

## SUES FOR \$175,000 ON ALLEGED BREACH IN TIMBER DEALS

A side issue of the recent sale of approximately 25,000 acres of timber land in Clatsop and Lewis counties by the Weyerhaeuser interests to the Long-Bell Lumber company, is a suit filed in the Multnomah county circuit court Wednesday by Fred S. Chapman against Elmer H. Cox, in which Chapman seeks a judgment for \$175,000.

Chapman says that an agreement was entered into between himself and Cox, who was in the business of presenting lumber tracts for consideration of buyers, that profits would be divided on such sales in cases where Chapman was the person substantially helping to carry through the deals. He says that in December of 1918 he submitted to Cox for consideration of the Long-Bell company the timber tracts which the company eventually purchased, and that in 1919 he personally conducted Cox, J. R. Tennant and others interested to and through these lands, the result being their purchase for \$7,000,000. He says that Cox received \$250,000 as his commission, but that he has refused to pay Chapman the \$175,000 share due, according to their agreement.

### PERMANENT INJUNCTION SOUGHT AGAINST UNIONS

Theatrical employees' unions which were enjoined under a temporary order issued by Circuit Judge Tazewell from interfering with the operation of local moving picture show houses, must appear before Circuit Judge Tucker at 2 o'clock next Thursday afternoon to show cause why the injunction should not be made permanent.

Attorneys representing both sides were before Circuit Judge Stimpson Wednesday, asking that the time for such hearing be fixed. W. S. U'Ren, appearing for the unions, objected to the hearing being held in that court, or in any other department of the Multnomah county circuit court where sentiment of the judges is known on the questions raised. It was finally decided that a hearing before Judge Tucker would be satisfactory to both sides.

It is said that this is the first case of this kind that has been taken into the local courts.

## Deaf Mute Is Taken From Mother; Body Livid With Welts

With his back beaten into a maze of livid welts, 8-year-old Martin McLean, son of Mrs. Edna McLean, 1072 Fremont street, was taken in charge by the juvenile court and the women's protective bureau Wednesday afternoon, after neighbors complained to police.

Mrs. Moorad and Mrs. Burtrager of the women's protective bureau investigated the case. Martin is a deaf mute, home from the institution for a vacation. He strays away, the officers said, and because he cannot hear his mother call, is beaten on his return. Mrs. Moorad reported that the boy has had to sleep in a corner, with no bedding but an old blanket, and that an unused bedstead and mattress were packed away.

Efforts will be made to provide a suitable place for the boy to stay. No arrest was made, because of Mrs. McLean's physical condition.

## Ex-Senator Ankeny Sued by W. Nesmith To Regain Property

Arguments in a suit to declare a deed a mortgage in the complaint filed by William Nesmith against ex-Senator Leod Ankeny were opened in the federal court, Wednesday, before Judge Bean. Nesmith and the late Mrs. Ankeny are brother and sister, both being the children of the late Colonel Nesmith of Polk county.

Upon the death of Colonel Nesmith, the family homestead is said to have been divided between the five children.

About 1899 William Nesmith is said to have deeded his share to Mrs. Ankeny to save the property from falling into the hands of a mortgagee. Nesmith admits in his complaint that he was unable at that time to take care of his business interests because he was addicted to the use of liquor. The mortgage is said to have been about \$7000, and the valuation of the property is given as \$20,000.

Mrs. Ankeny is said to have executed a will about 10 years previous to this time, in which she named her husband as the beneficiary of her holdings. Nesmith maintains that the deed he gave his sister was not absolute and that a part of the property was to be returned to him. He claims that his former holdings were not included in Mrs. Ankeny's will. Ankeny maintains the opposite view, claiming to be the present owner.
