

FRANCO-BRITISH MILITARY MISSION TO VISIT WARSAW

Paris, July 22.—(I. N. S.)—French and British military missions will leave for Warsaw as a result of the continued advance of the Russian army into Poland, it was announced today. General Weygant will head the French mission.

The missions will report to the British and French governments on the military needs of Poland against the Russian Bolsheviks.

Asked as to the specific activities of the missions in Poland, a member of the foreign office staff replied:

"It is evident that the members are not going for the mere purpose of saying 'good day' to the Poles. They will ascertain just what Poland requires in a military way."

It is understood that General Radcliffe will head the British mission.

RED CAVALRYMEN NEARING FRONTIER OF GERMANY

Berlin, July 22.—(I. N. S.)—Russian Bolshevik cavalry on the northern end of the Russo-Polish battle front has advanced to within 50 miles of the old German frontier, according to news from Koenigsberg today.

A Red army is being recruited in East Prussia. It is reported from the same source. Bolshevik agitators have been active among Prussian farm laborers urging them to join the Russian troops when the latter reach the German border.

The Russian army which occupied

Vilna is moving in a southwesterly direction and has taken Grodno, a fortress city on the Warsaw-Petrograd railroad. The Russians are advancing along this railroad in the direction of Bieloctok.

POLES MAY ASK ALLIES FOR 15,000 CAVALRYMEN

London, July 22.—(I. N. S.)—If reports of the capture of Bieloctok by the Russians are officially confirmed the Poles are expected to ask the allies for an army of 15,000 cavalrymen to take the field against the Bolsheviks. It was learned from an authoritative source today.

Bieloctok is 19 miles northeast of Warsaw. Unofficial reports that Russian cavalry had reached the city were received here last night.

POLES REPORTED READY TO REQUEST ARMISTICE

London, July 22.—(I. N. S.)—The Polish national council of defense has decided to make overtures to Moscow for an armistice at once on the Russo-Polish battlefield, said a Warsaw dispatch today to the Jewish delegation that is attending the international Zionist conference. It was said that the offer would be sent by wireless as the quickest means of getting it to the attention of the soviet government.

It was learned from the same source that the Polish national council of defense has decided to create a new government at Warsaw to include all parties but with a majority from the workmen's and peasants' parties.

Armistice Ordered By President Hsu

San Francisco, July 22.—(I. N. S.)—According to a Shanghai cable printed in the Chinese World here today the Chi-Li and Anfu factions now engaged in civil war in China have been ordered by President Hsu Shih-Chang to effect an armistice following failure of efforts to secure settlement by mediation.

RAILROAD UNIONS DEADLOCKED ON VOTE OVER AWARD

Chicago, July 22.—(I. N. S.)—Representatives of the railroad unions, after a hot meeting which lasted until early today, were divided over the question of accepting or rejecting the wage award granted the workers of the country by the United States railroad labor board.

Seven of the unions, including three of the four largest brotherhoods, were reported to have accepted or favored acceptance of the award in its entirety and without reservations. Seven others, it was declared, favored referring the award to the rank and file of their organizations, with the recommendation that it be accepted.

Two were reported to have decided in favor of ordering the award to a referendum of their members without recommendations, one to have rejected the award flatly and to have ordered the taking of a strike ballot, and one to have failed to reach a decision on the issue.

It is possible that concerted action of all the brotherhood representatives may yet be agreed upon, perhaps on a compromise agreement sending the award to a referendum vote of the 1,800,000 odd rail workers of the country. Many of the brotherhood chiefs declared they would work for this as the grand council reconvened today.

ARGUMENTS BITTER

Many bitter disagreements occurred during the all night meeting and at times the union chiefs made hot verbal attacks on each other. At one time S. M. Heberling, president of the Switchmen's Union of North America, arose and declared that W. S. Carter, president of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen, who was leading a fight for acceptance of the award without reservations, should be barred from the conference if he persisted in the arguments he was making.

LINE-UP GIVEN

Here is the way the unions were reported to be divided early today:

For unreserved acceptance of the award—Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, Switchmen's Union of North America, United Brotherhood of Maintenance of Way Employees and Railroad Shop Laborers, Brotherhood of Locomotive Firemen and Engineers, and the Masters, Mates and Pilots of America.

For referring the award to the rank and file with a recommendation that it be accepted—International Association of Machinists, Sheet Metal Workers' International Alliance, Brotherhood of Railway and Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, Express and Station Employees, Brotherhood of Railway Carmen of America, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, International Brotherhood of Boilermakers, Iron Shipbuilders and Helpers of America and the International Brotherhood of Blacksmiths, Drop Forgers and Helpers.

ONE WOULD STRIKE

For referring the award to the rank and file without recommendations—Brotherhood of Railway Signalmen and the Railway Employees' Department of the American Federation of Labor.

For rejection of the award and the ordering of a strike ballot—Order of Railroad Telegraphers.

OUTLAWS REJECT AWARD OF NEW U. S. LABOR BOARD

Columbus, Ohio, July 22.—(I. N. S.)—The 2300 members of the outlaw organization, the Columbus Yardmen's associ-

ation, here, have rejected, unanimously the wage award announced by the federal railroad labor board, according to announcement made by B. E. Callahan, president of the association. Callahan said association members will not return to work until all their demands are met.

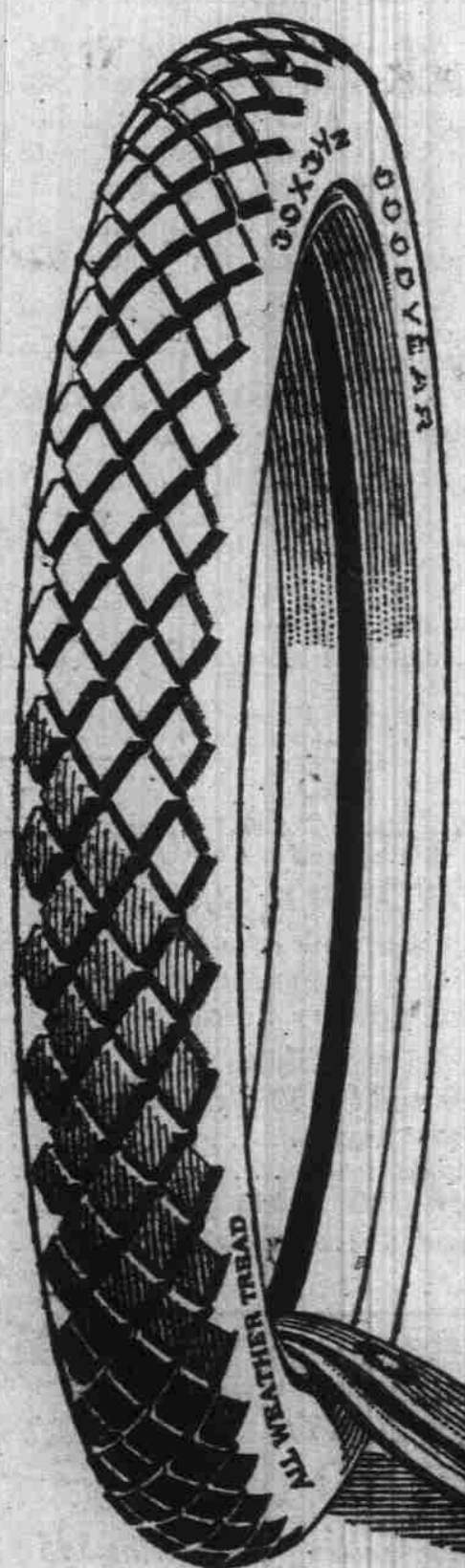
