

FALSE TEETH ARE THING OF PAST, ASSERTS DENTIST

From now on there is "no excuse" for a dentist causing pain while extracting teeth, according to Dr. Arthur E. Smith of Chicago, who is lecturing before the twenty-seventh annual meeting of the Oregon State Dental Society.

Dr. Smith will not spend any time in explaining how to pull the tooth or how to fill the cavity, but will demonstrate his method of nerve blocking during the time necessary to complete the work, so that the operation will be painless to the patient.
