months with the Second Infantry in the Philippines, accompanying the Oregon troops to the Mexican border and serving as senior chaplain in the Forty-first division overseas in the war with Germany.
